Mayor's Minutes

"Be kind. Even on your bad days."

It has been a busy summer here in Springville. A lot of exciting changes are happening around our community. The most noticeable is the 5th Street project. Things will really start to look different very soon. We realize that there have been several inconveniences, especially for those residents who are living in the construction zone. Your patience has been appreciated. They are expected to start the paving the first week of August. It might have even been done by the time this goes to print.

We have all been getting used to our new solid waste/recycling program. There have been some bumps and bruises along the way, but with communication, we will get it all figured out. The hardest part has been just to remember to get our garbage out on Monday night.

Our new emergency sirens are expected to be installed in early August. We have one working now, but the two new ones will have so much more capabilities than our old ones had, it will be a great improvement.

Your City Council is working hard to improve our community to make it better for all our residents.



2018-2019 Water/Sewer, Solid & Yard Waste Rates

Ordinance 1-2018 was adopted by the Springville City Council on May 21, 2018.

Water Rates: Water service shall be furnished at the following rates within the City:

1. Meter Rates. Service provided through meters shall be charged as follows:
 - A. First 2,000 gallons used per month @ \$14.84 (minimum charge);
 - B. All usage over 2,000 gallons per month @ \$7.42 per 1,000 gallons or part thereof.
2. Bulk Rates. Water used for commercial purposes from the pump, at the tower, or from hydrants or hoses shall be paid for at the rate of \$6.00 per 1,000 gallons.
3. Automatic Increase. Water rates shall automatically increase three percent (3%) thereafter on July 1 annually starting July 1, 2019, unless such increase is waived or modified by resolution of the Council prior to the effective date of this increase.

Sewer Rates: There shall be and there are hereby established sewer service charges for the use of and for the service supplied by the municipal sanitary sewer utility based upon the amount and rate of water consumed, as follows:

1. First 2,000 gallons or lesser amount @ \$17.50 per month (minimum charge).
2. All usage over 2,000 gallons per month @ \$8.75 per 1,000 gallons (service charge).
3. Sewer rates shall automatically increase three percent (3%) thereafter on July 1 annually starting July 1, 2019, unless such increase is waived or modified by resolution of the Council prior to the effective date of this increase.

Solid Waste and Yard Waste Disposal:

1. Recycling. The fee for the collection of recyclables is \$5.25 per month for single-family residential premises only.
2. Yard Waste Disposal. The regular fee for the maintenance and use of the yard waste disposal site is \$4.25 per month. This yard waste fee will be charged to each single-family dwelling within the city.
3. Garbage. The fee for the collection of garbage is \$7.50 per month for single-family residential premises only.

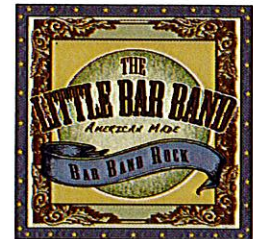

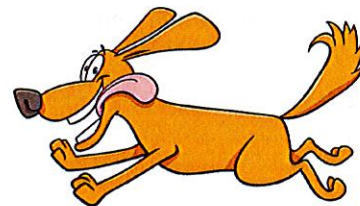


American Legion Auxiliary

A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

Christman's store did business in Springville for 94 years

In 1860, brothers Peter Jr. and Augustus Christman came to Springville from Dubuque and opened a general store. A third brother, John, joined them in 1863. Later the first two returned to Dubuque, but John remained in Springville.

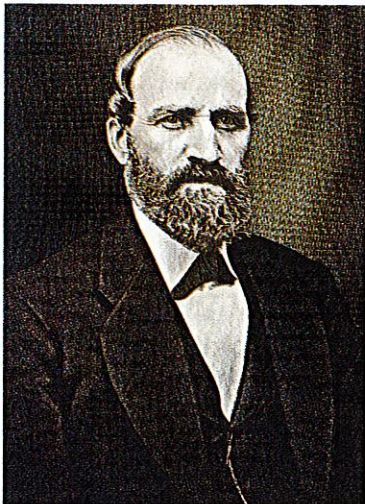
John's son, Leonard "Len," ran the store from the 1889 to 1941, changing it to hardware in 1914 or earlier. It was on the east side of Broadway, a bit north of today's Post Office.

Len was 7 when his parents came to Springville with him and two sisters, Maggie, 3, and Cecilia, 1. Two little boys had died in Dubuque. Four children were born in Springville: Frank, Fannie, Jacob, and Anna.

Besides being a merchant, John Christman was an early depot agent for the Dubuque and South Western Railroad. In 1870, he built a 25,000-bushel grain elevator and a large warehouse.

In 1878, the Linn County History reported Christman "has amassed a handsome fortune." He was a general dealer in merchandise, lumber, stock, and grain, and had "an elegant residence." Later, he owned several farms and town properties.

