



# EMMONS PARK PROJECT

The Springville Parks Board is still moving forward with the trail project in our community. The trail in Cox Pond Park is used all the time, and the board would like to eventually connect trails throughout the community. The next phase will be to develop Emmons Park. For those of you who might not know where Emmons Park is, it is behind the water tower just off 5th Street S. This project will include two eight foot ADA compliant walking trails. One phase of this project will create a walking trail through a wooded area that will give many an opportunity to get closer to nature. School kids will have the opportunity to do an organized fitness program along with an area for science and environmental education in a safe and accessible space. This project will also include restrooms, a pavilion, and concession stand. There will be an area for a playground and future ball diamonds, soccer fields, and flag football fields. It also includes a parking lot to help make attending events in the park safer and more convenient. This will be a great place to have family events, youth events or to just walk among nature on a paved trail.

This project will be funded by monies set aside in the Park Trust from fundraising over several years, grants, and community donations. COVID-19 has slowed down the fundraising events, but efforts are continuing to be made. ## A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

### 13 Bolton children were born over 40-year span

Abraham Bolton, called Abram, was born in Rockingham County, Va., June 11, 1814. His parents, Abram Sr. and Rosanna, moved to Harrison County (now part of West Virginia) when he was 2. Musically talented, Abram Jr. took music instruction as a young man. He taught singing schools in the winter, and did farm work the rest of the year.

On Feb. 23, 1837, Abram Jr. married Nancy Campbell, and they moved to Indiana. Six children were born in Posey Township, Fayette County: Sarah, Noah, Mariah, William, John, and Anderville.

The Boltons relocated to Linn County, Iowa, in September 1849. They bought 160 acres in Brown Township (Section 33) and 40 in Linn Township (Section 6). Bolton Manor Road is the border between the two townships.

Two more children, Mary and Henry, were born in 1851 and '55. Then 40-year-old Nancy Bolton died Feb. 9, 1857. Just four days later, her son Noah died at 17. The cause of their deaths is unknown.

In March 1859, Abram returned to Virginia and married Nancy Linville. Between February 1860 and October 1862, she gave birth to Rosanna, the second Noah, and George. George was 6 months old when his mother died April 19, 1863. She was 33.

More than seven years later, Abram married a third time on Dec. 3, 1870. Susanna Kearns Stewart's first husband, James J. Stewart, died in the Civil War. Abram became stepfather to four Stewart children, ages 9 through 16.

Susanna and Abram had two daughters – Ida in May 1872, Delilah "Dellia" in July 1878. In 1871 or '72 (sources differ), the Boltons' log cabin was replaced by a large, two-story brick house, still standing at 673 Bolton Manor Road.

Abram Bolton died Feb. 8, 1898, having lived in Linn County over 48 of his 84 years. Susanna, 70, died in June 1901. Abram, his three wives, and two teenaged Bolton children (the first Noah and Delilah) are baried in Paralta Cemetery.

Abram Bolton (1814-1898)


#### Where did Bolton children go as adults?

Two of Abram Bolton's children died in their teens. The other 11 lived in Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, Montana, Oregon, and California as adults. Some lived in more than one state.

John Bolton resided in Montana eight years before returning to Springville. His brother Anderville left Missouri after his first wife died, and farmed near Center Point, Iowa. George Bolton farmed in Brown Township, his half brother Henry in Linn Township.

Abram's youngest child, twice-married Ida Bolton Hudson Weldon, moved farther away than any of her siblings. She went from Paralta to Des Moines to Los Angeles County, Calif. Abram outlived five of his children, and none of the others equaled his age, 83. Classest was Noah, 80, who died at Cottage Grove, Ore., in 1941.

Brown monument restoration: gratitude to donors

After more than six years of planning and fundraising, Springville's badly deteriorated Nathan Brown monument in the town cemetery will soon be restored. Work on the \$43,000 project is expected to begin about the middle of August.

"The Nathan Brown Monument Restoration Committee extends a sincere thank you to all individuals, businesses, and groups whose donations have made this restoration possible," said Bev Franks, committee member. She belongs to the Springville Area Historical Society (SAHS) and Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR).

Over the past 25 years or so, many cracks have formed in the zinc ("white bronze") monument and its base, making it fragile and unstable. The original plan, placing the shaft on the ground while installing a new base, is now too risky. Instead, the shaft will be lifted off the base and supported vertically in a temporary structure.


