



A STROLL THROUGH THE HI

A forgotten Butler: Clarissa, first wife of Isaac



No photo of Clarissa Butler has been located.

Clarissa Sargent, going on 17, and Isaac Butler, just 19, were married in Gallia County, southern Ohio, March 11, 1813. Clarissa, a twin, was born May 1, 1796, in Maryland or New Jersey (sources differ).

The Sargents moved to Ohio in the early 1800s. Parents were the Rev. Abel Morgan Sargent and Sarah Tunis Sargent. Abel was a Baptist-turned-Universalist preacher and writer who said he talked with angels and received revelations. He was controversial.

About 1830, Clarissa and Isaac's marriage ended, probably in Ohio or Indiana. The date and state are unknown; no record has been found. An unverified

report claims that Isaac left his wife because she was mentally ill.

Whatever the truth, it must have been heartbreaking for Clarissa, who lost custody of her five children. Sarah, the oldest, was about 15; Caroline, born in December 1829, was still a baby. The other children were Abel, Joseph, and Jane.

In March 1831, Isaac married a young widow, Susan Browning Newman, in Owen County, Ind. Over the next nine years, the Butlers lived in Cass County, Michigan Territory, and Racine County, Wisconsin Territory. They moved to the future site of Springville, Iowa, in 1840 (month unknown).

Clarissa has not been found in the 1840, '50, or '60 censuses. In the 1870 census, she was living in northern Missouri in the home of William and Catharine Delancy of Nineveh Township, Adair County. Another woman living in the Delancy home was listed as insane; Clarissa was not.

On June 4, 1880, the census of Benton Township in the same county found Clarissa in some type of institution, likely a county home. The word "pauper" was written after each resident's name. Clarissa

was also listed as "maimed, crippled, bedridden, or otherwise disabled."

By then she was 84. Despite her sad circumstances, Clarissa outlived her ex-husband, her twin sister, and two of her daughters. Survivors were sons Abel and Joseph Butler, daughter Caroline Conwell, and numerous grandchildren. Clarissa's death date and burial place are unknown.

Clarissa Butler's younger brother, Abel Morgan Sargent Jr., joined the Mormons. He was living between Nauvoo and Carthage, Ill., in June 1844 when a mob broke into the Carthage jail and killed Mormon leader Joseph Smith and his brother.

After a year of Mexican War service with the Mormon Battalion in 1846-1847, Abel started for Utah. He never arrived. At age 48, he died of cholera Nov. 18, 1847, in eastern Nebraska. His son Thomas, 10, also died. They were buried near the Mormon Winter Quarters, in what is now northern Omaha.

AS ADULTS, THREE of Clarissa Sargent Butler's children stayed in Linn County, Iowa, and two moved to Missouri. Jane Berryhill lived in Dade County, Mo.; Abel Butler in Gentry County, Mo. Joseph Butler and Sally Robinson Starry were in Springville, and Caroline Conwell in Coggon.

A TODDLER NOT quite 2, Josephine Berryhill, died at Springville April 22, 1858. She was the seventh child of Joseph T. and Jane Butler Berryhill, and the granddaughter of Isaac Butler and Clarissa Sargent Butler.

Historical Society meeting and social

A short meeting Dec. 11 will precede the Springville Area Historical Society's holiday social. Members and others interested are invited, at 6:30 p.m. in the SAHS building beside City Hall.

At the Nov. 13 meeting, Bev Franks reported on fundraising efforts for the Nathan Brown monument. Another large crack has formed, and if the monument would collapse, people or other gravestones could be harmed. Discussion ensued. "Springville should be proud to have a Revolutionary War veteran buried here," Bev declared.

Treasurer Jean Schmidt reported donations for the Brown Monument project from St. Isidore Church and several individuals, totaling \$287. Sincere thanks to all donors. Donations may be left at the Exchange State Bank.

Officers elected were Rick Heeren, president; Wes Bender, vice president; Bev Franks, secretary; James Crow, treasurer; and Karen Taylor, historian. All were present, as were Doug Beard, Dixie Brady, Bob and Shirley Parker, the Rev. Anna Mae Peck, and Phil and Karen Randall.

STORY OF SPRINGVILLE, IOWA

Samuel and Hannah Fawley

1921 anniversary article included 1860s 'travelogue'

The following article was published in the Springville New Era almost 97 years ago:

"Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Fawley celebrated their 56th wedding anniversary Dec. 30, 1921, at home in their usual quiet way. Mr. Fawley, who has been in poor health as well as losing his eyesight for the paşt six years and totally blind for three years, was born in Loudoun County, Va., Sept. 11, 1844. His wife (*Hannah*) was born in Cayuga County, N. Y., Feb. 27, 1843.

"Mr. Fawley moved to Ohio with his mother, five brothers and three sisters when he was only 7, his father having died in Virginia. He came to Iowa in the fall of 1855 with the Martyes, located four miles this side of Marion on what is called the Lew Wilson farm.

"He lived in Iowa until the spring of 1861, when he with his sister, her husband, and one child started for California overland with their teams . . . Several other parties joined them before they left the state. They met with many hardships on the road, had some encounters with the Indians. Two of their party being shot by the Indians.

"They were four months on the road. They finally arrived at San Jose Valley and began to farm. The next year he (Sam) had a fine prospect for a good wheat crop as one could wish, but there came a hot wind and in 24 hours his crop was blown against the fence. He became discouraged . . .

"After staying in California 18 months, he took the boat at San Francisco on the Pacific Ocean, went down to the Isthmus of Panama, crossed on a railroad track that had cost a man's life for every tie that was laid. He said it was very hot . . .

"He got on the boat in the Gulf of Mexico and sailed out into the Atlantic Ocean and then to New York City. They had some trying times while on the ocean . . . were shut down for 24 hours on account of the waves rolling over the deck of the ship.

Slaymakers bought Fawley home

In March 1973, Joe and Ruth Slaymaker bought the house on Fifth Street in Springville that once belonged to Samuel and Hannah Fawley. Joe died in December 2016; Ruth still lives there. Before 1973, the house had been converted to two apartments, with an outside staircase on the north side.

According to the abstract, Samuel Fawley bought the house and a vacant lot just south of it in 1894 from several heirs of Mary J. McCormac. Sam died in 1924, Hannah in 1930. Capitola Fawley Gunn, their divorced daughter, then bought the property for its appraised value, \$2,300, and lived there until her death in 1940.

"After looking around New York City awhile, he boarded a train and . . . arrived in Newark, Ohio, stayed there a short time, then came to Iowa, where he has lived ever since, except about seven years, he with his family were in California in Napa County . . . He has held the office of mayor two terms, was marshal several times, and is now an invalid at his home in Springville."

Samuel Fawley married Hannah Case Dec. 30, 1865. They were together 58 years, until Sam's death in March 1924. The couple and four of their six children (George, Capitola Gunn, Charles, and Dora Gibson) are buried in the Springville Cemetery.





HANNAH CASE FAWLEY was born near Auburn, Cayuga County, N. Y. In 1849, when she was 6, her family went by team and wagon to Buffalo, N. Y., crossed Lake Erie, and lived in Medina County, Ohio. Four years later they moved again, crossing the Mississippi River at Rock Island, Ill. They settled four miles west of Springville in 1853.


THE 1912-1913 IOWA State Gazetteer and Business Directory listed Samuel Fawley as an apiarist (beekeeper). Another Springville apiarist was Dr. George W. Gearhart.

Many POWs brought their families to lowa to see where they had been imprisoned and to meet the people who made the prisoners life better.
