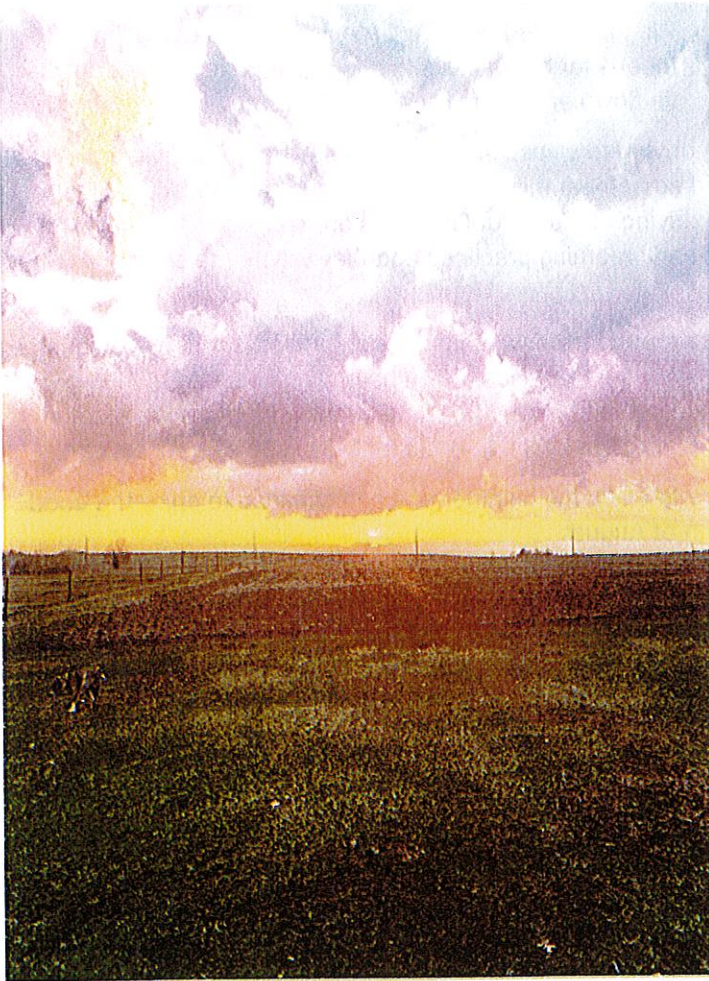

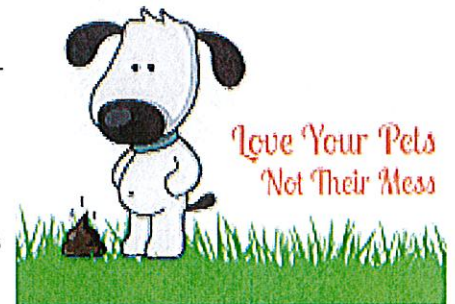
I hope you have been able to enjoy the summer and can continue to enjoy the good weather through the month of August.

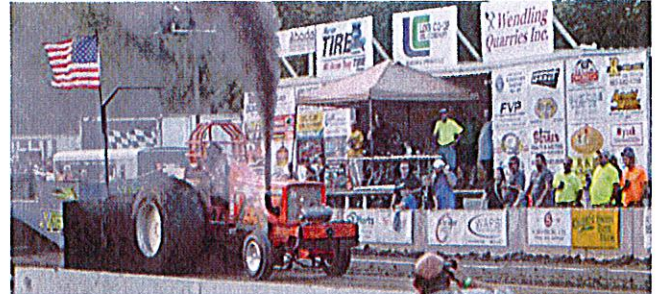

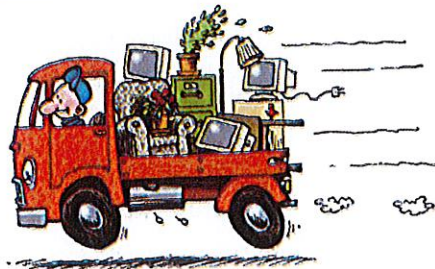

- Items accepted: sofas, mattresses, furniture, non-commercial appliances, windows, doors, and other large bulky items. Any small motorized equipment brought in needs to be drained of gas and oil.
- Appliances limited to (2) per residential household or business (air conditioners and water heaters are considered appliances).
- Electronics accepted: copy & fax machines, cd players, VCRs, TVs, stereos, battery backups, cell phones, computer equipment, computer cords, etc.
- If you need assistance with your items, please call City Hall at 319-854-6428.