Memorials by Michel, a Solon firm, is doing the restoration. Coonrod Wrecker and Crane Service will move and reset the monument shaft, working from outside the cemetery fence. The new base will be black marble quarried in Vermont. A public rededication ceremony is planned for September 11 at 1 PM at the cemetery; a reception will follow in the SAHS building downtown


The monument, installed in 1886, honors Revolutionary War veteran Nathan Brown. He and his family arrived near the future site of Springville May 17, 1839. Brown and his son Horace farmed 80 acres about a mile southwest of town, in Section 32 of Brown Township. The township was named in Nathan's honor in 1841.

Nathan Brown, 80, died Nov. 25, 1842. Also interred in the Brown plot are Nathan's second wife, Tamar, who died in 1867; their son Horace and his second wife, Julia; four (possibly five) of Julia's relatives; and Irish native Patrick "Paddy" Killen, who worked for the Brown family over 30 years.

Nathan Brown was born in Westchester County, N. Y. near the Connecticut border. After the Revolutionary War and before coming to Iowa, he lived in Onondaga County and Buffalo, N. Y.; Erie County, Pa.; and Geneva, Ill.


#### Library is in Phase Two of the re-opening plan

# United States Census 2020

#### THERE IS STILL TIME TO BE COUNTED

Did you know the U.S. Census Bureau data helps determine how billions of dollars in federal funding flow into states and communities each year?

By April 1, 2020, every home will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census. You will have three options for responding:

- 1. Online.
- 2. By phone.
- 3. By mail.

\*\*The 2020 Census marks the first time you'll have the option to respond online. You can even respond on your mobile device.

If you live in the United States, you are required by law to complete the 2020 Census.

You may already notice census takers in your neighborhood. This is a normal part of preparations for the 2020 Census.

#### **Avoiding Scams Online:**

The Census Bureau will never ask for:

- · Your Social Security number.
- · Your bank account or credit card numbers.
- Money or donations.

#### Staying Safe at Home:

- Check for a valid ID badge, with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date.
- If you still have questions about their identity, call 800 -923-8282 to speak with a local Census Bureau representative.

#### **WATER/SEWER RATES:**

You will see an increase in your water/sewer rates for the fiscal year 20-21. The water rates will increase by 2% and the sewer rates will increase by 4%. The debt service relief fee will increase to \$5.75. For a minimum usage user you will see an overall monthly increase of \$5.25. For users that use approximately 5,500 gallons, you will see ap-

proximately a \$7.35 increase to your bill. These new rates will show on your September 2020 utility bill. If you have any questions please call City Hall at 319-854-6428.

There being no further discussion, Merritt moved to adjourn at 4:03 p.m., second from Andersen. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mayor Shebetka invited citizens with input to speak. There being no comments from citizens, Mayor Shebetka moved to business.

Mayor Shebetka opened to public hearing pertaining to the requirement of fences around pools at 6:03 p.m. There being no comments for or against the proposed change to eliminate the requirement of fences around pools, Merritt made a motion to close the public hearing at 6:04 p.m., second from Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried. Andersen made a motion to approve the first reading of Ordinance 6-

2020, an ordinance to remove the requirement to have a fence around personal pools, second from Barner. RCV: AYES: Barner, Merritt, Grimley, Andersen, and Blakely. NAYS: None.

Blake of 608 5th Ave received a nuisance letter regarding owning chickens. He requested a hearing in front of the council. Harkin presented results from a survey she took on Facebook. Lengthy discussion held. Council would like to hear from more of the community on this topic and would like clerk to research the possibility of Marion to inspect. Council will not move forward with abatement process until more information is gathered.

Andersen made a motion to appoint Tina Allsup to the Library for a 6-year term, second from Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Blakely made a motion to appoint Ryan Sweet to the Parks Board for a 2-year term, second from Grimley. All ayes. Motion carried.

Wagaman discussed with the council that white she is at training, the Deputy Clerk would like to use some vacation hours. The office will make sure that phone calls are responded to in a reasonable time. Council approved of shortened hours July 24-July 29.

Discussion held about the Ordinance the County passed pertaining to ATV/UTVs. Council would like to get the City code to match the County code. They will work on the code and bring to a public hearing. ATVs/UTVs will need to register with the state starting January 2021.

