The City Council will be holding a public hearing on Monday, February 5th at 6:00 p.m. to consider adopting the plan. Any input is appreciated. We have held two public meetings, several planning & zoning meetings and we are now at a point we have a final product. This is comprehensive plan is in electronic form, but if you would like a copy printed out just let us know.

Otherwise, our office has been busy with budget. You will all be receiving a proposed tax statement from Linn County with our hearing date on it. This is one of the new pieces of legislation. Watch your mailboxes in early March for those statements to come.




tended to help area schools raise much needed funding for equipment, supplies, events and any other special project a particular school is working toward.

Prevent Frozen Pipes

As temperatures drop your pipes run the risk of freezing and cracking. Please consider these three easy tips to prevent frozen pipes.

- Let it drip: letting your faucet drip during extreme cold weather can prevent a pipe from freezing and bursting. Mainly pipes unprotected or unheated areas susceptible to freezing.
- 2. Heat it up: Open cabinet doors to circulate warmer air around the pipes. Space heaters can also help prevent freezing. If using space heaters use caution to avoid any risk of fires.
- 3. **Keep it up:** Keep your furnace temperature set to 55 degrees or higher.

But if your pipes do freeze shut off your water immediately. Thaw pipes with warm air with a hair dryer or space heater. Do not leave space heaters unattended, Be careful turning water back on. Once pipes are thawed, slowly turn water back on and check pipes and joints for any cracks.

A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS'

Dr. Claire Hopper lived in several Western states

Claire Dutton Hopper, born in Springville Feb. 12, 1876, was the son and only child of storekeeper **Byron M. Hopper** and his wife, **Mary Dutton Hopper**. In 1877, Byron bought the South Side drugstore from **Charles Gifford.** Springville's original business district on the South Side gradually migrated north to its current location on Broadway, north of the creek.

In 1898, Byron relocated his drugstore to Broadway. The town's new "brick block" was completed in 1902. Byron sold his drugstore to **Fred W. Gregg** and opened a grocery store in the new brick block. He continued in business there for the remaining 22 years of his life.

No information about Claire Hopper's childhood or early education has been found. At age 6 in 1882, he possibly started first grade at Springville's brand new school. However, his name is not in the Springville High School alumni directory. Claire's high school is unknown.


Claire turned 19 in 1895. According to the Iowa census,


he and both parents lived together in Springville. In the 1900, 1910, and 1920 federal censuses, Mary was absent from the Hopper household. Apparently, sometime between 1895 and 1900, she left Byron. Her name appears in the Pasadena, Calif., city directory every year from 1905 through 1926, always at 276 Galena Avenue. The couple never divorced.

On June 15, 1899, Claire received his bachelor of science degree from Cornell College in Mount Vernon. He probably entered Cornell in 1895, but could have been on vacation when the census found him in Springville that year. His M. D. degree was awarded in 1906 by Rush Medical College at the University of Chicago.

The 1907-1908 Cornell College catalog reported that Claire was a physician in Oconomowoc, Wis. This was likely his first medical practice.

pringville native was a World War I veteran

From Wisconsin, he moved far west to Oregon. On Feb. 0, 1909, Claire married **Margaret Elder Cramer** in Portnd, Ore. She was a Pennsylvania native, and had previousbeen married to Mr. Cramer (first name unknown). Their rst home was at St. John's, Ore., which was later annexed y Portland.

They didn't stay in St. John's long; the 1910 census lists arem in Richland, Wash. They were still there in April 1917, hen the U. S. entered World War I. Dr. Claire Hopper was alled up for Army service Aug. 3 that year, and assigned to be 504th Engineers at the Post Hospital, Vancouver Baracks, Wash. (That Vancouver is near the Oregon border.) fter 19 months' service, Claire was honorably discharged a captain March 8, 1919.

In Iowa, Byron Hopper died May 3, 1924, at St. Luke's ospital in Cedar Rapids. He was 77 and in poor health, but ad worked until shortly before his passing. The funeral was

at Springville Presbyterian Church, with burial in the town cemetery. Claire, then living in Kennewick, Wash., was administrator of his father's estate.

The Springville New Era obituary politely said nothing about Byron and Mary's separation of over 25 years. (Springville people likely knew, anyway.) Mary died Jan. 24, 1927, in her Pasadena home. She was 77. Funeral details aren't known; she was buried in Mountain View Cemetery, Altadena, Calif.

Not quite two years later, Claire's wife Margaret, 53, died of influenza and uremia Dec. 19, 1928. At the time, they were in Tuba City, Ariz., where Claire was in charge of the Navajo Indian Reservation and School. Margaret was interred in the same cemetery as her mother-in-law.

In less than four and a half years, Claire had lost his wife and both parents. At 54, he remarried Jan. 6, 1930; the place is not known. His second wife was Louise Young Lavengood, 34, who had been widowed two years earlier. Louise was an Indiana native, and like Margaret Hopper, a nurse. The 1940 census found the couple in Whiterocks, northeastern Utah.

