After the February 1st heavy snowfall, you might be wondering how this compares in history.

April 8-10, 1973 might come to mind, the Blizzard of '73. During that snowstorm, Cedar Rapids received 14.5" according to the lowa State Climatologist, Harry Hillaker. There was another big snowstorm prior to this on Feb. 25-27, 1954 when 17.8" was recorded in Cedar Rapids. The following is a list of the last time 12" of snow or more was recorded and how much fell:

QUILT MINISTRY TO HELP LOCAL CITIZEN

City Hall received a call recently concerning a residents recent home fire, from a group that makes and distributes quilts to people in need. Here is the story about this group-

We are 4 ladies from a regular Bible Study group that meets on Thursday nights. The ministry started about 3 years ago when our leader heard about an elderly lady that had just survived breast cancer and now lost everything in a fire. A quilt was made and given to this poor lady. This is where the ministry began, and now supplies quilts to fire victims around the state of Iowa.

Not all of us our seamstress, others supply the funds for materials and postage, one lady even does some personal deliveries.

We have some sad moments, and some cities that can't or won't give us information. Last year alone we made over 100 quilts and are roughly a year behind.

It gets challenging at times. This year we already have 35-40 to complete.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

March 02, 2015

Mayor Shebetka called the regular meeting of the City Council to order at 6:00 pm in Springville City Hall. Present on roll call: Brady, Hoyt, Ralston, Merritt and Sindelar.

Public Hearings: Proposed Action to Institute Proceedings to Enter Into a Loan Agreement and Borrow Money in a Principal Amount Not to Exceed \$300,000 (Water Revenue)

Mayor Shebetka called for oral or written comment, there being none he closed the Hearing at 6:02 p.m.

Consent Agenda: M/b Sindelar, 2nd/b Brady, to approve the consent agenda as posted. All ayes, m/c.

Sheriff: Deputy Egli provided the service log for February 2, 2015 through February 16, 2015. There were 16 calls for service. January hours of service: 142.8. Mayor Shebetka reported once again on the snowmobile problems in Springville.

Public Works Maintenance Report: Brandon gave the maintenance report. A salesman provided a demo on a Kennedy water hydrant, Todd is working on salt shed bids, Altorfer was out to repair/replace the engine thermostat on the generator and fixed the Community Center garbage disposal. A skid loader tire is bulging. These were high dollar tires and are only about 3 years old. Todd and Roger think there should be some warranty reimbursement on the tire. Todd will call the tire distributor.

Clerk: Bixler noted the FEMA report from Kim. She did an excellent job working with engineer Bob Tobin and FEMA rep Tom Fallon on obtaining the highest dollar amount possible (\$52,823.27 restoration return and \$44,886.80 in mitigation funding) for repair of the 5th Street Bridge and stream bank stabilization. Also, Library Board meeting minutes and February OT report.

Old Business

256 Broadway Committee: Roger asked Penny to sit on the committee along with 4 citizens. This will be discussed again at the March $16^{\rm th}$ meeting.

New Business

Shoemaker & Haaland: M/by Brady, 2nd/b Ralston to approving an agreement for construction engineering services with Shoemaker and Haaland for the Broadway Phase IV Project. All ayes, m/c. Discussion was held on the number and placement of decorative street lights shown in the plans. Placement of lighting will be placed on a future agenda. Bob brought up the idea of an "open house" for the public to view the plans for the project and converse with Eastern Iowa Excavating and Alliant about the project. Consensus was to have an open house at 6:00 p.m. at the next regular council meeting on March 16th.

Bid Tabulations: Bid opening was held on February 27th. Six bids were received on the project with the high bid of Tschiggfrie Excavating at \$604,906.70 and low bid from Eastern Iowa Excavation at \$476,775.98.

Proposed Sale of "Old Bess": Discussion was held on what to do with "Old Bess". The truck is taking up room in the fire station that is needed for equipment. The truck is not usable and only a few firemen are able to drive the truck. The truck is still insured at a cost of \$375 per year. M/b Brady, 2nd/by Merritt to advertise "Old Bess" for 30 days. Sealed bids, with sale to the highest bidder. All ayes, m/c.

Audit: Councilman Brady had questions and concerns about the audit that is taking place. The cost of the audit is approximately \$8,000 - \$9,000. The council was informed of the audit at a budget work session in February. The audit was never a council agenda item and therefore the expenditure was not approved by the council. Roger scheduled the audit. He stated he was told that he should request an audit as a new mayor taking over fiscal responsibility of the city. Bixler stated the office has no problem with the audit, but that the combination of over-expenditures in the general fund including the audit, that paying for a new salt shed is probably not feasible in this fiscal year. Discussion continued on the audit. Roger called for a vote of approval from the Council. M/b Sindelar, 2nd/b Ralston to approve an audit for FY 2013-14. Ayes; Ralston, Merritt, Sindelar. Nays; Brady and Hoyt. M/c.

M/b Brady, 2nd/b Merritt approving **Resolution #8-2015: A Resolution Taking Additional Action to Enter a Water Revenue Loan Agreement.** Roll call

vote, m/c.