****Items not accepted:** lead acid batteries, tires, railroad ties, radioactive materials, untreated medical waste, Styrofoam, any recyclable materials, pressurized tanks, and material usually deposited in garbage bags, raw construction materials (shingles, wood, concrete, re-rod, etc.), burn barrels and ash, large commercial appliances (walk-in freezers, commercial stoves, etc.) and hazardous waste items. WATER/SEWER RATE INCREASE

A Public Hearing was held Monday, June 20, 2022 at 6:27 p.m. to amend chapters 92 & 99 to increase water and sewer rates. The council is raising the water base rate charge 3%, adding a water debt service fee of \$3.30/mo., increasing the sewer debt fee by \$1.50/month, but decreasing the sewer base rate by \$1.50. Each resident who uses both water and sewer will see a \$3.76 increase in their bills.



A STROLL THROUGH THE HI

Yeisleys have been in Linn Township for 183 years

Orland Yeisley, 82, lives south of Springville in a brick house his family has owned since 1888. It's in Linn Township, Linn County, where the name Yeisley goes back even farther. On November 19, 1839, Orland's great-grandfather, George Adam Yeisley; his red-haired wife, Nancy Deal Yeisley; and their son Oliver, 15 months, arrived in a covered wagon from Ashland County, Ohio.

They set up a winter camp in Section 21 of the township, planning to head west to "Oregon Country" in the spring. But George, a farmer, discovered the rich black soil of Iowa Territory, and there they stayed. The land was not yet for sale, so George made a squatter's claim on 160 acres. When he bought it from the government a few years

later, the deed was signed by Martin Van Buren, eighth president of the U. S.

Between 1840 and 1860, nine more Yeisley children were born: Catherine "Kate," Josiah "Little Joe," Elizabeth Jane, (Cinthia) Ann, Salena, Mary Ethelinda, George Leander, John Frederick Elmer "El," and (Rebecca) May. Sadly Elizabeth died at age 2 and Salena shortly before her sixth birthday. Orland has an 1855 letter saying Salena died of "the bleuks," a term unknown today.

Of the eight Yeisley children who reached adulthood, two sons and two daughters married. February 22, 1888, was the wedding day of George L. Yeisley and Miranda Paul. Eight days earlier, the groom had bought the brick

house where Orland lives today. It was built in the latter 1870s by George House, a native of Maryland.

George L. and Miranda Yeisley had two children — Bertha, who married Irwin Penn, and Ivan Paul, the father of six sons: Orland, Jim, and Steve of Springville; Mervin, Cedar Rapids; and Paul and Phillip, deceased. Their mother was Elizabeth Holubar Yeisley.

OLIVER LEFT WIFE, CHILDREN. One day about 1878 (the exact year is unknown), Oliver walked to Lisbon to sell a cow. Then he disappeared, leaving his wife, Rebecca Keenan Yeisley, to raise their four children, ages about 5 through 12: J. William, Mary Ellen "Ella," Harley and Hugh. Other Yeisleys helped with expenses.

For some 20 years, the family didn't know where Oliver was, or even whether he was alive. Then a neighbor went to Northern California and — supposedly by chance — ran into the missing man at Camptonville, a very small place in Yuba County, about 70 miles west of Reno, Nev.

Returning to Iowa, the neighbor told the Yeisley family about Oliver. Brother Joe Yeisley went to California to bring the lost sheep home. By then, Oliver's children were grown up, and his wife did not welcome him. After living in the home of his bachelor brother El, Oliver died August 30, 1913. His grave is in Mount Zion Cemetery, between Springville and Mount Vernon.

February 5, 1904, at age 92. Nancy had been gone since 1896; they were married 59 years.

In 1948, when Orland was a child, he watched his mother and Lauretta Campbell of Paralta wallpaper the kitchen of the George A. Yeisley cabin. It was then about 108 years old. The women wanted it to look nice for Yeisley newlyweds, whose first home it was going to be.