Clerk presented a bid from ECICOG to get inspections on dangerous structures. Andersen made a motion to approve a contract with ECICOG for \$375 to inspect a structure on High Ave, second from Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Clerk discussed some information she received from a web-based time keeping system. Council thought this would be a good and affordable option. Council will move forward with writing policies for a time clock.

Andersen made a motion to approve a bid from D & D Tree Service for \$725 up to \$3,250, second from Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Barner made a motion to approve a bid from Besler Construction in the amount of \$4,270 to construct curb and gutter on Liberty Ave, second from Grimley. All ayes. Motion carried.

Linn County Sheriff's report presented via email. There were 28 calls for service between 6/15/2020-7/6/2020.

Wagaman presented treasurer/clerk report.

Andersen spoke to the mess from fireworks over the weekend. He also brought to the council the possibility to share cost to pave the road into the cemetery with the Linn Coop. Andersen will get figures and present to Linn Coop and bring back to council.

The next regular council meeting will be July 20, 2020 at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Blakely moved to adjourn at 7:52 p.m., second from Grimley. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mayor Shebetka called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Brad Merritt, Lyle Andersen, Bart Barner, Karla Blakely, and Jeff Grimley (via conference call). City staff present: Public Works Director Todd Wyman and City Clerk/ Treasurer Dee Wagaman. Guests present: Jim Holtz and Ryan Hosch of MSA and Bill & Todd Nulle.

Andersen made a motion to approve the agenda, second from Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Andersen made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of July 6, 2020 minutes and approval of bills, second from Merritt. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mayor Shebetka invited citizens with input to speak. There being no comments from citizens, Mayor Shebetka moved to business.

Clerk's office received a comment from the public regarding the proposed change to eliminate the requirement of fences around pools. It was suggested to require proof of insurance. Wagaman presented to City attorney and he was under the same opinion that just because you require insurance does not mean the homeowner will still have insurance at the time of the incident. Blakely suggested that the community is educated about doing the right thing to protect their property and inform their insurance company. Andersen made a motion to approve the second reading of Ordinance 6-2020, an ordinance to remove the requirement to have a fence around personal pools, second from Barner. RCV: AYES: Barner, Merritt, Grimley, Andersen, and Blakely. Andersen made a motion to adopt Ordinance 6-2020, second from Barner. RCV: AYES: Barner, Merritt, Grimley, Andersen, and Blakely. ORDINANCE 6-2020 adopted.

The City has been awarded a \$10,000 grant from the lowa Economic Development Authority for a Rural Housing Assessment. Blakely made a motion to approve the grant agreement, second from Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

Grimley made a motion to approve the contract with MSA and Central City for the Central City and Springville Housing Study, second from Andersen. All ayes. Motion carried.

Andersen made a motion to approve the program fee agreement with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach for the Rural Housing Readiness Assessment, second from Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Todd & Bill Nulle discussed their dislike of the City taking the yard waste to their neighboring farm. IDNR came and inspected and the City is ok to continue doing what they are, just need to change the period and make sure the yard waste is being mixed in the ground in a timely fashion. City will continue to look for cost effective options to keep the City yard waste site open to residents.

Merritt made a motion to refer the annexation request for the McShane property to P & Z for review, second from Andersen. All ayes. Motion carried.

Andersen made a motion to get Shoemaker & Haaland involved in the annexation process, second from Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Discussion held on web based time keeping system. Wyman would like a policy in place before the time system implemented. Wagaman recommended having a mandatory meeting so all employees/council/mayor understand all the policies. Council thought this would be a good and affordable option and would like to see it get started. Andersen made a motion to approve signing a contract with SwipeClock, second from Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

Barner made a motion to approve a bid from MAKA Blind for \$765 for blinds in the Council Chambers, second from Andersen. All ayes. Motion carried.

Linn County Sheriff's report presented via email. There were 11 calls for service between 7/6/2020-7/20/2020.

Wyman presented maintenance report.

Wagaman presented clerk report.

Andersen updated council on EMA Siren meeting. Our siren by the football field is down 2-3 amps. It is under warranty and will be looked at.

The next regular council meeting will be August 3, 2020 at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Blakely moved to adjourn at 7:16 p.m., second from Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.
