Yard Waste Site to be closed from August 7th –August 14th

Due to the upcoming Fun Days and tractor pull, our yard waste site will be closed beginning August 7th and reopen sometime on August 15th. We thank you in advance for your patience and cooperation.

WE NEED YOUR HELP!

There has been an increase in thefts and break-ins in our community. We all need to work together to get this to stop. Even if you don't think anything is missing or it doesn't seem like a big deal. The only way to make this stop is for us to work together to fight this. The sheriff's office has department has asked that we get the citizens to call and don't hesitate.

PROTECT YOUR PROPERTY

A really simple way to help protect your property is to keep your cars and garages locked. Another really simple trick is to take a picture of your belongings in your garage. Especially those bigger items with serial numbers. Just take your camera and take a picture of all the serial numbers on your tools or equipment, then put that SD card in your safe or a safe place. If something comes up missing, the police department has a much better case to build or a better chance at recovering your stolen merchandise.

Changes to your UTILITY BILLING

**Effective July 1, 2016.
Will show on your August bill.**

Increasing Rates- the rate for gallons of **Water** used over the 2000 gallon minimum will increase from .00375 to .00496 cents per gallon. The rate for gallons of **Sewer** used over the 2000 gallon minimum will increase from .004 to .005 cents per gallon. The fee for **Yard Waste/Recycling** will increase from \$8.25 to \$9.25 per month.

Late Penalties-A \$15.00 late fee will be assessed to any bill not paid by the due date. This is a once a month only charge for late bills, with a once a year forgiveness. Also, any utility bill not paid by the shut off date will have service discontinued unless prior arrangements are made with the City Council. If service is disconnected there is a reconnect fee of \$50 during business hours and \$150 after business hours (7:30 AM-4:00 PM).

Springville Garbage Services

One (1) garbage tag must be attached to EVERY bag or can (40lb limit per can or bag). Service day is Wednesday. Please set out all garbage and recycling the night before or before 5AM on Wednesday.

Recyclable Items

- Paper - newspaper with inserts, office paper, phone books, junk mail and magazines
- Corrugated cardboard and chipboard - unwaxed, broken down and tied in bundles; smaller than 4'x4'
- Plastic - MOST plastic containers with recycle symbols (number included), numbers 1 thru 7, EXCEPT 6
- Tin and Aluminum Cans - all food and beverage containers

All Items Must Be Clean

- Motor Oil needs to be in a clear plastic container with a screw on lid and set next to garbage. Glass, plastic bags and styrofoam products go in the garbage

DO YOU REMEMBER WHEN...

White family had 11 boys, no girls

In April 1849, Hosea and Elizabeth White moved to Springville from West Point in southeast Iowa. With them were three little boys: Marcus, 6; Julius 2; and Albert, 6 months. In the next 20 years, eight more baby boys arrived. Hosea had 11 sons, but no daughters.

The oldest two were sons of Hosea's first wife, Mary Ann Hudson. She died in Lee County after giving birth to Julius in March 1847. In December of that year, Hosea married Elizabeth "Libby" Green – a stepmother at age 18. Libby's older stepson, Marcus, served in the Civil War; her youngest son, Antrim, was born three years after the war ended.

The shoemaker's trade that Hosea had learned as a youth in Stanstead Plain, Quebec, came in handy. Farming was his main occupation in Brown Township (east of Springville), but he also kept all 11 sons in boots and shoes.

Today, no known descendants of Hosea White live in the Springville area. Once grown, his 11 sons scattered – to western Iowa and to Idaho, Oregon, Texas, and California. The Golden State attracted seven White brothers – five to Sacramento, two to Pasadena.

The group included a doctor, two lawyers, a miner, two hardware dealers, a railroad bridge contractor, and a railroad fireman and mechanic who later became a rancher. One brother owned a creamery in Paton, Iowa (Greene County) until moving to Texas in the early 1900s to farm.