On June 8, 1948, Retta May Kemp from Marion and Arthur “Art” Yeisley were married. Art was a great-grandson of pioneer George A. Yeisley, a grandson of Oliver Yeisley, and a son of Harley Yeisley. Harley was about 7 when his father, Oliver, disappeared. How long the cabin stood is unknown; it may have been razed in the 1950s.

Yeisley rifle has a long history

A muzzle-loading rifle that pioneer George A. Yeisley brought to Iowa in a covered wagon is now in its fourth generation of Yeisley ownership. The exact age isn’t known, but it wasn’t new when Yeisley acquired it in 1839, a gift from his brother.

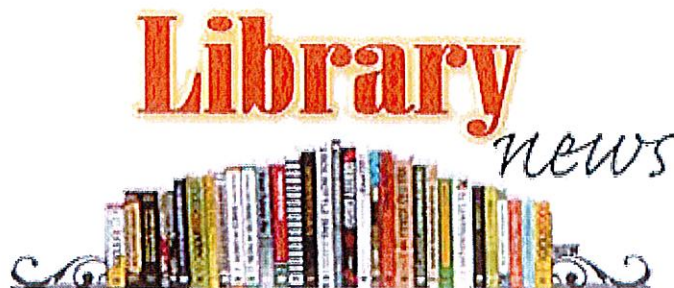
The rifle was made by a southwestern Pennsylvania gunsmith, Peter White (1777-1834). White’s name is engraved on a brass plate on the gun. The initials D.K. — probably the gun’s first owner — are also on it.

With a barrel over 41 inches long, the rifle has a total length of 4 feet, 8 1/2 inches. It weighs about 10 pounds. Made as a Kentucky-style flintlock, it was converted sometime before 1839 to percussion cap firing.

GEORGE ADAM YEISLEY arrived in Linn County, Iowa, in 1839 — the same year as Revolutionary War veteran Nathan Brown. Brown, almost 77, got here in May; Yeisley, 28, in November. Yeisley settled in Linn Township, Brown in Brown Township. Whether they ever met is unknown. Their homes were perhaps 6 or 7 miles apart.

A LONG-LIVED family was produced by George A. and Nancy Deal Yeisley. Three of their eight children who reached adulthood lived beyond 90: Ann, 91, Joe, 95, and John F.E. “El,” 99. George A. himself lived to 92. The shortest lifespan was that of the oldest child, Oliver, who lived to the age of 75.

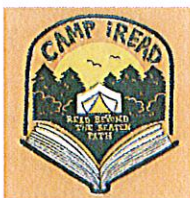

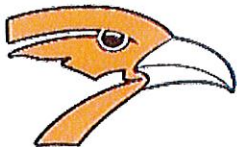

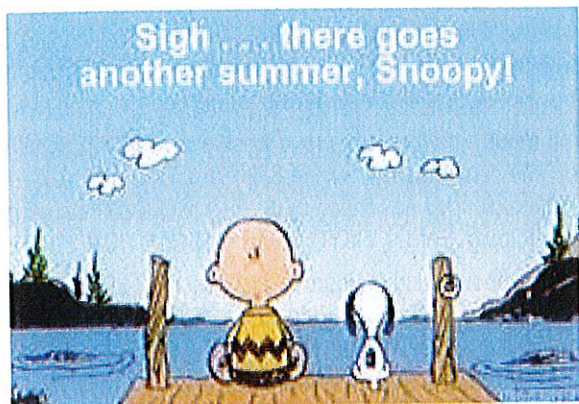

The Springville City Council met in regular session July 5, 2022.

Pledge of allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm. Council members present: Bart Barner, Brad Merritt, Jeff Baych, Cindy Kilburg, and Karla Blakely. City staff present: Public Works Director Todd Wyman and City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Cindy Golding, Treva Davis, and Jim Koppenhaver were also present.

Blakely made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Barner made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of June 20, 2022, meeting minutes and claims, seconded by Merritt. All ayes. Motion carried.

Linn County Sheriff's report included in packet.

Library report included in packet.

