PARKING/TRAFFIC CHANGES

5th Street Parking:

There is NO PARKING on the west side of 5th Street from Academy Street (school) to the north of the bridge. Parking is allowed on the east side of above mentioned area. This is to keep the kids from crossing into traffic while getting picked up from school.

Academy Street:

Academy Street is now a one-way street going from Mill Ave to 5th Street. There is NO PARKING on the north side of Academy Street. This is for bus traffic only. There is now angle parking on the south side of Academy Street. The center lane is for through traffic only.

2018: A Year of Big Improvements

As we have closed out the year 2018 in Springville we would like to take the time to thank everyone that was very patient with all the construction projects that the City has undergone this year. We know that at times it seemed that you could not go anywhere without running into some kind of project. Looking back we realize that this was true.

The spring came late this year with snow and cold well into April which got the 5th street project off to a slow start, but with a little determination by Alliant Energy and their contractor we started in the snow to move all the overhead electrical lines to be underground and move or removed most of the existing utility poles. The next phase of the project started with Eastern Iowa Excavating and Concrete, LLC. installing several hundred feet of new 8" water main to improve water volume to the north end of town. This also included reconnecting all the services to the homes along the construction zone. This required crossing the creek on the west side of the 5th Street Bridge. This was done by constructing a "flow through dam" and crossing the dam digging with the excavators. The creek banks were restored with new rip-rap and seeding.

At the same time that was happening, a second crew from Eastern lowa started at the bridge and dug south installing new storm sewer and intakes to improve the drainage in the area. This was concrete pipe ranging from 24 inches down to 15 inches and at times was as deep as 14 feet deep and in some of the bed rock. This will help the street and area flood-

ing along 5th street and in the school parking and front door area.





The pictures shown here show the 8" water main going across Big Creek on 5th Street North. The photo on the right shows the flow through dam with a trench box in to install the new 8" water main.



After all the sewer and water lines were replaced/repaired the next phase was to excavate and do base repair in preparation of a new 8 inch concrete street with 6 inch curb. On a very hot August day the paving machine was rumbling up the street laying the new concrete. The street also included some new sidewalk and crosswalks that will have pedestrian crossing lights installed this spring. This project was funded in part by the Linn County Local Option Sales Tax program.

If that wasn't enough to snarl traffic, the City of Springville also took on a three phase sewer rehab project to improve our sanitary sewer system. The first phase was to core around some of the leaking manholes in town and to install new castings and lids to provide a better seal and a collar of concrete to help keep water out.

Phase two was lining all of the eight inch clay sanitary sewer mains. This was accomplished by Municipal Pipe and Tool "blowing" a resin embossed fiber glass liner through one manhole to the next manhole. Then this liner was steamed to inflate. The hot steam also would set the resin and in a short amount of time the new liner was hard. This made a new pipe inside of the old pipe. Then a robotic camera with a cutting attachment was sent up the new line to cut open all the house taps to the main so that all home services were reinstated. A second team came along after the liner was done and grout that service to seal it up.

Phase three was the construction of a new wet well and lift station to pump the sewer to the lagoon south of town. The new lift station is located next to the old one at 169 J.R. Barnes Parkway near the yard waste site. The wet well is a concrete rectangle structure that is used to collect sewage to be pumped to the lagoon. It is twelve foot by fourteen foot and is thirty five foot deep. It houses three submersible pumps that can pump over a thousand gallons per minute each. A new control module with a valve room and a control room was delivered and set. This houses all the controls and computers that control the operation of the pumps and alarms. This project was funded in part by a \$500,000 CDBG Grant. The remainder of the project was funded through a State of lowa Revolving Loan.

First partnership started in 1898

Yocoms, Sterners were merchants in Springville more than 50 years

Yocom, Sterner & Co., called "The Big Store," opened in Springville in 1898. The business became Sterner's in the 1930s and continued into the 1950s. The original senior partner was **Edward Yocom**, born in 1854 near Chesterhill, Morgan County, Ohio.

He came to Springville in 1871 with his father and stepmother, Thomas and Mary Bailey Yocom. In 1876, Edward married Louisa Matilda "Tillie" Calvert. They spent 12 years in Van Cleve, Marshall County, where Edward owned a farm implement business and then a dry goods and grocery store.

The Yocoms returned to Springville in 1894 with their four children – Olive Luella, John Thomas, Purley Charles, and Edward Brooks. Yocom owned the Corner Store from 1895 to 1898, then went into business with **Milton R. Sterner** in 1898.

Poor health forced Yocom's retirement, probably in the 1920s. His son John, born in 1879, was also with Yocom, Sterner, & Co., but the years he worked there are unknown. John and his wife, Mary Wiley Yocom, had no children.