Only one stayed in Iowa all his life. Julius, the second-oldest, farmed near Rolfe (Pocahontas County) and lived to 98. He married Josephine Oxley of Linn County, and their 73rd wedding anniversary was Jan. 7, 1942. It was also Josephine's 91st birthday.

Frank (Benjamin Franklin White) lived only 45 years. After about 20 years in California, he returned to Iowa before his death in June 1900. He is buried in the Springville Cemetery, as is his brother Oscar, who died at 57 in January 1909.

Other family members interred at Springville are Frank and Oscar's sister-in-law, Nellie Stewart White (second wife of brother Ralph); baby Edwin White, son of Ralph and his first wife, Lucinda Fox White; and Hosea and Elizabeth, who died in 1901 and 1919. *(Thanks to the Rev. Anna Mae Peck of Vermillion, S. D., for research assistance. kt)*

Marcus Hudson White, born in 1843, and Julius White, 1847, were sons of Hosea and Mary Ann Hudson White. Hosea and his second wife, Elizabeth Green White, had Albert G., born in 1848; Clinton Lemuel, 1850; Oscar S., 1851; George Eli, 1853; Benjamin Franklin "Frank," 1855; Ralph, 1859; Lincoln, 1862; Charles Green, 1864; and Antrim Lester, 1868. The last survivor was Antrim, who died 62 years ago, in March 1954.

New Methodist minister in town

Pastor Sue-Ellen Sherman, who officially began serving the Springville United Methodist Church July 1, preached here for the first time June 26. She succeeds John Keizer, who retired in June after 16 years at Springville. He and his wife Judy now live in Sterling, Neb. Pastor Sherman also serves Martelle United Methodist Church.

Originally from Oxford, Iowa, the new pastor previously served the Morning Sun and Oakville United Methodist churches in Louisa County. She is a graduate of William Penn College, Oskaloosa, and St. Paul School of Theology, Kansas City, Mo. Her husband Brian is also a minister.

Pastor Sherman is the 54th Methodist minister

in Springville in 170 years. The first was Joel B. Taylor in 1846; he preached in the log schoolhouse on the south side. He was a circuit rider, traveling on horseback to several other locations as well. Taylor died in 1881 at age 64 while serving at Epworth, Iowa.



Barber shop changes hands

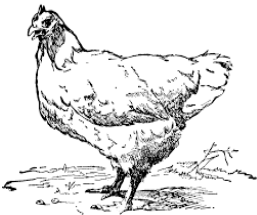
From the Springville New Era of March 3, 1927: "John Reilly, who operated a barber shop in the Butler Apartments Building, sold his interests to A. C. Rodman of Monticello, who took possession last week. Mr. and Mrs. Reilly returned to Geneseo, Illinois, where Mr. Reilly will be employed at his trade."

Background: Alva Charles Rodman (1904-1992) was 23 when he came to Springville. No one called him Alva; he was "Roddy." He married Monica Arduser. The Butler Apartment building once housed the Exchange Bank and the home of bank founder Joseph S. Butler. Dating from about 1880, it stood where the Springville Co-Op Telephone Co. is today.

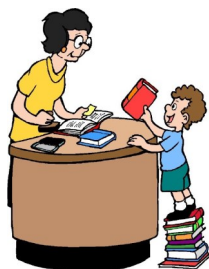
Poultry prohibited

From Revised Ordinances of the Town of Springville, 1915:
"Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Springville: That chickens, ducks, geese, and turkeys and all poultry are hereby prohibited from running at large within the limits of this town . . . Any fowls or poultry found running at large off the premises of the owner may be distrained (*seized*) and placed in the custody of the marshal, who shall at once notify the owner . . ."

People could get their wandering chickens, etc., back by paying 10 cents per bird, plus the expenses of keeping and feeding the poultry while detained.

