- Must show proof of residency (open to residents and businesses that pay for solid waste)
- Items accepted: sofas, mattresses, furniture, noncommercial appliances, windows, doors, clean metal and other large bulky items. Any small motorized equipment brought in needs to be drained of gas and oil.
- Appliances limited to (2) per residential household or business (air conditioners and water heaters are considered appliances).
- Electronics accepted: copy & fax machines, cd players, VCRs, TVs, stereos, battery backups, cell phones, computer equipment, computer cords, etc.
- If you need assistance with your items, please call City Hall at 319-854-6428.

\*\*Items not accepted: lead acid batteries, tires, railroad ties, radioactive materials, untreated medical waste, Styrofoam, any recyclable materials, pressurized tanks, and material usually deposited in garbage bags, raw construction materials (shingles, wood, concrete, re-rod, etc.), burn barrels and ash, large commercial appliances (walk-in freezers, commercial stoves, etc.) and hazardous waste items. A big thank you to everyone who participated with floats and came out to watch for our 8th annual parade! We had a great turn out this year. We even had our very own leprechaun this year!













# A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

## Two Springville 22-year-olds died in WWII debacle

Eighty years ago this April, two young Springville men lost their lives in Operation Tiger, a top-secret World War II military exercise that went terribly wrong in several ways. Even after the war had ended, years went by before the full story was revealed.

The casualties from Springville were Cpl. Marvin W. "Bud" Groves and Pvt. Arthur F. Chudzinski, both 22. They had graduated from Springville High School in 1939 and 1942, respectively. In February 1943, both enlisted in the U. S. Army. Marvin was a cook; Arthur's Army specialty isn't known.

The exercise in which they died was a rehearsal for Operation Overlord, the huge Allied invasion of France June 6, 1944 – D-Day. A beach called Slapton Sands in Devonshire, southwestern England, was used for Operation Tiger because it was similar to Utah Beach in France, where a D-Day landing was planned. Some 30,000 Army and Navy personnel were involved in the complex Tiger exercise.

In the pre-dawn darkness of April 28, 1944, Operation Tiger was a tragic scene of confusion and death. Nine German E-boats – small, fast attack vessels – detected the American operation and fired torpedoes at several of the huge landing craft, called LSTs. Fire was ignited on some LSTs, trapping men below decks. Hundreds of soldiers and sailors abandoned ship, and the frigid water of the English Channel brought death by drowning or hypothermia.

Chudzinski and Groves, members of the Army's 3206th Quartermasters Service Company, were in LST 531. Hit by a German torpedo, it sank within six minutes. Marvin and Arthur were among 424 Army and Navy personnel from LST 531 who perished.


The official death toll was 749. However, Englishman Ken Small, who spent 30 years researching every aspect of Operation Tiger, put the number of deaths at 946. (In 1988, Small and a co-author published a 243-page book, "The Forgotten Dead: Why 946 American

servicemen died off the coast of Devon in 1944.") No explanation has been found for the differing casualty numbers.

MARVIN WILLARD GROVES, called "Bud," was born near Springville March 2, 1922. His parents, Willard E. and Nellie Moore Groves, also had a daughter, Mary Pauline, two years older than Marvin. After high school, Marvin worked for the Weaver Witwer firm. Raised as a Quaker, he ignored that group's pacifism and became a soldier, to his parents' sorrow.

On July 2, 1944, a memorial service was held for Marvin Groves, conducted by the Rev. Charles Willming at the Springville Presbyterian Church. His body was later returned from England, and a graveside service took place July 23, 1944, at the Quaker Cemetery in Whittier.

ARTHUR F. CHUDZINSKI was born Jan. 8, 1922, near Marion. His mother, Louisa Wieneke Chudzinski, died 13 days after his birth. Louisa's husband, Herman G. Chudzinski, was left with his newborn son; another

son, Victor, about 11; and his middle child, Lillian. It is not known whether Herman remarried.

Arthur's body was not recovered. A memorial service took place Aug. 18, 1944, at St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Marion. Arthur's name is commemorated at Cambridge American Cemetery in Croton, England; St. Paul's Cathedral, London; and Utah Beach in Normandy, France.

#### Marvin Groves had a fiancée in Iowa

The engagement of Edith Louise Hagerman of Marion to Marvin "Bud" Groves, Springville, was announced in November 1943 by Edith's parents, George R. and Selma Quaas Hagerman. Marvin was stationed at Camp Pickett, Va., with the Army.

