City Council Elections

The City Council term is for four years. The terms for Council Members Mareta Ralston, Brad Merritt, and Dennis Thies are up December 31, 2019. To hold office in a city, a candidate must meet the same qualifications required to vote and be a resident of the city they plan to serve. For the 2019 election cycle, the filing period is August 26, 2019 to September 19, 2019. Anyone wishing to have their name on the ballot to serve on the City Council must



complete two forms and submit them to the County Auditor during this filing period. The two forms are an Affidavit of Candidacy, which must be completed by the candidate and signed in the presence of a notary, and a Nomination Petition, which must contain the signatures of at least ten eligible voters. These forms are available from the city clerk, from any courthouse in lowa or from the Secretary of State website https://sos.iowa.gov/elections/electioninfo/cityelections.html. The election will be held on Tuesday, November 5, 2019.

WATER/SEWER RATES:

The council voted to keep water/sewer rates the same as fiscal year 19. However, they voted to add a \$1.50 debt service relief fee. This fee will be a new charge on your utility bills. It is not affected by the amount of water you use. It is a set \$1.50 fee. This fee can and will only be used to help pay the water/sewer debt. You will see this new fee on your July 2019 utility bill. If you have any questions about this new charge please call City Hall at 319-854-6428.



A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

At age 25, newlywed Ettie Gregg's life was tragically cut short

In the summer of 1899, within less than six weeks, Mary Etta "Ettie" Hagler married Fred W. Gregg, celebrated her 25th birthday, and died in a terrible accident at Springville.

Ettie and Fred's June 27 wedding was in Eureka Township, Sac County, Iowa – probably at her parents' farm home. On July 31, Ettie turned 25 in Springville, where her pharmacist husband owned a drug store.

At 7:30 a.m. Aug. 5, Ettie accidentally spilled a can of carbolic acid while removing it from the gasoline cook stove. The liquid ignited, her clothing caught fire, and she was critically burned. She died at 5 p.m. the same day.

Fred Gregg had placed carbolic acid crystals on the stove to melt. Before antibiotics, diluted carbolic acid was used to disinfect wounds, especially deep ones such as nail punctures.

Ettie was buried in Galva Township Cemetery (East), Ida County – just across the county line from where she had been married. Born in Van Buren County in 1874, she was the seventh of J. Marion and Sarah Price Hagler's nine children.

Fred was born in 1869 to Elijah and Polly Barkley Gregg in Linn County. His grandparents were Caleb and Millicent Doudna Gregg. In 1894, Fred graduated from Northwestern University School of Pharmacy.

A few years after losing Ettie, Fred left Springville and became a salesman for a Chicago chemical company. On Sept. 27, 1909, he remarried. Marie Louisa Robinson, his second wife, was born in 1874 in Oxford, Ontario, Canada.

Before 1920, the couple moved to California, where Fred sold pharmaceuticals. The 1920 census found them renting a house at 1743 W. 24th St., Los Angeles. By 1930, they owned the home, and had a "radio set" and two lodgers.

Apparently Fred and Marie Gregg had no children. In the 1940 census, they were still at the same Los Angeles address. Fred was then 71, Marie 66.

Fred Gregg was widowed a second time by Marie's death May 1, 1955. When Fred himself died Nov. 9, 1959, Ettie had been gone for over 60 years. Aug. 5, 2019, marks the 120th anniversary of her death.

SECOND GASOLINE STOVE FATALITY IN 1901

Two years after Ettie Gregg's death, Mary James Palmer of Springville died from an accident while filling a gasoline stove.

The Springville New Era praised her "great presence of mind" for running – in burning clothes – to a stock watering tank. (Sadly, running was a poor idea.)

Mrs. Palmer, 32, died eight days later, on Aug. 24, 1901, leaving her husband, John H. Palmer, and three children: Lavenia, 12; John Franklin, 7; and Samuel "Sam," 2. She was born in Cornwall, England, and came to the U.S. when she was about 2.

FRED GREGG (1869-1909) was a nephew of Mary Ellen Gregg Copping, who was featured in last month's Springville News.

Jacob and Mary McShane bought a Linn Township hill in 1854

McShane Hill is in Linn Township, two and a half miles south of Springville. Jacob "Jake" McShane came to Linn County, Iowa, about 1850 and married Mary Willyard. Both were natives of Fayette County in southwestern Pennsylvania.

On Nov. 11, 1854, the couple bought 120 acres in Section 9, Linn Township, with the hill that now bears their name. Previous owners were John and Mary Fetters Miser, and Jonathan and Dorcas Wilson Paul.

Jake and Mary's log cabin was on the south side of the hill; the exact location has been lost. Ten McShane children were born from 1852 to '68. Alice, Lowell, Henry, Emma, John, Porter, twins Charles and Frank, and Eveline lived to adulthood. Baby Sarah died.