AT CHINON, FRANCE, John Christman was born Jan. 23, 1826, to Peter Sr. and Margaret Dietz Christman. Emigrating in 1831, Christmans lived one year in New Jersey and five in Pennsylvania.

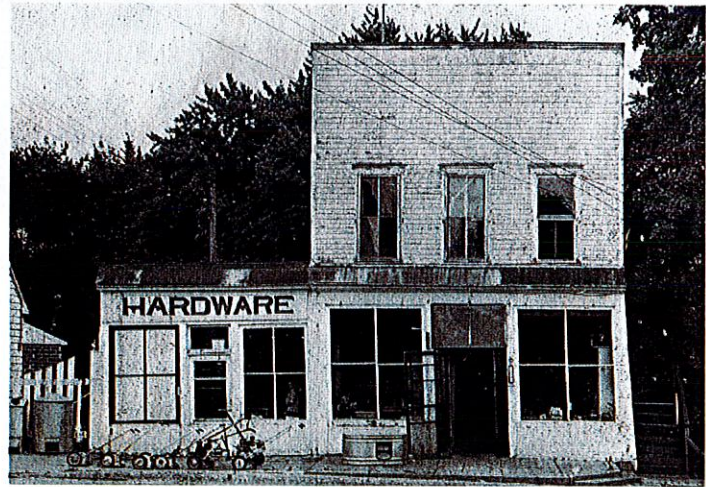

CHRISTMAN'S HARDWARE Store was a Springville institution. Paul Nielsen, 90, of rural Springville recalls Len Christman's Saturday night card games in the store. Paul's father, Pete Nielsen (1892-1971), was one of the regulars.

PETER CHRISTMAN, older brother of John, was a merchant in Springville from 1860 to 1870. He, Anson Jones, and Joseph S. Butler registered Jones and Company's addition to Springville June 13, 1866.

CHINON, FRANCE, birthplace of John Christman, is linked with Joan of Arc. In March 1429, the teenaged religious warrior met there with the future French king, Charles VII.



Christman's Hardware Store was razed in 1954. This photo was taken near its end. It was built about 1862.

In 1837, they moved to Sherrill's Mount, near Dubuque.

John married 22-year-old Elizabeth Berg Aug. 8, 1852, in Dubuque. Born in Mainz, Germany, she came to Pennsylvania at age 5 and moved to Iowa at 20.

The couple's son Len began working at the store as a teen. In summer 1876, he stayed home while his parents went to Philadelphia for the Centennial Exposition (World's Fair). It celebrated 100 years of U.S. independence.

On June 9, 1880, Len married Anna Knowlton near New Sharon, Iowa. They had no children, but raised Len's niece, (Jennie) Marie Peck. Marie was 7 when she lost her mother.

JOHN CHRISTMAN was in Springville 26 years; he died Oct. 26, 1889, at 63. Elizabeth was 85 at her death Nov 3, 1915. They are buried in the Springville Cemetery.

Len's wife died in 1920; he survived her by nearly 21 years. After his death at 85, his sister, Anna Hann, ran Christman's Hardware four years. In 1945, Hillis Gill bought the business. Gill sold it in December 1953 to the Springville Co-Op Elevator Co. The inventory was auctioned July 10, 1954. Two days later, one of Springville's oldest buildings was razed.

TORY OF SPRINGVILLE, IOWA

Reunion drew 18 veterans of Company H, 24th Iowa Infantry

Eighteen aging members of Company H, 24th Iowa Infantry, gaze sternly from a reunion photo taken at least 113 years ago. The stories they could have told! The last one, **William Hugh Brown**, died in April 1936 at age 93.

The picture was in a trunk owned by Bert Gibson, son of one of the veterans, **Benjamin Gibson**. Bert gave the trunk to his former tenants, Erwin and Georgia Andersen, parents of Janice Crow. Her husband James is president of the Springville Area Historical Society.

The undated photo was taken in 1905 or earlier. Veteran **William M. Giffen**, 68, died April 3, 1906. Born in Danville, Pa., he came to Iowa in 1856 at age 18. He was taken prisoner at the Battle of Champion Hill May 16, 1863.

The 24th Iowa Infantry was called the Iowa Temperance Regiment. Its members adhered to temperance principles (no alcohol). The regiment was mustered at Camp Strong near Muscatine Sept. 18, 1862, and served until July 1865. Seventy-five men were lost in action or as a result of battle wounds, and 209 members succumbed to disease.

There are no native Iowans in the photo. Nine of the veterans were born in Ohio, three each in Indiana and New York, two in Pennsylvania, and one, **George Bolton**, in the part of Virginia that broke away in 1861 to form West Virginia.

