




Lieutenant JG Andrew Lorimer, 24, of the U.S. NAVY, lost the battle with his demons on June 29, 2021. He was born on July 27, 1996, in Iowa City, IA. Lorimer most recently served as Reactor Control Assistant aboard the USS INDIANA, SSN 789, Submarine.

Lorimer attended the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, MD, graduating in 2019 with a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering and was recognized as a Distinguished Graduate. While at the Academy, he held many leadership roles, eventually becoming the Training Sargent, where he was responsible for the PT program for 4400 Midshipmen. He was subsequently commissioned as an Ensign in the U.S. NAVY. After graduation from the Academy, Lorimer attended Navy Nuclear Power School in Charleston, SC where he finished with the top of his class and earned the Personal Excellence Award. He completed his SOBC training in Groton, CT. Upon completion he assumed his responsibilities aboard the USS INDIANNA, stationed in Groton. He had a passion for serving others and his country.

Lorimer was friendly, humble, and had a sharp, sarcastic sense of humor. Friends said that while under the intense pressure and deadlines at the Academy, he had a way of calling out the elephant in the room and get everyone laughing! He had a passion for all things mechanical and enjoyed helping and spending time with his friends and family while home on leave. Lorimer enjoyed most outdoor activities, especially running and cycling and enjoyed riding RAGBRAI after his graduation in 2019. While growing up, he ran many races with his Dad and brother, and completed his first full marathon while in Charleston, in January 2020. His family honors his legacy by honoring our veterans, and respect for the flag.

He is deeply loved and tremendously missed by his family.

FIRST TEAM ALL-STATE



Oriole senior Lauren Wilson was named a first-team All-State selection by the lowa Print Sports Writers Association and Iowa Girls Coaches Association (IGCA). Wilson closing her career as not only a first-team consensus choice and one of the best basketball players in Springville history, but one of the very best in the state of lowa regardless of

class this season, and over the last four years.

Wilson finished in a tie for third in the state in scoring this past winter, regardless of class, putting in 24.5 points per game.

Wilson's point total led all of class 1A as did her 4.4 blocks per game helped guide the Springville girls back to the state

tournament for the second year in a row.

Morgan Nachazel was named to the third-team All-State by the Iowa Newspaper Association.

ALL-STATE SELECTIONS

Senior Rhenden Wagaman was selected for the 1A first-team All-State Basketball Team.

Wagaman set the Springville single-game scoring record multiple times this season


Wagaman set the Springville single-game scoring record multiple times this season topping the 40-point plateau, averaged 22.0 points per game while shooting 57-percent from the field, 38-percent from 3-point land and 77-percent from the free throw line.

The Oriole senior showed he could do it all on both ends of the floor leading a high-pressure Springville defense with 3.6 steals per game while also pulling down 5.8 rebounds with 2.8 assists.

Senior Luke Menster was a vital cog in Springville's ability to produce a sensational 19-5 overall campaign. Menster was

selected to the 1A third-team All-State Basketball Team. He was able to do anything his team needed on the floor, and off as a three-team team captain.

Menster averaged 18.4 points per game shooting 51-percent from the field overall, 369-percent from 3-point land and 72-percent from the free throw line while leading the team with 4.5 assists per game to go with 6.1 rebounds & 3.3 steals.





SPRINGVILLE STATE ARCHERY TOURNAMENT

The Springville Archery Teams once again made a huge impression a the bullseye and 3D events at the state tournament held at the Iowa State Fairgrounds in Des Moines Saturday, March 5th and Sunday March 6th.

3D Event

Springville received a third-place team showing against a 21 -team 3D field. They posted a sensational score of 1,696 in the 3D event, led by Evan Robertson who won the state title individual performance.

Three Oriole boys turned in top-10 scores in the boys' class Junior Evan Robertson (292) state title, sophomore Heber Blackmore (290) runner-up, and sophomore Slayton Straub (284) ninth in the division.

Barrett Deutsch fired a 268 for top shooter for the Springville middle school shooters. The 1,529 performance placed the middle school team 16th in a 20-team field.