M/b Brady, 2nd/b Hoyt approving **Resolution #9-2015:** A Resolution Approving the Final Plat of Simmons Outlook Addition. Roll call vote, m/c.

M/b Brady, 2nd/b Sindelar approving the 1st reading of Ordinance #1-2015: An Ordinance Amending the Official Zoning Map, 2001 for the City of Springville, lowa in Accordance with Section 165.05, Changes in the Official Zoning Map (Caraway). Roll call vote, m/c.

Correspondence: Deb Vaughn informed the Council there will be another community meeting on the final report from lowa Schoolhouse Construction and Planning Services (ISCPS). The meeting is not scheduled at this time. An ad will run in the April newsletter.

Next Meeting: March 16, 2016.

Mayor Shebetka adjourned the meeting at 7:02 p.m.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

March 16, 2015

Mayor Shebetka called the regular meeting of the City Council to order at 6:02 pm in Springville City Hall. Present on roll call: Brady, Hoyt, Ralston and Merritt. Sindelar was absent.

The council meeting began with an overview of the Broadway Phase IV Project. Citizens were able to view a draft plan of the project, converse with Justin Mottet of Alliant, Chad Deemer of Eastern Iowa Excavating and project engineers Jay Varva and Bob Tobin.

Public Hearings: FY 2015-16 Proposed Budget hearing opened at 6:35 pm. Mayor Shebetka called for oral or written comment. Ralston stated she did not agree with including benefits to part-time employees in the budget, because unless the handbook in re-written it does not address this issue. Mayor Shebetka noted that the employee handbook is being reviewed by the city attorneys for recommended changes and updates. Final aspects of employee wages are approved by a wage resolution in June and the council will need to review the amended employee manual and approve it before that time. This topic will be an agenda as soon as time is available. There being no further discussion Mayor Shebetka closed the Public Hearing at 6:44 p.m.

Consent Agenda: M/b Brady, 2nd/b Hoyt, to approve the consent agenda with corrections noted by Ralston. All ayes, m/c.

Citizens with Concerns Not on the Agenda: Councilman Merritt on the fact that Deputy Clerk Donaldson was present and that citizens have asked if she was getting paid overtime for this. Bixler stated that Kim is staying as part of her training and in this case to learn the meeting process as she will eventually be taking minutes. Kim is doing this voluntarily with no pay.

Sheriff: no Deputy.

Public Works Maintenance Report:

The council reviewed Todd's written maintenance report. The tires for the backhoe are ordered. The tire company has not gotten back to Todd on the warranty issue.

Clerk: Black Hills Energy has contacted City Hall in reference to the gas franchise that needs to be renewed. Bixler was confident that after going through the electric franchise last year she could probably accomplish the gas franchise with very little help from a professional.

Old Business

256 Broadway Committee: Roger is still talking with citizens to develop a 256 Broadway committee. This will be discussed again at the April 6^{th} meeting.

New Business

Audit: Bixler reviewed the "Audit Comments" with the council. A copy of the commentary is available at City Hall.

5th Street Tree Bid: Todd had Bug of D&D Tree Service assess 3 trees on 5th Street. The trees have some branches hanging that need to come down at some point. Discussion was held on identifying dying or diseased trees to create a "tree list" in order that contractors could just bid an already approved list and to budget more effectively for tree removal in each fiscal year. Funding for tree trimming or removal is put in each fiscal year budget, but the amount is based on what was needed the previous fiscal year. D&D Tree Service gave a price quote for the removal of the 3 trees. When it is decided the trees need to come down bids will be taken for the project.

Seal Coat List: Todd explained to the Council that LL Pelling will be working in the area this spring and would like to include Springville in their lineup of towns. Springville seal coat project for FY 2014-15 has not been completed yet. LL Pelling would combine the current fiscal year project and FY 2015-16 project and allow payment to be split between the 2 fiscal years. Designation of streets to be seal coated for FY 2015-16 will be an agenda item at the next council meeting.

Sidewalk Program: City employees informed the council that the sidewalk program as it is currently setup is not working. Assessing repair by the "square of sidewalk" is not conducive to homeowners fixing a single square or contractors bidding several single squares in different sections of Springville. Consensus was that the program needs to be started earlier in the season with

an earlier completion date also. This will be discussed again at the April 6th council meeting.

M/b Brady, 2nd/b Hoyt approving **Resolution #11-2015: A Resolution** Adopting FY 2015-16. Roll call vote, Sindelar absent. M/c.

M/b Merritt, 2nd/b Ralston approving the 2nd reading of Ordinance #1-2015: An Ordinance Amending the Official Zoning Map, 2001 for the City of Springville, Iowa in Accordance with Section 165.05, Changes in the Official Zoning Map (Caraway) and to waive the 3rd and final reading. Roll call vote, Sindelar absent. Motion carried. Ordinance #1-2015 is duly adopted and shall be published and posted as prescribed by Springville Code, Chapter 18.05(2): Manner of

Correspondence: Library liaison Maretta Ralston noted that Library Board President has problems with the newsletter.