Public Works report included in packet.

Clerk report included in packet.

Mayor reported that the insurance company is ready to settle the claim for the trees in the rear lot of Emmons Park. He will get the paperwork signed and returned.

Councilman Baych reported that our community is one of the better-looking small communities. He traveled through several smaller and larger communities and hands down Springville is a clean, well-kept community. Kilburg said that she often gets compliments on our community from outside guests. Baych also requested that we look at our current UTV/ATV code since the county has just changed theirs. He wants to make sure that we are keeping up with the county.

Mayor invited citizens with input to speak. Cindy Golding introduced herself. She is a candidate for the Iowa State House District 83. Her primary reason for running is to make sure small, rural communities have a voice. She does not want the small towns to be governed by the big cities/counties as was presented in the early 2000s. There being no further public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Mrs. Waldron was not present. She did present medical documents to the clerk's office, but they did not support her claim for a need for an emotional support animal per Iowa Code 216. Council discussed a time frame for Mrs. Waldron to rectify the situation and settled on July 29, 2022. A letter will be sent regular and certified.

Merritt made a motion to appoint Jerry Sill to the planning and zoning commission, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mayor Andersen discussed employee wages. He is working on putting a system in place so that every year, council isn't just throwing out numbers. He is also working on getting a better review process in place. These will take place in December. He understands that the cost of living has increased at a rate most cities cannot keep up with. He is proposing raising wages \$1.07 and is not opposed to looking again in December. The library board went with a 3% raise for their employees. Barner made a motion to approve Resolution 30-2022, seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Barner, Blakely, Baych, Merritt. ABSTAINED: Kilburg. **RESOLUTION 30-2022 adopted.**

Council discussed water/sewer rates. No comments came in the office from the first reading. Council understands that they must raise the rates to keep up with future projects and current costs. They regret the affects

that it may have on the residents. The water base rate charge will increase 3%, there will be a new water debt service fee of \$3.30/month, the sewer debt fee will increase by \$1.50/month, but the sewer base rate will decrease by \$1.50/month. Each resident who uses both water and sewer will see a \$3.76 increase in their bills.

Barner made a motion to approve the second reading of Ordinance 1-2022 to amend the water and sewer rates, seconded by Kilburg. RCV: AYES: Baych, Merritt, Blakely, Kilburg, and Barner. NAYS: None. Second reading of **Ordinance 1-2022** passed. Baych made a motion to waive the third reading of Ordinance 1-2022, seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Merritt, Kilburg, Barner, Blakely, Baych. NAYS: None. Third reading waived. Blakely made a motion to adopt Ordinance 1-2022, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Baych, Blakely, Barner, Kilburg, and Merritt. NAYS: None. **ORDINANCE 1-2022 adopted.**

Merritt made a motion to approve Resolution 31-2022, to close the yard waste site from Monday, August 8, 2022 – August 15, 2022, for the STPA's tractor pull, seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Blakely, Merritt, Baych, Kilburg, Barner. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 31-2022 adopted.**

Merritt made a motion to approve Resolution 32-2022 to close the streets for the Fun Day's Parade, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Barner, Kilburg, Blakely, Baych, Merritt. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 32-2022 adopted.**

Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 33-2022 to increase the mileage reimbursement rate to 62.5 cents, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Baych, Blakely, Merritt, Kilburg, Barner. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 33-2022 adopted.**

Discussion was held on the Derecho response of 2020. Baych got with public works to discuss some of the things that they saw during the cleanup. He would like a work session to revisit the emergency handbook that was done in 2005. Once this is updated, he feels that this should be reviewed at the beginning of each year to keep it at the top of minds in case of an emergency. He said that the most comments he received was the lack of communication. He would like to look at getting some radios like the school has to use in such emergencies. He will get pricing. He would also like to get a volunteer group from the community who would be willing to work beside us to better coordinate response. Baych thinks that library would make the best command center because of its location and amenities. Would like to look at getting a generator for library and shop. Another thought was to get a camera on the water tower so that the entire town could be visible. More discussion will take place during a workshop.

The next regular council meeting will be July 18, 2022, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Kilburg moved to adjourn at 6:46 p.m., seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.
