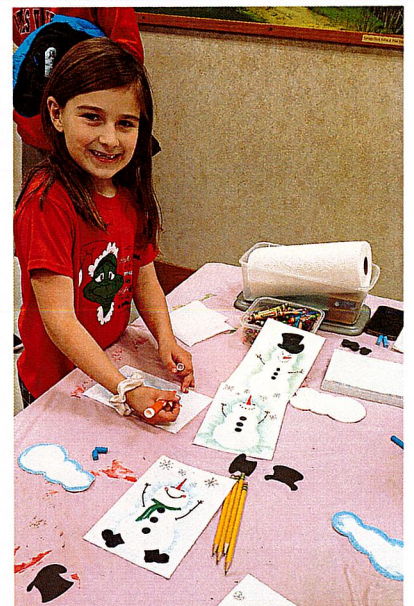

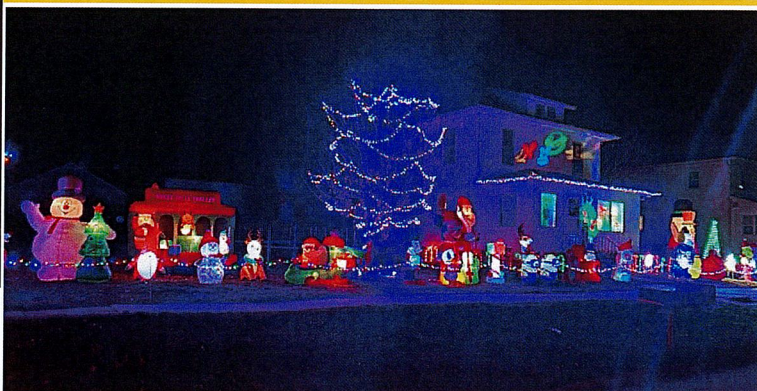

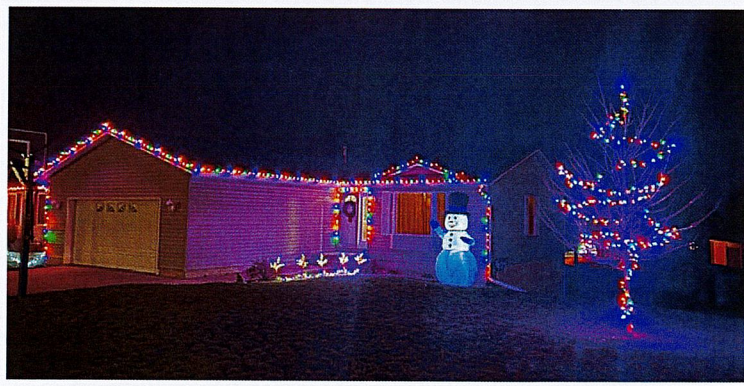

A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

Irene Minor, going on 99: 'I've had a good life'

Irene Minor, Springville's oldest resident, began life Feb. 19, 1925, on a farm near Cherokee in northwest Iowa. She was born at home, the fourth of seven children, with a neighboring farm woman serving as midwife. Irene's surname wasn't Minor then; for her first 25 years it was Travagiakis. Her 99th birthday is coming up Feb. 19.

Her father, James Travagiakis, was born in Corfu on the Greek island of Crete. He came to the U. S. in 1915. After fighting overseas in World War I, he received U. S. citizenship for his service. Irene never learned any details of his war experience; he refused to talk about it. His shoulder wound, he joked, was inflicted "by a jealous husband."

Irene's heritage is part Oglala Lakota Indian, through one of her maternal grandmother's ancestors who lived in South Dakota. Irene's mother, born Edna Mae Hill, grew up in a wealthy Missouri family. They had servants, and Edna never learned to cook. Her husband prepared the meals.

At age 4, Irene started attending a country school taught by Miss Peck (first name unknown). The little girl wasn't

there long, because her family moved to Cedar Rapids when she was 5. Her father worked at Sinclair packing plant. Later he was a meat inspector, then a veterinarian.

After residing in Cedar Rapids for several years, the Travagiakis family moved to Chicago. Irene recalls with disgust the bedbug-infested hotel they lived in for a month before moving to a house in Chicago's Fish Market area. Irene says she graduated from Englewood High school at 14 1/2. Her first job was delivering telegrams – on foot.