Calina Olson fifth grade represented well with a score of 253 which placed as seventh among all girls in the 3D elementary event.

Bullseye Event

The Oriole high school program completed their top-5 tournament with an outstanding performance in the bullseye shoot. Their score of 3,340 secured a fourth-place showing against the 28-team field.

Kailee Jacobs (293) tied for second among all girls in the high school division and teammates Anthony Unash (291) and Evan Robertson were third and tenth in the boy's division respectively.

Springville's middle school team finished with a score of 3, 051 to place 25th against the 29-team field led by Barrett Deutsch who turned in a 278.

With a score of 257 Calina Olson was 10th amongst the the entire girls' field in the class.

March 7, 2022

The Springville City Council met in regular session March 7, 2022.

Pledge of allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm. Council members present: Bart Barner, Brad Merritt, Cindy Kilburg, Karla Blakely, and Jeff Baych. City staff present: Public Works Brandon French and City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Treva Davis was also present.

Barner made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Kilburg made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of February 21, 2022, regular meeting minutes, February 24, 2022, budget workshop minutes, and approval of bills, seconded by Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

Deputy Tindal presented the sheriff's report. 22 calls for service from 2/21/22-3/7/22. Library presented written report about the programs offered and the usage of the library stats. MSA gave a written project update. Treasurer's reports presented. Wagaman presented Clerk's report. Reminded council that she will be out of the office the week of March 14-March 18. Mayor asked Kilburg if she would spend some time researching our current yard waste site and the costs effectiveness. He mentioned that we have a joint meeting in May scheduled with the school. He would like to discuss the crossing signals. He has received three reports of cars not obeying the signs and almost hitting kids. He will also reach out to Major Colston to invite him to that meeting. Mayor asked that council get their Derecho evaluations done and bring to the next meeting. He asked Baych to work with public works to come up with an evaluation/report. He also made council aware of the CO2 pipeline that is being proposed that will go right outside the City borders. He will be getting more information on this. Barner updated council that Hwy 151 overpass meeting is a presentation only, but he will be attending a meeting in Coralville on June 14th. Blakely inquired about Springville Station's awning. Wagaman will reach out.

Mayor invited citizens with input to speak. There being no public comments, Andersen moved to business.

Mayor Andersen opened the public hearing to approve the proposed FY22 Budget Amendment at 6:24 pm. No one spoke in favor or against the proposed amendment. The office had no correspondence. Blakely made a motion to close the public hearing at 6:25 pm, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

Barner made a motion to approve Resolution 13-2022 to approve the FY22 Budget Amendment, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Blakely, Barner, Baych, Kilburg, Merritt. NAYS: None. RESOLUTION 13-2022 adopted.

Mayor Andersen opened the public hearing to vacate the West Half of Second Street South adjacent to the alley between Lot 1 and Lot 8, Block 2 at 6:27 pm. No one spoke in favor or against the proposal to vacate the West Half of Second Street. The office had no correspondence. Barner made a motion to close the public hearing at 6:28 pm, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Council discussed vacating the alley adjacent to John Ryan's property on High Ave. Merritt is concerned that the City is paying the cost to vacate this property. He thinks this should be the responsibility of Ryan. Barner explained that typically these would be seller costs and we would be considered the seller with the exception that the City is vacating and not selling. Barner made a motion to approve Resolution 14-2022, to approve vacating the West Half of Second Street South adjacent to the alley between Lot 1 and Lot 8, Block 2 seconded by Blakely, RCV: AYES: Barner, Kilburg, Blakely, Baych. NAYS: Merritt. RESOLUTION 14-2022 adopted.

Kilburg made a motion to approve Resolution 15-2022 to set a public hearing for the proposed FY23 budget on March 21, 2022, at 6 pm, seconded by Barner. RCV: Ayes: Baych, Kilburg, Barner, Merritt, Blakely. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 15-2022 adopted.**

Pay app #1 was presented for Maple Valley Tree Service who is doing the debris clean up in Big Creek. The City will be paying the costs up front and then get reimbursed by the grant and Mr. Suri. Blakely made a motion to approve

pay app #1 in the amount of \$13,600, seconded from Kilburg. All ayes. Motio carried.