Sterner was born in Allentown, Pa., in 1858. He married Ida Catherine Sheller in November 1882 at Lanark, Ill. After living in Wyoming, Iowa, and Iowa Falls, in 1885 they settled in Springville.

For 12 years before joining Yocom, Sterner ran a bakery and restaurant with Clinton M. Buffington, an Illinois native he had met in Iowa Falls. Buffington left Springville for Mechanicsville.

Milton and Ida's children were Carolyn "Carrie," born in 1886, and Paul W., 1896. Paul, a World War I veteran, married Anna Wilson in August 1923. They had two sons, an unnamed baby who died in 1926 and M. Robert, born about 1931. Carrie Sterner did not marry.

When Paul Sterner joined the store is unknown. Milton Sterner died in March 1930, Edward Yocom in March 1931. Apparently Edward's son, John T. Yocom, retired from the store before 1937 because of illness. He died in September 1944.

With no Yocoms left, the business became Sterner's General Store and later Sterner's Grocery. Paul, Anna, and Carrie Sterner all worked there. When they retired, Ralph Gunnison bought the store in 1954. Paul Sterner died in March 1959, his sister in April 1973, and his widow in February 1983.

Historical Society sets Jan. 8 meeting

Anyone interested in local history is welcome when the Springville Area Historical Society (SAHS) meets Tuesday, Jan. 8, at 6:30 p. m. in the SAHS building.

At the Dec. 11 meeting, president Rick Heeren led a discussion of funding to restore the Nathan Brown monument. A photo of Nathan's second wife, Tamar, provided by the Rev. Anna M. Peck, was shown. The annual holiday social followed the meeting.

Others present were Wes Bender, vice president; James Crow, treasurer; Karen Taylor, historian; Dixie Brady, Joe and Karen Brown, Jim Koppenhaver, Phil and Karen Randall, Alan Safley, and Jean Schmidt.

YOCOM, STERNER & CO., later Sterner's, was on the west side of Broadway in the northernmost brick building. The location of the Corner Store, owned for about three years by Edward Yocom before he went into partnership with Milton Sterner in 1898, is unknown.

Carrie Sterner was piano teacher

Carolyn "Carrie" Sterner graduated from Springville High School in 1902 and attended Shimer College in Mount Carroll, Ill. Before she worked in Sterner's store, she was a secretary for W. E. Bell Co., a large Springville poultry packing plant, for many years.

Carrie, who was single, also taught piano. In October 1915, 55 persons attended a recital in her home by 14 of her pupils. Carrie died April 18, 1973, at Meth-Wick Manor in Cedar Rapids. She was 86.

Park was already school grounds

In 2019, New Year's Day gift to town of Springville marks 110 years

On Jan. 1, 1909, Butler Park was given to the town of Springville by Exchange State Bank president C. F. "Fred" Butler. The name honors Fred's father, Joseph Samuel Butler, founder of the bank. He died Dec. 31, 1898.

Teenager Joseph Butler arrived here in 1840. From 1848 to 1850, he worked in Albany, Ill. Then he made fanning mills and cultivators in Anamosa four years. He returned to Springville in 1854, married Maria Reneau, and spent the rest of his life here.

The land that became Butler Park was first owned by Dr. John Smith Love, who practiced medicine in Springville from December 1858 until his death in February 1907. The doctor generously let people use his wooded land as a park.

Joseph Butler and Dr. Love certainly knew each other; they were in Springville together for 40 years. Possibly, Love was the doctor who amputated Butler's left leg below the knee after an unfortunate railroad accident in 1877.

Springville's first high school was built on Dr. Love's land in 1882, but he retained ownership of the property. After Dr. Love died, Fred Butler purchased the land from his estate. In 1909, it had already been the school grounds for 27 years.


A bronze plaque affixed to a large rock on the south edge of the park reads: "This Park presented to the town of Springville for the use and pleasure of its citizens and the public in general, by Charles F. Butler in honor of his father, Joseph S. Butler, January 1, 1909."

In 110 years, Butler Park has seen commencements, band concerts in the pagoda, family reunions, Harvest Home celebrations, "Gospel in the Gazebo," and countless other events. For decades, school children have played on the Butler rock, blithely unaware of its history.






The plaque on this rock in Butler Park commemorates C.F. "Fred" Butler's giving the park to the town of Springville Jan. 1, 1909.



Joseph S. Butler (1821-1898)




C. F. "Fred" Butler (1857-1941)

History of three other Springville parks


Graham Park was a gift from Dr. Jacob DeWitt Graham, a physician here for 44 years. In 1917, he gave 5 acres east of Broadway for an "athletic park." Dr. Graham was Springville School superintendent before attending Rush Medical College in Chicago.

