TWENTY YEARS

2025 is the 20th anniversary of being in the current library. Each month of 2025 we will tell you the story of how we got to this fantastic building. It didn't happen overnight and in fact took many years.

Let's start at the beginning and see how we have a library today. The Monday Club in 1945 approached the school board to be allowed to combine a school and city library. Their wish was granted and led to the start of a city library. They held paper drives and other fund raisers to establish funds for the newly formed library. But they knew that more money was needed to have a successful library. They approached the city council for city funding and to move the library to town hall. October 1946 the library was now funded by the city and the first library board was appointed: Susan Gearhart, Nell Wiley, Roland Safely and Glen Bowdish. In a little over a year shelves were built, and books were moved to town hall.

A campaign for a separate space was started and by 1951 the Springville Memorial Library was dedicated. Just like now the library depended on the generosity of the community. Monday Club was a supporter for many, many years until they dropped their affiliation with the General Federation of Women's Clubs. The Springville Memorial Library is dedicated to the Springville men who lost their lives in World War II: Arthur Chudzinski, Marvin W. Groes, Wilfred Gorious, Ellsworth Hayden, John F. Kelly, Samuels S. Koch, Russell G. Miner, Irl Patterson, Robert L. Secrist, Clarence L. Smith, Jerome Schwartz and Lester Stone. There is a bronze plaque attached to the building honoring these heroes.

Let's fast forward to 1981, when retired teacher Bertha Koppenhaver wanted the library to be more than it was. She wanted to be open more than four hours a week and to have a bigger circulation than two thousand books a year. In August 1981, the City Council appointed Bertha Koppenhaver, Stan Capron, and Treva Davis to a reorganized library board. Then the hard work began, volunteers were recruited, books were organized and bought, hours open increased to name just a few things. By October the circulation hit 852 with rural circulation at 284. A huge increase in a very short amount of time. Springville had an active and growing library.

A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

1812 and Civil War: Henry Pate was in both

Henry Pate, interred in the Springville Cemetery 14 decades ago, belongs to a small, unique group of veterans. He was one of just a dozen men known to have served both in the War of 1812 and in the Civil War – which began 46 years after the 1812 conflict had ended.

Pate, a native of Montgomery County, Va., later moved to Dearborn County, Ind. Born in 1792, he was about 20 years old when the War of 1812 began. He enlisted in the Indiana Territorial Militia, **Capt. James McGuire**'s Company. For his service, Pate was given a land grant in the southwest corner of Jones County, Iowa, near present-day Martelle.

The War of 1812 was fought against Great Britain, and ended formally with the Treaty of Ghent (Belgium) Feb. 17, 1815. Henry Pate returned to civilian life, and about 1817 married **Ellen Collins**. The couple had three daughters and three sons who reached adulthood. They lost one or possibly two other children.

About 1839, Pate and his family moved from Indiana to Dubuque County. Iowa (which then included today's Linn County). At an unknown date, his wife Ellen died; whether this happened in Indiana or Iowa is unknown. Ellen does not appear with Henry in the 1840 federal census of Dubuque County, Iowa.

Four of Henry and Ellen's children – Sarah DeLong, Melinda Winchell Ogg Hess, Rachel Rhatigan (Radigan) and Edwin Pate – are known to have mar-

ried, and all had children. No information has been found about marriages or offspring of sons **Phillip** and **Reuben Pate**.

On April 12-14, 1861, Fort Sumter, S. C., was attacked, and the Civil War began. Henry Pate was about 70 and reportedly living in Anamosa when he enlisted in the 37th Iowa Infantry Sept. 22, 1862. This unit was also known as the Greybeard Regiment, because its soldiers were ages 45 through 80. It was the only such regiment in the Union Army.

The 37th Iowa was mustered into service Dec. 14, 1862, at Muscatine, under the command of **Col. George W. Kincaid**. A total of 1,041 "Greybeards" served in the Civil War. They were assigned primarily as prison guards, and guards for Union Army supply trains. Only three members of the regiment died in action, but 145 others succumbed to disease during the war.

Henry Pate served only five months with the Greybeards. He was discharged for disability May 8, 1863, at St. Louis, Mo. The nature of his disability is not known, but he apparently recovered from it.

The Greybeards were recognized for unwavering loyalty and high morale, and were heralded by the entire Union Army for their efforts. The regiment served until May 24, 1865, when its members were mustered out at Rock Island, Ill. The Civil War had ended the previous month.

The 1878 Linn County History reported that Henry Pate was a retired farmer living in Springville. Two years later, the 1880 census found him in the home of Rollo Hess, a laborer. Others in the household were Melinda Hess (Rollo's wife and Henry's daughter) and Oliver

Winchell, a stonemason and plasterer (Melinda's son by her first marriage).

At the age of 91, Henry Pate, honored veteran of the War of 1812 and the Civil War, died Aug. 1, 1883. He was buried in the Springville Cemetery, and his grave is marked by a military stone and two flag holders representing the wars in which he served. His oldest child, Sarah, had died in California in 1864. Daughters Melinda and Rachel, who remained in Iowa, survived their father, as did Reuben and Edwin, who moved to Oregon and California, respectively. Son Phillip's lifespan is unknown.



The council discussed the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). They got some preliminary numbers to do street, water, sewer and storm reconstruction on 5th St. and Circle Drive. They will add this to the plan. They will continue to work on getting some cost estimates to put to the projects so they can start to prioritize the projects.

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, December 16, 2024, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

She has also contacted Mike Coonrod to get some better-quality topsoil for the gardens. They estimate that it will require 8 loads. Mike will charge \$200/load and donate the rest. She has someone lined up to till the gardens this year. They don't have the money to purchase the dirt, and she is asking if the city will help fund the purchase. The council discussed maybe raising the cost of the rental a little. It was also mentioned to possibly look for some sponsors and post a sign in the gardens. Baych made a motion to purchase the 8 loads of dirt for the community gardens, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 51-2024 to approve the 28E agreement with the City of Marion for bulk salt, seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Blakely, Kilburg, Baych. ABSENT: Hollandsworth, Barner. RESOLUTION 51-2024 adopted.

The council reviewed the 2025 Sealcoat work proposal from LL Pelling. We will lock in a price of \$2.90/SY. Baych made a motion to allow Wyman to sign the proposal, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.