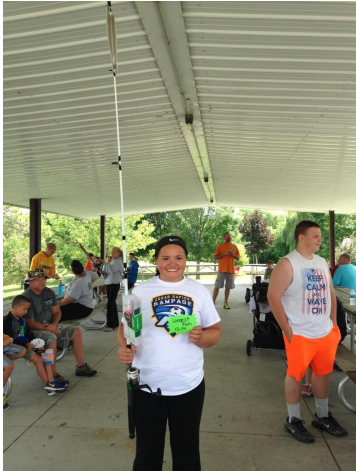
Oriole Gold Cards Are Here

M/B Ralston, to approve the consent agenda, 2nd/B Merritt, all ayes, M/C.

Mayor Shebetka – There has been several break ins and thefts in town, please keep things locked up, the Sheriff's office is working on this, with several leads.

Councilman Merritt- The town is looking very nice, please continue to keep your homes and properties cleaned up and in a presentable condition.

Dale Miner addressed the council on parking campers and trailers along streets. He would like the council to consider a permit system that would allow campers to seasonally be parked along streets. The council will talk with citizens and address opinions and findings at a later meeting. Joe and Matt with MSA were unable to attend. A few key questions asked about the grant process at a prior meeting - you can now apply quarterly for this grant and the LMI study is good for 3 years. If we bid and start a project, we cannot apply for the grant to cover this project. Also, some discussion on the State Revolving Fund, it is a lower interest rate, but with specific guidelines including American Made Steel Act and Prevailing Wage. MSA will set up a tour of some local lift stations to assist with choices to be made on design and equipment. Todd Wyman presented the Maintenance Department Report, highlights- mowed the lagoon, met with engineers over utility maps, met with MSA for sewer plan, met with engineers on 5th street reconstruction, poured more walls for salt shed. Todd has contacted Connolly Construction, some work needs done at a neighboring home to the Creek stabilization Project on grade and seeding. Todd to check with them when the barriers from Creek project can be removed. The surveyors were here for the easement at 256 Broadway, just waiting on results. Discussion on drainage problem at 203 Broadway, the engineers have written up three options and price estimates. Homeowner will be invited to the next council meeting to attempt to advance this project. Alliant has trimmed the 2 dead or dying trees in Upper Butler Park. The Council wishes for the Parks Board to decide on the next step. M/C Ralston, to approve spending up to \$500 for erection of Activity Board in front of City Hall, 2nd/B Hoyt, all ayes, M/C. Discussion on document management systems, council would like to see 3 options. Discussion on CIP projects, conclusion that the Sewer upgrades are priority. Open Forum for Public Discussion of Capital Improvement Projects(CIP)-

Mayor opened discussion on Capital Improvement Projects. There are 2 primary projects the council is looking at, a Sewer Improvement Project and 5th Street Reconstruction Project. The Sewer Improvement would include lining of existing Sanitary Sewer lines, and the 5th Street Reconstruction is a 2 phase project starting at 1st Avenue and concluding at 5th Avenue. The Sewer Project has an estimated cost of \$793,000, and the first phase of 5th Street (from 1st Avenue to the north side of the Bridge on 5th street) has a cost estimate of \$1,300,000. The CIP cash flow is an approximate \$500,000 cash on hand, with annual revenues from LOST and other funding sources of approximately \$236,000. This would allow for borrowing of a loan up to \$2,100,000. There would be no taxes levied for these projects if costs are at these levels. Loan payments would be made with future LOST and other fund revenues. Interest rate projection of less than 2.5%. There is a CDBG grant for the Sanitary Sewer Improvement. Very competitive grant, submitted quarterly. There was a past phone conference with the permit division of the IDNR. The DNR can restrict and mandate a city on Sanitary Sewer maintenance and repair. During the phone conference, the DNR was impressed with our proactive approach. The Council and Mayor are asking for citizen input. Please contact any of the Councilperson, Mayor, or call city hall with your comments. The hopes are to make decisions on what projects to pursue within the next month.