Merritt made a motion to approve the tax abatement application for 709 Heat Lane, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Discussion was held on the current policy for trying to locate property pins for residents. Public works does not mind doing them, but they can't stress enou that they are not surveyors and are only locating metal in a location near whe the pins might be. Council discussed having the resident sign a waiver ackno edging that we are not surveyors and cannot guarantee what they find is the actual property pin. Barner recommends the attorney look over the waiver. Fe were discussed but instead council decided to not charge, but the service wo be done when it is convenient for public works, and they would not spend mo than probably 30 minutes looking.

Discussion was held on the current sidewalk code. Council agreed that they would like to see all new sidewalks to be 5' wide instead of 4' wide. They wou like residents and businesses clear their sidewalks of snow/ice in 24 hours instead of 48 hours. They are also looking at clarifying some of the definitions spalling. It is hard to determine a percentage of damage. Council will discuss further at the next meeting.

The next regular council meeting will be March 21, 2022, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Blakely moved to adjourn at 6:58 p.m., sec ond from Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

The Springville City Council met in regular session March 21, 2022.

Pledge of allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm. Council members pr sent: Karla Blakely, Brad Merritt, Jeff Baych, Cindy Kilburg, and Bart Barner. (staff present: Public Works Director Todd Wyman and City Clerk Dee Wagam Mikayla Larsen (FFA instructor), Ethan Hosek, Emily Anderson, and Lexi Hen nick (Central City-Springville FFA), Rich Lorimer and John Thompson (Salute the Fallen Foundation), and Treva Davis were also present.

Blakely made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

Barner made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Appro of March 7, 2022, meeting minutes and approval of bills, seconded by Baych. ayes. Motion carried.

Wyman presented written maintenance report. Mayor Andersen asked for all Derecho reports to be given to Baych. Mayor Andersen reported that the initia water study report was presented last week. He is continuing to work on gettin information on the CO2 pipeline. He is going to try to get other communities to work together on fighting it. He will also be working on the claim for trees downed by Derecho in Emmons Park. Merritt would like to see a discussion o a future agenda for a sidewalk located on 8th St between 1st Ave & Mill Ave. Barner is looking into the parking problems on Circle Drive. No other reports presented.

Mayor invited citizens with input to speak. Thompson updated council on the 5 run that is planned in honor of Andrew Lorimer on April 9^{th} . The council would like to close the street on Broadway to keep the runners safe. This will be put ε the next agenda.

Mayor Andersen opened the public hearing to approve the proposed FY23 Budget at 6:26 pm. No one spoke in favor or against the proposed FY23 Budget The office had no correspondence. Merritt made a motion to close the public hearing at 6:27 pm, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Blakely made a motion to approve Resolution 16-2022 to approve the FY23 Budget, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Merritt, Barner, Baych, Blakely. NAYS: None. RESOLUTION 16-2022 adopted.

The Central City-Springville FFA team performed their FFA Ag Issues Presenta

tion. They have made it past districts and need to present in front of five groups to move onto state.

Officer Pease presented sheriff's report. There were 6 CFS from 3/7/2022 – 3/21/2022. Council asked for extra patrol during school pick up to make sure cars are yielding for pedestrians.

Discussion was held on getting a second fuel barrel behind City Hall for fuel. There is already a diesel barrel located behind city hall. There would be an initial cost, but the office is having problems with Casey's cashing checks in a timely manner and then wanting to charge a late fee. Wyman has received some estimates from Linn Co-op and Gates Electrical to get this set up. He estimates that it will be under \$5,000. Barner made a motion to approve Wyman to purchase and set up a new fuel barrel for no more than \$5,500, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Discussion was held on the current sidewalk code. They discussed having less information in the defective sidewalk. Wagaman to get with the attorney to see what he would recommend. They will also revamp section 136.03 dealing with the removal of snow. The City will hire a company to clear sidewalks after 24 hours and bill the resident the cost plus an administrative fee. Wagaman will bring changes to next meeting. The next regular council meeting will be April 4, 2022, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Barner moved to adjourn at 7:12 p.m., second from Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.