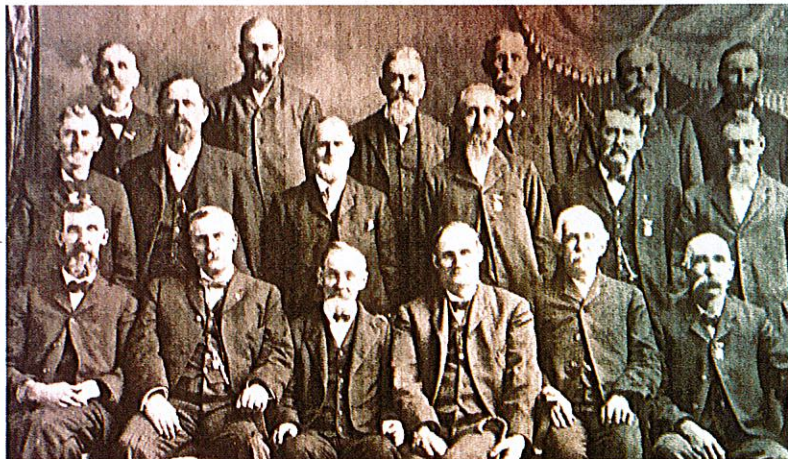
One man used two surnames. As **Anson R. Hodgkins**, he enlisted in 1862, and later received a pension. Yet the photo gives his name as **Hotchkiss**, as does his grave marker in Lakeview Cemetery, South Haven, Mich. No explanation is known.

James Pryor Oxley's wife Frances, about 22, died in Iowa April 8, 1863, while her husband was fighting in Mississippi. Their daughter Luella was 22 months old. James was seriously wounded in the Battle of Champion Hill, Miss. He remarried in 1868.

When veteran **William Glover** died at Marion in October 1915, four of his Company H comrades in the reunion photo were pallbearers: **Thomas C. Brown**, **William Goodlove**, **James P. Oxley**, and **William Pherrin**.

Glover's obituary stated that he served three years in Company H, "part of that time in Salisbury prison (N.C.), a vile and reeking enclosure which was a disgrace to the confederacy." (The paper did not use a capital "C.")

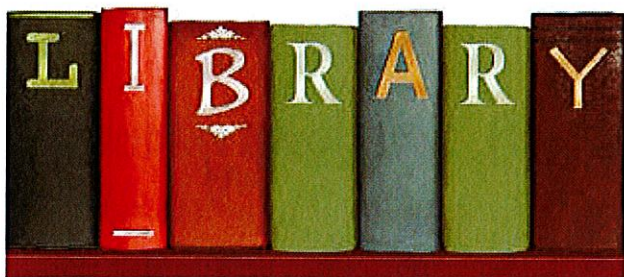

1881: Springville's first election

The six trustees (Council members) were John Christman, Hiram Winans, J. W. Freeman, Byron Hopper, C. D. Little, and Benjamin F. Willard.

The polls opened at 9 a.m. and closed at 4 p.m. John T. Hambleton and Edwin D. Jones were clerks of election; John Christman, George Durno, and J. W. Freeman were judges of election.

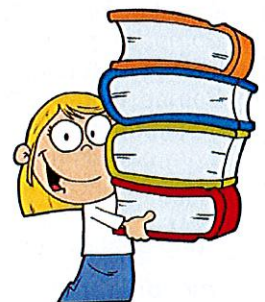

City Council Regular Meeting

July 9, 2018

The pledge of allegiance was recited to begin the meeting. The Springville City Council met in regular session in the Springville Council Chambers on July 9, 2018. Mayor Shebetka called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Dennis Thies, Brad Merritt, Jeff Grimley, Lyle Andersen, and Mareta Ralston. City Staff present: Public Works Supervisor Todd Wyman and Interim City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Guests: Jean Menster, Treva Davis, Ryan Hosch of MSA, and Brent Oleson of the Linn County Board of Supervisors.

Andersen made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of agenda, June 18, 2018 minutes, Bills, renewal-Class C Beer Permit (BC), Class B Native Wine Permit, and Class E Liquor License (LE) w/Sunday Sales for Casey's General Store #2811, 605 6th St. S, effective September 4, 2018, Approve Outdoor Alcohol Service for Springville Tractor Pullers, Inc, 162 JR Barnes Parkway, effective August 10, 2018, second from Merritt. Motion carried.

Mayor Shebetka invited Citizens with input to speak. Brent Oleson of the Linn County Board of Supervisors came to let the city know that as of January 2019, the Board of Supervisors will be going from five to three members. Linn County will now be divided into three zones, Cedar Rapids, Hiawatha and Robins will be split into two zones and Marion along with the rest of Linn County will be a third zone. Oleson will oversee our area. He shared his contact information with all the council.