By 1950, they had moved to Cottonwood, Ariz., south of Flagstaff. Claire was 74 then. He marked his 100th birthday in February 1976, and lived to be 102. Claire Dutton Hopper died June 20, 1978, and rests with his first wife in Altadena, Calif. Louise survived him six years, and died at 88 on June 28, 1984. Her grave is in Valley View Cemetery, Clarksville, Ariz. Claire had no children.



City Council Regular Meeting

January 8, 2024

Canceled due to weather.

City Council Budget Workshop

January 17, 2024

The Springville City Council met in a budget workshop on January 17, 2024.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm. Council members present: Bart Barner, Jeff Baych, and Cindy Kilburg. Karla Blakely and Makenna Hollandsworth were absent. City staff present: City Clerk Dee Wagaman.

Barner made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Wagaman discussed the new tax law. She went over the budget's certification page so the council could see what levies were being proposed and how they were figured out. The emergency levy that the city uses that adds \$0.27/\$1,000 of taxable evaluation has gone away. She then discussed the proposed revenues that would be coming into the city. She did not have all the department budgets at the time so there will be some additions at a later date.

Wagaman also discussed with the council the expenses. Some of these were assumptions as she did not have all the department's budget requests. Baych would like to see the budget plan for some unforeseen expenses instead of planning for the best-case scenarios. This would allow them to still talk and vote on the expenditures as they come up instead of worrying about a budget amendment. The council also talked about some other expenses that they would like to see included in the budget. Wagaman will get revised and bring back.

Wagaman will present water and sewer rate possibilities at the next budget workshop.

The next budget workshop is scheduled for January 31, 2024, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Barner moved to adjourn at 7:31 p.m., second from Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

City Council Regular Meeting

January 22, 2024

The Springville City Council met in regular session on January 22, 2024.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Cindy Kilburg, Karla Blakely, and Jeff Baych. Bart Barner and Makenna Hollandsworth were absent. City staff present: Public Works Brandon French, City Clerk Dee Wagaman, and Deputy City Clerk Shelby Northrup. Jim Koppenhaver and Andrew Inhelder from MSA were also in attendance.

Baych made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

Barner entered the meeting at 6:01 p.m.

Baych made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of December 18, 2023, meeting minutes, and claims, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report, Library Report, Treasurer's Report, and Clerk Report. Mayor Andersen talked about the snow removal during the past 10 days or so. With Wyman being on vacation, the school and city worked well together. The Co-op helped with snow removal. French did a great job with keeping up with the snow and wind.

Mayor Andersen invited citizens with input to speak. There being no public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Andrew Inhelder talked with council about their thoughts on curb,

gutter and storm on 5th St. S when the overpass goes in. The council unanimously decided on a curb on the east side of the street with a ditch on the west side. They would also like to see a 10' trail on the east side. Inhelder will take this back to the IDOT.

Blakely made a motion to approve Resolution 1-2024 to approve the gWorks quote, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Barner, Baych, Blakely. ABSENT: Hollandsworth. **RESOLUTION 1-2024 adopted.**

Wagaman discussed the need to increase the rate for mailing the newsletter out. We currently charge \$9/year, but that doesn't cover the expenses. She recommends charging \$15/year. She would also like to set a price for people to advertise in the newsletter. She is thinking of charging \$12.50 for an 1/8 of a page. This is just a bit larger than a business card sized ad. Kilburg made a motion to approve Resolution 2-2024 to set the fees for the newsletter, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Baych, Blakey, Barner, Kilburg. ABSENT: Hollandsworth. **RESOLUTION 2-2024 adopted.**


The planning and zoning board has reviewed the completed Comprehensive Plan. They recommend that the council set up a public hearing to approve the plan. Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 3-2024 to set a public hearing to approve the Comprehensive Plan on Monday, February 5, 2024, seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Barner, Kilburg, Blakely, Baych. ABSENT: Hollandsworth. **RESOLUTION 3-2024 adopted.**

The council discussed the community garden. The Hometown Pride group is asking to try to use the south end of the cemetery behind the arborvitae trees. The council discussed and is not opposed but would like to hear final plans before making a final decision. They would like the group to present its plan for costs, water supply, traffic, and nuisance abatement. Wagaman will take back to the Hometown Pride group.

The council discussed the public works part-time wages. The position is currently making \$15.20/hour. Our call-in snow removal crew is making \$20/hour. Wyman suggested getting this more evened out. They discussed making two positions so they could pay differently for the mowing versus the snow removal. The final decision was to bump the current wage some, but not the full \$20 so that they didn't need to bring it back down for mowing season. Barner made a motion to approve Resolution 4-2024 to raise the part-time public works employee's wage to \$17.20/hour effective January 1, 2024, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Baych, Barner, Kilburg. ABSTAINED: Blakely. ABSENT: Hollandsworth. **RESOLUTION 4-2024 adopted.**

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, February 5, 2024, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Barner moved to adjourn at 6:57 p.m., seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

Springville Iowa Comprehensive Plan

Planning 101

Comprehensive planning is an ordered process that determines community goals and aspirations in terms of community development. The end product is called a comprehensive plan, also known as a general plan, or master plan. This resulting document expresses and regulates public policies on transportation, utilities, land use, recreation, and housing. Comprehensive plans typically encompass large geographical areas, a broad range of topics, and cover a long-term time horizon.