The U. S. entered World War II in December 1941, when Irene was 16. With so many men in the military, women took on non-traditional jobs. Irene attended a school to learn telegraphy (then used by railroads). She then went to San Francisco to work as a telegrapher. But she was not hired because her 90-pound weight would have put her at risk when handing up messages to moving trains.

In 1947, Irene obtained a civilian job with the U.S. Army on the island of Honshu, Japan. (The country was then occupied by troops from the U.S. and the British Commonwealth.) The ship she took from Seattle was scheduled to sail straight to Japan, but a huge storm came up. The ship was blown off course and landed at Guam in the mid-Pacific. The next day it proceeded to Japan.

Irene worked in Japan for a year. At the Kyoto railroad station one day, she was surprised by a brief introduction to Japanese Emperor Hirohito. After Japan's 1945 surrender, Hirohito was still emperor, but subject to the authority of U.S. General Douglas MacArthur. Irene remembers that

Seven Travagiakis Children

Irene Minor of Springville was one of seven children born to James and Edna Mae Travagiakis on a farm near Cherokee in northwest Iowa. The others were Elaine, Sam, George, Mary Victoria (Vicky), Florence, and George Anthony (Tony).

The first George was a true albino, with very white skin and pink eyes extremely sensitive to light. He died tragically at 18 months when he got into kerosene and drank it.

Irene's last sibling, Vicky, passed away in early 2023. Vicky, who was 15 months younger than Irene, lived near Flagstaff, Ariz.

Hirohito was very cordial. Another memory was a meeting in Japan with her brother Tony, who was in the Army and had a job tracking smugglers on various ships.

Returning to the U. S. after her Japanese adventure, Irene worked in Chicago at the Rudolph-Wurlitzer company, maker of organs. The firm's offices were on the 34th floor of a skyscraper. To Irene's dismay, the building swayed when the wind was strong!

When Irene returned to eastern Iowa, she met Alfred Robert "Bob" Minor, who was born near Ely. On March 18, 1950, they were married at First Presbyterian Church in Cedar Rapids. Only their parents and Irene's older sister Elaine attended. Their first home was an upstairs apartment at 2610 Grand Ave. SE. Later they built a house on

49th Street SE.

Bob, a mechanic, worked at Barron Motor Company. Their daughter Elizabeth, called Betsy, was born while the couple were living in Cedar Rapids. They also raised Irene's niece because her mother was unable to care for her. (Betsy is now Mrs. John Boyanovsky of rural Springville,)

In 1959, the Minors moved to a house at the corner of Fifth Street and Sixth Avenue in Springville. Bob and Irene were married 44 years plus one week. Going on 77, Bob died of cancer March 25, 1994. Irene then moved to a Cedar Rapids condominium. After 10 years there, she came back to Springville to be closer to her family. Her home is near the school.

Irene Minor, who worked until she was 85, will be 99 on Feb. 19. She reflected, "I can't complain; I've had a good life." It surely has been an interesting one!

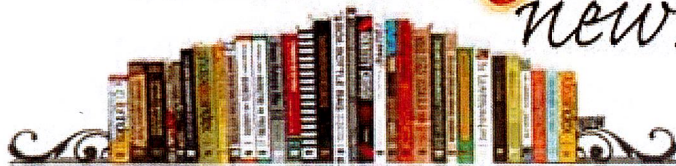

Youth Wrestling Takes Over Springville

Wrestling was made available to our youth for a couple of year now. It is gaining moment for all ages. Springville has around 50 youth wrestlers from PreK-8th grade. Springville held our first youth tournament on Sunday, December 10th. There were cars everywhere. They had over 245 wrestlers registered and we walked away with several youth championships.

The Springville City Council met in regular session on December 4, 2023.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Brad Merritt, Karla Blakely, Jeff Baych, and Cindy Kilburg. City staff present: City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Treva Davis and Jim Koppenhaver were also in attendance.

Baych made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Blakely made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of November 20, 2023, meeting minutes, and claims, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report, Library Report, Public Works Report, and Clerk Report. The mayor reported that the tree lighting and parade was a well-attended event. He received some feedback from some residents to help with next year's event.

Mayor Andersen invited citizens with input to speak. There being no public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

The bill was received for grinding the stump from 5th Ave. It was \$275 and the bill has been sent to the homeowner.