The same year that Jake and Mary bought their farm, a one-room frame school was built near the crest of the hill. Opened in late 1854, it was called McShane School or Sand Ridge School. The first teacher was Mr. Lane.

At an unknown date, the McShanes built a new house on the hilltop, east of the 1854 school and on today's Martelle Road. By then, a newer school was in use half a mile to the north. Jake and his friends used the old one as a poker retreat.

Mary McShane abhorred gambling. Learning of the "man cave," she set out to retrieve Jake. Finding the door locked, she went at it with an axe. Poker players fled through the windows. (If poker games ever resumed, the location would have been kept very quiet!)

Jake, 82, died on McShane Hill June 1, 1907. Mary continued to live there with her son Porter "Port," a bachelor. On March 19, 1908, fire started by a stove mishap destroyed the home. Mary and Port got out safely. The house was rebuilt by Port's brother, John McShane.

In January 1909, Port married at 46 and moved to a nearby farm with his bride Alma, 22. A year later, Mary McShane died. The house on McShane Hill became a summer home for John and Port's widowed sister, Alice Starry.

Baptist Church founded on McShane Hill

Six women and four men founded the Simmons Creek Baptist Church Feb. 23, 1856, in the McShane/Sand Ridge School on McShane Hill. Jake McShane joined it in 1858. His wife Mary was also a Baptist.

Church founders were Henry Bennett, Catharine Detrich, Rebecca Keenan (later Mrs. Oliver Yeisley), Trajan and Mary Palmer, Almira Sammons (later Mrs. David Whitlatch), Franklin Smith, Cordelia Spencer, and Jesse and A. M. Turner.

Alice gave visiting nieces and nephews a buffalo nickel, a ginger snap, and a kiss on the back of the neck. "I thought she was checking to see if my neck was clean!" said the late Aubrey McShane. He was the fifth of Port's six children.

John McShane's son Kenneth married Gladys Hindman in 1937. They moved to the house on the hill in 1947. Their daughters, Barbara Colehour and Carole Hoskins, were the last McShane children to grow up on McShane Hill.

In 1966, Victor and Marlene Pittman moved to the house on McShane Hill with their four children. Marlene died in 2002. Vic has been there 53 years; his son Dave currently lives with him. Almost 165 years have gone by since Jake and Mary McShane bought the property.

The Springville City Council met in regular session in the Springville Council Chambers on July 1, 2019. Mayor Shebetka called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Brad Merritt, Lyle Andersen, Jeff Grimley, and Mareta Ralston. Absent: Dennis Thies. City Staff present: Public Works Director Todd Wyman, and City Clerk/Treasurer Dee Wagaman. Guests: Susan Cooper, Teresa Pilipovic, John Lemon, and Treva Davis.

Andersen made a motion to approve the agenda as written, second from Grimley. All ayes. Motion carried.

Andersen made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of June 13, 2019 minutes, Approval of June 17, 2019 minutes, and Approval of bills, second from Merritt. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mayor Shebetka invited citizens with input to speak. There being no comments from citizens, Mayor Shebetka moved to business.

Sheriff Tindal presented the Linn County Sheriff's report. There were 41 calls for service between 6/17/19-7/1/19.

Andersen presented Resolution 115-2019, a Resolution to allow the Springville library to keep \$5,930 of the FY19 revenue to be used for library improvements in FY20, second from Merritt. RCV: AYES: Merritt, Andersen, Grimley, and Ralston. NAYS: None. ABSENT: Thies. **RESOLUTION 115-2019 adopted.**

Andersen presented Resolution 116-2019, a Resolution to allow the Springville parks to keep \$23,281 of their unspent FY19 budget to be used for the Emmons Park Project. If this project does not happen, the money will be transferred back to General Fund, second from Merritt. RCV: AYES: Merritt, Andersen, Grimley, and Ralston. NAYS: None. ABSENT: Thies. RESOLUTION 116-2019 adopted.

Council discussed the design contract for Emmons Park Project from Shive Hattery. They felt like they should get public input before moving forward. Clerk directed to find a date and get a meeting set up with Shive Hattery, Parks, Tyson Jacobi, Council and the public.

Andersen presented Resolution 117-2019, a Resolution to approve a twomile split at 1297 Marion Airport Rd, second from Ralston. RCV. AYES: Merritt, Grimley, Andersen, and Ralston. NAYS: None. ABSENT: Thies. RESOLUTION 117-2019 adopted.

Ralston made a motion to accept Lena Gilbert's resignation from the Planning & Zoning Commission, second from Merritt. All ayes. Motion carried.