Davis of the Library Board presented the council with a letter asking to transfer the board's leftover FY17-18 Budget money to the Library Cash Trust. This money will be used for the library's ongoing light project. Andersen made a motion to allow the Library Board to transfer FY17-18 budget money in the amount of \$4,051.00 to the Library Cash Trust second from Thies. Motion carried.

Wagaman presented the council with a letter from the Springville Fire Department asking to transfer the department's left over FY17-18 budget money to the Fire Department Cash Trust. This money will be used for the purchase of a new defibrillator or put aside for a new fire truck. Grimley made a motion to allow the Fire Department to transfer FY17-18 budget money in the amount of \$9,959.76 to the Fire Department Cash Trust second from Thies. Motion carried.

Hosch of MSA presented the payment application #3 for the Sanitary Sewer Project. Andersen made a motion to approve payout #3 in the amount of \$172,851.55 second from Merritt. Motion carried.

Hosch of MSA presented the Draw Request from the CDBG Grant. Merritt made a motion to approve the draw request from the CDBG Grant totaling \$64,349 second from Thies. Motion carried.

Hosch of MSA presented the Draw Request from the SRF Loan. Andersen made a motion to approve the draw request from the SRF Loan in the amount of \$114,396.85 second from Ralston. Motion carried.

Hosch of MSA updated the council on the Sanitary Sewer project and presented change order #1. During the construction meeting on June 29, 2018 it was discussed and determined by Mayor and Public Works supervisor that since the contractor could not guarantee substantial completion by August 10, 2018 that they would move the start date for the lift station to August 13, 2018. Grimley made a motion to accept Change Order #1 to move the substantial completion date from October 6, 2018 to November 16,

2018 and the ready for final payment date from November 5, 2018 to May 31, 2019 second from Andersen. Motion carried.

Hosch of MSA presented change order #2. This change is due to the water main not being where it was drawn out. The sewer line also had a major curve which was unexpected. The contractor is asking for an additional \$5,943.43. The council has requested Hosch to get a more thorough break down of the charges before they will approve this change order.

Mayor Shebetka recommended that the council act to disband the Cemetery Committee. There is nothing in our Ordinance that describes this committee currently. He recommended that all cemetery business come in front of the Council as an agenda item. Ralston made a motion to disband the Cemetery Committee and to bring all cemetery business directly to the Council second from Merritt. Andersen abstained from vote. Motion carried.

Andersen made a motion to have Jason Drymon do the grave openings in the Springville Cemetery second from Thies. Motion carried.

Andersen presented to council the need to require urn vaults in the Springville Cemetery for all those being cremated. This will protect the urn when there is a second opening or if there is a request to move the cremains. This will be brought to council at another meeting to act on.

Wyman gave an update on the 5th Street project. The surface removal will begin July 11, 2018 with the paving expected to begin July 23, 2018. Would like to see the old Kubota mower get moved by a sealed bid auction.

Wagaman gave an update on current position. Mainly time being spent getting line items to match FY18-19 budget to get entered into accounting system.

Shebetka updated the council on the Emergency Sirens. They are expected to be here the second week of August. Also updated the council on the Quarry Easements. He asked the council to have a special meeting on July 16, 2018 to act on these easements. Dollar General is waiting for the Quarry's annexation application to be accepted so that theirs can also be accepted.

Andersen talked about the fireworks that were set off on July 7, 2018. He felt that we could have communicated to the community better that a Fireworks Permit was pulled and would be happening.

There being no further discussion, Andersen moved to adjourn at 7:25 p.m., second from Thies. Motion carried.

City Council Special Meeting

July 16, 2018

The pledge of allegiance was recited to begin the meeting. The Springville City Council met in a special session in the Springville Council Chambers on July 16, 2018. Discussion was held on the parking situation on 1st Ave. The Springville Council is concerned with people parking on the travel portioned of 1st Ave. This topic will be brought up on the next meeting for letters to be possibly be sent out. They have requested that Wyman, Public Works Supervisor research the cost of signage and how many signs it might take.

Grimley presented RESOLUTION #45-2018 approving FY17-18 Cemetery budget money of \$7,257.31 to be carried over to FY18-19 budget, second from Ralston. RCV: All AYES. Thies absent. **RESOLUTION #45-2018 adopted.**

Ralston presented RESOLUTION #46-2018 accepting a bid from Urb Besler in the amount of \$14,070 for cemetery road construction, second from Merritt. RCV: All AYES. Thies absent. **RESOLUTION #46-2018 adopted.**