Next Meeting: April 6, 2015.

M/b Hoyt, 2nd/b Merritt to adjourn at 7:48 p.m. All ayes, m/c.

19th-century cradle on loan to SAHS

The Springville Area Historical Society (SAHS) will meet Friday, April 14, at 6:30 p.m. in the SAHS building, next door to City Hall. Everyone interested in the history of Springville and the surrounding area is welcome.

At the March 10 meeting, guest Pat Denny Reid of Cedar Rapids brought a baby cradle on which had been written the names of Jesse North and Dr. John Love, possibly former owners. Jesse and Elizabeth North came to Springville from Ohio in spring 1855 with their four children, Sarah, Mary Jane, John, and Gustavus. Some or all may have slept in the cradle as babies.

Dr. Love and his wife, Alice Stone Love, had a son in 1866. Sadly, the baby died in infancy. (Alice herself died at 22.) In the following 96 years, the cradle was probably used by other Springville families. In 1962, it was found in the woodshed of Pat Reid's in-laws, William and Doris Reid. Pat and her sister-in-law refurbished it, and Pat's five children and six grandchildren all slept in it. The cradle is now on loan to SAHS.

Another unique item – an advertising poster for Worrall & Wiley Hardware – was donated by Ula Mae Covington Carpenter, a 1954 Springville High School graduate now of Seeley Lake, Mont. SAHS member Dave Kelley said the store was in business when he moved to Springville as a child in 1930.

Jean Schmidt donated a 1946 centennial history of the Springville Methodist Church, and an article about Emil "Dutch" Levsen from the Oct. 23, 2014, Anamosa Journal-Eureka. Levsen ran the Springville Creamery from 1928 to 1945. An advertising yardstick from Hunte's Furniture and Undertaking was donated by Ray Busness of Springville.

Kimball Behning distributed drafts of revised SAHS bylaws, which will be voted on at the April meeting. Historian Karen Taylor displayed copies of the 1855 plat of New Linden and the 1856 plat of Springville. They were obtained at the Linn County Recorder's Office.

Secretary Jean Schmidt discussed a membership invitation from the Iowa Museum Association. SAHS members voted to join for a one-year trial. The IMA, based in Cedar Falls, offers professional development, advocacy, and communication.

Others at the March 10 meeting were Bev Franks, president; James Crow, vice president; Doug Beard; Wes Bender; Eleanor Kelley; and Pat Rose.

Changes Ahead for Monday Club

A century ago - April 27, 1915 - Springville's Monday Club voted unanimously to join the Iowa Federation of Women's Clubs and the national organization, General Federation of Women's Clubs. The centennial heralds a fork in the road: On June 1, Monday Club will end its IFWC and GFWC affiliation.

A unanimous vote to cut ties with the state and national groups took place last September. President Peg Ewart explained, "We believe that, independent club, we will be better able carry out our goals of supporting various local causes." Another change will be a new name, as yet undecided. Under GFWC rules, Monday Club won't be able to keep its name – although it was used organization in this town; Springville's Masonic Lodge No. 139 was chartered in

A hundred years ago, some Monday Club discussion topics included important bills before the Iowa Legislature, conditions in war zones (World War I), and anniversary of President

assassination. A "Bible supper" featuring mentioned in the Bible was held in October 1915.

Over the years, the focus of the group has shifted to service projects, both in Springville and a wider area. was responsible for establishing Springville's public library in the 1940s, and it continues to support library causes. The annual summer reading program at the library is funded by Monday Club.

Some of the other current projects include domestic violence awareness and prevention, the second-grade Butterfly Program at Springville Elementary School, funding help for a planned walking/running trail in town, and an international outreach project that provided fleece blankets for Operation Smile. Monday Club has only one fund-raising project, selling cashews, pecans, and other nuts each fall.

There are presently 16 members and one associate member. Other current officers are Mary LaGrange, vice president; Carolyn Stecker, secretary; and Susan Cooper, treasurer. Meetings are held on the second Monday of September and the first Monday, October through May. No meetings are held in the summer months. Membership in Monday Club is open to all interested Springville and area women. kt

Springville Community School District Facilities Community Meeting

This past November, Springville CSD invited an independent group to do a brief study of our facilities and provide feedback as well as hold community meetings to gather input from our stakeholders. These meetings were held during the months of January & February. We want to thank all of you who attended these meetings and for sharing your thoughts!

During the February 16th Board Meeting, Duane Van Hemert and Sam Harding, from Iowa School Construction Planning Services (ISCPS) shared their unbiased assessment of the facilities and the various options that they had considered. Based on a variety of data that were consulted, along with their own assessment, they have made the recommendation to bring the student body into one, PK-12, building by adding additional classroom space to the secondary building.

To learn more about their recommendations the Board and Administration have asked Duane and Sam to share their final report and recommendations during a third community meeting. This will also be an opportunity for anyone to ask questions that they may have. Please plan to attend this meeting on April 8th, at 6:00 p.m., at the secondary school.

The board will need to consider the recommendations based on the data given through this process and hold further discussions on how to proceed in addressing the district's facility needs.