Discussion was held on the 6th St. & 1st Ave intersection. There is an existing pole in front of the Springville Station that Alliant can add a light to at no initial cost, just the monthly cost of usage. Alliant can also add a streetlight to the SE corner of the intersection for \$500 plus the monthly cost of usage. Council will continue to work on this intersection.

Discussion on Heather Lane drainage was tabled.

Wagaman presented the fiscal year end transfers that need to be made from certain accounts. Andersen presented Resolution 118-2019, a Resolution to transfer \$56,609.90 from Employee Benefits to General Fund, \$19,175.76 from Emergency Fund to General Fund, \$70,000 from Sewer Capital Project fund to Sewer Debt Fund, \$9,146.34 from Water fund to Water Debt, and \$10,000 from the Water fund to the Water Tower Maintenance Fund, second from Grimley. RCV. AYES: Merritt, Grimley, Andersen, and Ralston. NAYS: None. ABSENT: Thies. **RESOLUTION 118-2019 adopted.**

Discussion was held on our current grass/weed code. Our current code is 12" and many feel that is too long. Several surrounding cities use 8". Wagaman explained that it is hard to enforce because our Ordinance states that we

must notify the resident in writing by certified mail. This is at a cost of \$10/ per letter. The City has to give the resident 10-14 days to rectify the situation. The clerk will research what other communities are doing. This topic will be brought back up at a future meeting.

Public Works presented report. They were very busy with the storm damage. The water tower maintenance has begun. Hope to have water at full pressure in 10-14 days. The extra projects are near complete. They are behind with the summer projects due to the weather, but working hard on the clear days to get caught up.

Clerk presented report. The office just completed month end, quarter end and fiscal year end. The sign up at the 151 intersection has been weeded and taken care of. Clerk will get bids for continual maintenance. Wagaman also brought to the attention to the council about how to proceed with residents who seem to take a lot of time and are not satisfied with the solutions the office and public works provide. Almost two hours was spent on a low priority situation that was handled, but not to this resident's satisfaction so it was followed up by a call from the sheriff's office and an email to our attorney. Wagaman stated that customer service is something she takes pride in, but that is too much time spent on minor things. The mayor has offered to step in and take care of these situations.

Mayor thanked the City staff and the football program for their hard work on Amnesty Day. Wyman added that Karl from Wapsi Waste did an amazing job in helping us.

The next regular council meeting will be July 15, 2019 at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Andersen moved to adjourn at 7:05 p.m., second from Ralston. All ayes. Motion carried.

City Council Public Meeting

June 13, 2019

The pledge of allegiance was recited to begin the meeting.

The Springville City Council met in a public session in the Springville Council Chambers on July 10, 2019. Mayor Shebetka called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Brad Merritt, Lyle Andersen, and Mareta Ralston. Dennis Thies and Jeff Grimley were absent. City Staff present: Public Works Director Todd Wyman, and City Clerk/Treasurer Dee Wagaman. Tyson Jacobi of SEDC and Justin Campbell of Shive-Hattery were also present. Several community members were present.

Andersen made a motion to approve the agenda as written, second from Merritt. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mayor Shebetka thanked the community for taking the time to come and voice their opinions. He turned the meeting over to Tyson Jacobi.

Jacobi explained to the citizens that the SEDC has gone to several conventions, trainings, they have met with engineers and developers. They have all said that same thing about brining economic development to our community; there needs to be amenities, parks, a vibrant downtown, and trails. Campbell of Shive-Hattery helped come up with the concept for the Emmons Park Project. Mayor Shebetka opened the meeting up for the public's input.

Several of the neighboring property owners spoke about having a parking lot in their back yards. They were not pleased about this concept. They would like to see the parking lot moved to another location of the project. They were concerned with the noise, the litter and people driving in their yards. Campbell will take a look at this concept and see what they can do about move the location. Most of this research will have to come after the City approves them to do the design work so that they can get elevations and boundaries.

Al Woods understands the parking situation and the thoughts from the neighbors. He feels it would be great if the concept could work in another location, but he thinks this is great for the community and the development

and growth of Springville. He is excited to see that the community is moving forward towards growth. He sees this project as a win/win. He also explained that the sports seasons are short and a small portion of the entire project.

There was concern at who would be maintaining the property. Council assured the citizens that it would be continued to be maintained by the City just as it is now. There were questions about the size of the diamonds and soccer/football fields. The diamonds would be ASO regulation and the soccer/football fields would be sized as they are currently for the youth.

Questions were asked about how this project was going to be funded. Jacobi explained that the project would cost about \$450,000. Gretchen Eastman and himself have been applying for several grants and are continuing to apply for others. They would not start this project until all funds are received.

The next regular council meeting will be July 15, 2019 at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Andersen moved to adjourn at 6:50 p.m., second from Ralston. All ayes. Motion carried.