Orville Cox, mayor of Springville from 1966 to 1977, spearheaded a project to replace the unsightly city dump with an attractive park east of Broadway. Jim Barnes, Jake Hiner Sr., Doug McConaughy, Schmidt Brothers Cement Co., Dr. H. E. "Ed" Hanna, and the Lions Club also helped. The City Council chose the name Cox Lake Park.

Joseph B. "Joe" Emmons was president of the Exchange State Bank from 1960 to 1971. He was the great-grandson of bank founder Joseph S. Butler. Emmons Park, along S. Fifth Street, was given to Springville by Joe's widow, Alma Goebel Emmons, in the early 1970s.

City Council Regular Meeting

December 3, 2018

The pledge of allegiance was recited to begin the meeting.

The Springville City Council met in regular session in the Springville Council Chambers on December 3, 2018. Mayor Shebetka called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Brad Merritt, Dennis Thies, Lyle Andersen, and Mareta Ralston. City Staff present: City Clerk/Treasurer Dee Wagaman.

Andersen made a motion to approve the agenda as written, second from Thies. All ayes. Motion carried.

Andersen made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of November 19, 2018 minutes, Approval of bills, second from Merritt. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mayor Shebetka invited Citizens with input to speak. There being no comments from citizens, Mayor Shebetka moved to business.

Mike Hanshaw and Teresa Pilipovic presented the Parks Boards plan to put an ice skating rink up again this year in Cox Pond Park. They would like to put it in the pavilion this year. They would use the picnic tables to act as a border and support for the rink. Putting it in the pavilion would keep the rink on level ground which would help the rink last longer, keep it in a location that is well lit, so it could be used longer and hopefully keep the kids from destroying it, and it would be easier to access if it was right by the parking lot. Andersen made a motion to allow the Parks Board to put an iceskating rink in the Cox Pond in the pavilion for the winter, second from Thies. All ayes. Motion carried.

Thies made a motion to approve the FY20 Linn County Sheriff's contract for Law Enforcement Services at a cost of \$36.00 per hour for 80 hours per month, second by Andersen. All ayes. Motion carried.

Merritt made a motion to approve the LL Pelling Co proposal for 2019 Sealcoat work, second from Ralston. All ayes. Motion carried.

Andersen made a motion to approve the software agreement with Data Technologies, Inc. in the amount of \$16,155.00, second from Thies. All ayes. Motion carried.

Wagaman presented the current situation on 5th Street and Academy with regards to before and after school stop signs. It was brought to the city's attention that the current set up is incorrect and the community members are constantly running the stop sign. Due to the intersection size, residents would need to stop before the intersection and again at the crosswalk. The best-case scenario would be to put the pedestrian lights. Andersen made a motion to add an additional stop sign to the northbound intersection of 5th St. and Academy Street temporarily, second from Merritt. All ayes. Motion carried.

Michele Stone presented changes to chapter 165 of the Code of Ordinances. P & Z would like to update the current zones to help with possible new developments. The council has directed Parmenter, city attorney, to read through the proposed changes and give input.

Council discussed the installation of the pedestrian lights that were part of the original 5th Street project. Council decided to put three sets of pedestrian lights, but change the location. Andersen made a motion to approve the three pedestrian lights to be installed at the crossing of 1st Ave on the west side of 5th Street, the crossing of 5th St. north of Academy St. and the crossing of 6th Street and 1st Ave, second from Thies. All ayes. Motion carried.

Sheriff's report was presented. There were 23 calls for service from November 19, 2018 through December 3, 2018. 126.50 hours were reported for November 2018.

The council discussed the need to revise Chapter 105 of the Code of Ordinances. This chapter pertains to the yard waste site. The current language needs to be reviewed and updated. This will be brought back to the January 2019 agenda.

The council discussed looking at the current code requirements for installing curb and gutter on existing homes when they make improvements to their driveways. The current code requires all new built homes to install curb and gutter the entire length of the property, they discussed doing the same for existing homes. This will be brought back on a later agenda.

Ralston made a motion to go into closed session pursuant to Iowa Code Chapter 21.5(j) to discuss the possible purchase of real estate, second from Thies. RCV: AYES: Merritt, Thies, Andersen, and Ralston. NAYES: None. ABSENT: Grimley.

Council went into closed session at 7:25PM.

Andersen made a motion to return to open session, second from Thies. RCV: AYES: Merritt, Thies, Andersen, and Ralston. NAYES: None. ABSENT: Grimley.

Public Works report was distributed.

Treasurer's report was given.

Andersen updated the council on the Winter Fest activities. He reported that things appeared to have gone well. He would like to see council make more of an effort to be visible in the community during events.

The next regular council meeting will be December 17, 2018 at 6:00 P.M. at City Hall. This will be the holiday open house. The community is invited to attend.