Baych made a motion to approve the 2024 council meeting schedule, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 63-2023 to set the fees for the rental inspection program, seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Baych, Merritt, Kilburg, Blakely. ABSENT: Barner. **RESOLUTION 63-2023 adopted.**

Kilburg made a motion to appoint Iris Trampe to the Board of Adjustment for a 5-year term starting January 2024, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Baych made a motion to appoint John Lemon to the Park Board for a 2-year term starting January 2024, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

Blakely made a motion to appoint Andy Hoge to the Board of Adjustment for a 5-year term starting January 2024, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Baych made a motion to recommend approval of the permit for the Linn County Frozen Few Snowmobile Club to sign and groom the right of way along Hwy 151, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Merritt made a motion to approve Resolution 64-2023 to oppose Alliant Energy's proposed electric rate hike of 15%-20%, seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Blakely, Baych, Merritt. ABSENT: Barner. **RESOLUTION 64-2023 adopted.**

The council took no action on a Memorandum of agreement with Clean Energy Districts of Iowa. They would like to know what other cities are doing before they make any decisions on this.

Wagaman discussed the FY25 Budget Worksheets. The council is to look at them and have any questions ready before budget workshops.

The council discussed the beginning steps of a Capital Improvement Plan. They were given worksheets from MSA (engineers) to help get ideas and reasons on paper. They will have a workshop on this topic at a later date.

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, December 18, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Kilburg moved to adjourn at 6:35 p.m., seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

The Springville City Council met in regular session on December 18, 2023.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Bart Barner, Brad Merritt, Karla Blakely, Jeff Baych, and Cindy Kilburg. City staff present: Public Works Public Works and City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Treva Davis, Jim Koppenhaver and Jim Holz, Andrew Inhelder, Sarah Fosbinder and Kayci Terveer from MSA were also in attendance.

Blakely made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Baych made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of December 4, 2023, meeting minutes, and claims, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report, Library Report, Public Works Report, Treasurer's Report, and Clerk Report. Mayor Andersen thanked Brad Merritt for his 9 years of service to the community. Brad chose to retire from council. A plaque and gift were presented to Merritt. Baych updated the council that the tiling was being installed at Emmons Park. Barner asked for an update on the Kirchman property. Wagaman explained that she is in contact with the attorney, and he is going to send a final letter with a date of January 5th to get it cleaned up. Merritt added that he would like to see the sidewalk project keep moving forward.

Mayor Andersen invited citizens with input to speak. There being no public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Sarah Fosbinder and Kayci Terveer with MSA walked the council through the water pressure scenarios if a new tower was built. They also talked about providing sewer to the property to the south of Hwy 151.

Andrew Inhelder talked with council about their thoughts on curb, gutter and storm on 5th St. S when the overpass goes in. There was a very lengthy discussion on options. Inhelder will go back to the IDOT to see if they will bid alternatives. He also discussed the dead ending of 1st Ave at the intersection of Wendling Lane. The council would like IDOT to leave the concrete but commit Wendling Quarries to secure it with a gate. The council would like to see a hammerhead turnaround installed.

Blakely made a motion to approve Resolution 65-2023 to approve the FY25 Linn County Sheriff's contract, seconded by Kilburg. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Baych, Merritt, Blakely, Barner. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 65-2023 adopted.**

Wagaman talked with the council about upgrading the financial software. gWorks is moving its software to cloud-based software. The office watched a webinar on Utility Billing, and it really streamlined the billing process. The city is about to get the HR Hub and she would like to get the financial piece to the hubs. She would not onboard the financial hub until after budget, but to commit to it in 2 separate purchases would cost an additional \$2,000. This would be an additional \$6,000 cost this fiscal year. The council agreed to approve the upgrade. Wagaman will get the final quote in front of the council for final approval.

Blakely made a motion to appoint Teresa Pilipovic to the Park Board for a 2-year term starting January 2024, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Kilburg made a motion to appoint Laura Barner to the Park Board for a 2-year term starting January 2024, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Barner abstained. Motion carried.

No application provided.

Baych made a motion to appoint Rita Drymon to the Library Board to fill a vacancy, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 66-2023 to approve the quote for tiling in Emmons Park from Bovenmyer Tiling, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Merritt, Baych, Blakely, Blakely, Kilburg, Barner. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 66-2023 adopted.**

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, January 8, 2024, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Merritt moved to adjourn at 7:41 p.m., seconded by Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.