Just five months later, death ended the wedding plans. Marvin was killed in Operation Tiger off the coast of Devonshire in southwest England. On Sept. 3, 1949, Edith married Dean H. Lockwood. Two daughters, Jane and Brenda, were born to them, Dean, an Army veteran, had been stationed in Somerset, England, when Operation Tiger took place.

At 62, Edith died in Cedar Rapids June 6, 1985 – the 41st anniversary of D-Day. Her husband had been in the D-Day invasion with the Third Armored (Spearhead) Division.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Makenna Hollandsworth, Karla Blakely, Jeff Baych, and Cindy Kilburg. Bart Barner was absent. City staff present: Public Works Director Todd Wyman, City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Andrew Inhelder (MSA) and Jim Koppenhaver were also in attendance.

Baych made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Blakely made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of February 19, 2024, meeting minutes, February 21, 2024, meeting minutes, and claims, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report, Engineer's Report, Library Report, Public Works Report, and Clerk Report. Baych updated the council on the State Archery Tournament. This was the first year that the elementary had a team participate and they got 10<sup>th</sup> place at state. One of the middle school kids received first place and was awarded a \$1,500 scholarship. The high school team placed 11<sup>th</sup> out of 28 teams. He explained that archery does not have classes like the other sports, so our teams are competing against much larger schools. Baych also let the other council members know that him, Kilburg, Mayor and Wagaman have all met with the Eagle Point (solar company), and they have got some good information on the program and where our facilities might benefit from having solar power. This will be coming to the council very soon.

Mayor Andersen invited citizens with input to speak. Jim Koppenhaver asked if the arch in the entryway of the cemetery can be painted. It appears that the paint is starting to peel. There being no further public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Inhelder presented two options from the IDOT for 5<sup>th</sup> St. S. The IDOT is still trying to figure out how to tie that street into the overpass. The council discussed both options and favored the 90 degrees turn instead of the curve, but they also wanted to see how much property would be disturbed in the park. Inhelder will see if he can get a bit more information from the IDOT and get the plan overlayed on Emmons Park. The council also discussed the curb and gutter and a sidewalk on the east side of 5<sup>th</sup> Street.

Kilburg made a motion to move the Monday, March 18, 2024, meeting to Wednesday, March 20, 2024, seconded by Hollandsworth. All ayes. Motion carried.

The council discussed the damaged pole on the corner of Mill Ave. and Broadway St. Wyman and Baych looked at Upper Butler Park and have a suggestion where to get a couple of poles/lights added that would also allow for there to be electricity in the park. They were all in favor of removing the light permanently from its current location. Baych made a motion to grant Mayor authority to spend up to \$1,000 on discontinuing the current light on the northeast corner of Mill Ave. and Broadway St., seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

The council discussed the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). Wyman had created a list from the previous CIP and the council added to the list. They will continue to brainstorm for projects and equipment purchases then they will start to put costs to it and prioritize the list.

The next regular council meeting will be Wednesday, March 20, 2024, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. Council members present: Bart Barner, Makenna Hollandsworth, Jeff Baych, and Cindy Kilburg. Karla Blakely was absent. City staff present: Public Works Director Todd Wyman, City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Maggie Berger (Speer Financial), Jim Holz and Sarah Fosbinder (MSA) were also in attendance.

Baych made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

Barner made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of March 4, 2024, meeting minutes, and claims, seconded by Hollandsworth. All ayes. Motion carried.

No reports were presented.

Maggie introduced herself to the council. She is the city's financial advisor. She presented a PowerPoint of several funding options for putting in infrastructure to the proposed development south of Hwy 151. Blakely entered the meeting at 5:38 p.m. Maggie discussed the importance of fund balances and talked about all the different funds that a city utilizes. She then talked about the General Obligation Bonds (GO Bonds). These are debts that can be used for all essential city services and can be paid back by property taxes. She talked about using Utility Revenue bonds/notes. These must be paid back by rates, not property taxes. There are also State Revolving Funds (SRF), but these can only be used for utility infrastructure projects not related to development. She ended with a discussion about Tax Increment Financing (TIF). The city has lots of options for helping to get the infrastructure for the development, but at the moment we are on hold until the property owner can present a plan. MSA presented a timeline of getting infrastructure to the property, but very vague. This would be the best-case scenario once the utilities are requested. Several questions were asked.

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, April 1, 2024, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There will be a special council meeting Monday, April 1, 2024, at 5:30 p.m. at City Hall to hold a public hearing for the proposed tax levy.

There being no further discussion, Baych moved to adjourn at 6:59 p.m., seconded by Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.
