# DO YOU REMEMBER WHEN... Local men served in 'Roosevelt's Tree Army'

The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) was part of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal in the Great Depression. Nicknamed "Roosevelt's Tree Army," it carried out conservation and natural resources projects in rural lands owned by federal, state, and local governments.

From 1933 to 1942, the CCC provided work for single men in their late teens and early 20s. Each member received food, shelter, clothing, and \$30 a month, of which \$25 was sent directly to his parents. (In 1933, \$5 had the buying power of \$92 today, according to DollarTimes.)

The Great Depression lasted from 1929 to 1939 (some say longer). For the majority of today's population, lacking firsthand memories of this bleak time, the hardship is difficult to imagine. Unemployment rates peaked above 25 percent in 1933, and remained above 14 percent into the 1940s. Many farmers lost their farms.

At least four local men, all alumni of Springville High School, were in the CCC. They were Loren B. "Bucky" Brown and Clair C. "Kye" Carnahan, both 1930 SHS graduates; J. Paul Ewart, 1934; and Ray D. McNeilly, 1926. There probably were others as well.

**Bucky Brown** was born in 1912 to J. Willis and Jennie Reed Brown. The CCC sent him to Thornton, Ark., in 1933. A former member of Roy Schwab's band, Bucky had his CCC job and also played trumpet in a dance band. He met Virginia "Jimmie" Louise Rigotti of nearby

# A lodge named Mystic Toilers

A lodge called Mystic Toilers began in Springville Jan. 9, 1901. It was a chapter of a national group that had started two years earlier to provide both socializing and life insurance. The Springville lodge, organized by Jacob J. Dewald, had 44 charter members, 28 men and 16 women.

Noah L. Bolton, 40, was president; David L. Johnston, 40 vice president; Mamie Hossler, 18 secretary; and Minnie Wagner, about 25, treasurer. (Johnston died in 1907, leaving his wife Nettie to raise two small children, Lee Andrew "Andy" Johnston and Frieda Johnston, later Mrs. Alexander Taylor.)

Among other Mystic Toilers were Dr. George W. Gearhart, local physician, and Orrin E. Crane, owner and editor of the Springville New Era. How long this lodge existed in Springville is not known. The national organization changed its name to Liberty Life Insurance Company in 1919.

Bucky and Jimmie married June 20, 1935, in Fordyce, and lived in Springville. They had two sons: Fred, now of Decorah, and Joe, of Springville and Pharr, Texas. Bucky was Springville's mayor from 1954 through 1959, 1962 to 1965, and Jan. 1, 1980, until his death Oct. 11, 1981. Jimmie, a cook in the school hot lunch program, died in 1992.

**Kye Carnahan**'s parents were Jesse W. and Reba Mae Benton Carnahan. The dates and location of his CCC service are unknown. Born in 1911, he married Fav Josephine Pherrin in 1938.

are unknown. Born in 1911, he married Fay Josephine Pherrin in 1938. They were parents of Joe and Steve Carnahan of Springville, and the late Nancy Brown, who lived at Dayton, Texas. Fay died in 1994, Kye in 1998.

**Paul Ewart** was born in 1915 to Jacob and Anna Paul Ewart. He joined the CCC with his first cousin, Harrison D. Paul of Marion, who was the same age. They worked at Backbone State Park in Delaware County, three miles south of Strawberry Point. Among other structures, they helped build a dam on the Maquoketa River.

Paul Ewart and Maurita E. Hoffman were married March 9, 1938. They farmed on Burr Oaks Road west of Springville. Paul died in 1986, Maurita in 2016. Their children are Willard Ewart and Mickie Benesh, both of Springville; and Paula Bachman, Marion.

**Ray D. McNeilly** was born in 1908 in Jones County to William and Rilla Duncan McNeilly. Nothing is known about his CCC service. He married Margaret *(maiden name unknown)*. In 1940, they lived at Bancroft in Kossuth County. Patricia, Margaret Jo, Ray Jr, and David are their children. Ray Sr. died in 1993 at Roswell, N. M.

# 1930 permits for out-of-staters

*From the Cedar Rapids Gazette-Republican, March 30, 1930:* "A sticker in the form of a yellow ear of corn, bearing in red letters the words, 'Guest of Iowa,' is the official guest motorist's permit for 1930 just received by (the) Linn County Treasurer . . . for issuance to car owners of other states.

"The stickers . . . (are) a convenience to tourists spending a few days or more in Iowa." Visiting motorists, said the article, "will not be bothered about purchasing a new license as long as the permit is effective." With a sticker on the windshield, tourists could avoid "explaining their status to inspectors or police officers checking on car registration."

# "The Treva Davis Children's Center"

The Springville Memorial Library Board of Trustees chose to approve the renaming of our children's area, to honor a long time library volunteer and board member. The reading and play areas, previously an unnamed section, will now be known as "The Treva Davis Children's Center". Treva, who came to Springville in 1972 as the school librarian until 2010. She has been a long time champion of all things library. She has been a board trustee since 1981, and served as the President of the board, for many, many years. Her passion for the library was a driving force in the long quest to fund and build a new library - something that was achieved just twelve years ago, when our current building opened its doors. During that move, the first books to be moved, by Treva herself, were the children's books. Reading to the little ones is one of her favorite things to do - and she has inspired and encouraged hundreds of children to pursue the joy of reading during her time in Springville. There is no more fitting section to bear her name, and no one more worthy of having that special designation, than "Mrs. Davis, The Library Lady" We are grateful to her for her decades of support and hard work in building and maintaining a library our community can be very proud of. #### Meningococcal Vaccine School Requirement For students entering 7th and 12th Grades for the 2017-18 School Year

The lowa Department of Public Health, along with its community healthcare partners, is issuing new instructions regarding mandatory vaccines for students enrolling in 7th and 12th grades for the 2017-18 school year. Those students must be fully vaccinated against meningococcal disease in order to attend school next year.

Linn County health care providers are united in this initiative to keep our children and young adults protected from meningococcal infection.

Families of students should contact their healthcare provider for an appointment to receive the required vaccine. Those vaccinations may take place now, or at any time prior to the beginning of the school year, and completed immunization forms can be turned in to the school nurse's office.

The meningococcal vaccine protects against serious and sometimes deadly diseases, such as meningitis (an infection of the lining of the brain and spinal cord) and sepsis (blood infections). The vaccine is administered as a shot.

Requirements for the 2017-18 school year:

- One does of meningococcal vaccine for students who will be in 7th grade (if born after Sept. 15, 2004). If the child had the first dose on or after the age of 10, then another dose is not required until he/she is 16 years old.
- One dose of meningococcal vaccine for students who will be in 12th grade (if born after Sept. 15, 1999). If the student had the vaccine on or after the age of 16, then another dose is not required.

By law, students who are not up-to-date will not be allowed to attend school or participate in school activities until they are vaccinated.

- Players at the headboard will alternate pitching bags until each player has pitched all (4) of his/her bags.
- Players must pitch all (4) cornhole bags from their designated cornhole pitchers box.
- · Players must not cross the foul line with their feet before the bag has landed.
- Each bag on the box = 1 point. Each bag in the hole = 3 points. Cancellation scoring will be used.
- Any bags touching the ground or "bounced" onto the box do not count and are to be removed prior to the next bag being thrown by the opposing team.

Lyle Andersen and Susan Cooper described upset children, pets and vets due to excessive use of fireworks across several days and nights. Debris and disruption of the peace were also commented on.
