HISTORICAL FEATURE

No SAHS meetings in July, August

The Springville Area Historical Society (SAHS) is in summer recess, with no meetings in July and August. The next meeting will be Sept. 8 at 6:30 p.m. in the SAHS building, next door to City Hall. SAHS will be open briefly on the morning of July 24, in case any RAGBRAI riders going through Springville care to stop in. SAHS met June 9 with nine present, including the Rev. Anna Mae Peck of Vermillion, S.D., a former Springville resident, and Andrea Myli of Waterloo, a graduate student at the University of Northern Iowa who is helping SAHS organize its collection. Bev Franks, president, discussed the Springville Memorial Library's offer to move its microfilm reader and collection of Springville New Era microfilm to SAHS. Members agreed to accept the offer. The microfilm spans the latter 1890s to 1935. Andrea, who is originally from Northwood in Worth County, spoke about her background. She earned her bachelor's degree in anthropology and history at UNI. Her M. A. in history, with an emphasis in public history, will be awarded in December. Andrea has completed several history-related internships and projects in Parkersburg, Cedar Falls, Dubuque, and elsewhere. Historian Karen Taylor presented biographical information about Ardis "Ardi" Dawson Clatterbuck (1924-2013), a long-time Springville resident. Her great-grandson interviewed Ardis when she was in her 80s, and wrote a paper. Boni Moore of Cedar Rapids, Ardis' daughter, gave SAHS a copy of it. Others attending the June meeting were James Crow, vice president; Jean Schmidt, secretary-treasurer; Doug Beard; Rick Heeren; and Duane Schlatter.

Isaac Butler's link with the Meskwaki Tribe

Isaac Butler, a Springville pioneer in 1840, later played a historic role in the beginning of the Meskwaki Indian Settlement in Tama County. On July 13, 1857, the Meskwaki bought their first 80 acres of land from Butler and his four sons, paying \$1,000 in gold. Due to the significance of this transaction, July 13 is an official Meskwaki holiday. Isaac had moved to Tama County in 1852 with his second wife, Susan Browning Newman Butler; sons Philip, David, William, and Ozias; and daughters Susan, Amanda, and Mary Ann. The girls were born at Springville. The children were ages 2 through 19. Writing in 1905, David Butler said the Meskwaki's land payment was delivered to Governor James W. Grimes at Iowa City. It was then brought to the Butlers by Ebenezer Coffin "in a rough sack in his lumber wagon." David noted, "There were no ponies in the payment, as has been so often reported." His account is preserved by the State Historical Society of Iowa. Many (but not all) of the Meskwaki had been living on a reservation in Indian Territory (now Kansas). They wanted to return to Iowa, which had been the tribe's home since about 1735. But selling land to Indians was illegal. Iowa residents petitioned the governor to change this, and in July 1856, the State Legislature passed a law granting the Meskwaki the right to live in Iowa. That first parcel of land is the west half of the southeast quarter of Section 30, Township 83 north, Range 15 west (Tama Township). The Iowa River runs through it. The deed was signed by three Butlers: Isaac, then 63; Philip, 24; and David, 22. Isaac signed as guardian for his two minor sons, William, 20, and Ozias, 19. The Butler family's Tama County home was in Indian Village Township, which borders Tama Township on the west. Isaac was the postmaster of Butlerville (a town he founded) and a justice of the peace – two positions he had previously held at Springville. Butlerville no longer exists; it was northwest of Montour. Isaac Butler lived in Linn County about 12 years and Tama County about 18. Born in 1794 in Greenbrier County, Virginia (now part of West Virginia), he also resided in Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, and Wisconsin before coming to Iowa. He died Feb 20, 1870, while caring for his livestock. His grave is in Maple Grove Cemetery, Montour.

On July 13, 2015, it will be 158 years since the Meskwaki purchased the first land for their settlement. Today that settlement covers more than 8,000 acres – and it all started with 80 acres sold by the Butlers, former residents of Springville.

Mayor Shebetka called the regular meeting of the City Council to order at 6:00 pm in Springville City Hall. Present on roll call: Hoyt, Ralston, Brady, Merritt, and Sindelar.

Consent Agenda: M/by Sindelar, 2ND/by Hoyt to approve the consent agenda as posted. All ayes, m/c.

Citizens with Concerns Not on the Agenda: None

Sheriff: Deputy Egli provided the service log for May 19 through June 1. There were 14 calls for service.

Public Works Maintenance Report: Have been testing the siren, with a little difficulty but fine now. Breaker for Cox Lake

fountain was not working, Gates Electric fixed that. Am nearing the end of pouring cement on the street project, could possibly be open for garage sale days. Not certain of a date but hopefully in 2 to 3 weeks the hydrants will be replaced.

Mayor: Roger presented the signs the High School kids painted. One for Ragbrai, the other the Quarry Run. Thank you kids.

Had a little problem with some people wading in Cox Lake and throwing rocks at the geese. This is forbidden and will not be tolerated. Tractor Pullers have gotten their creek bank stabilized, it looks great.

Clerk: FEMA fund receipts, monthly UB report, and information on new street lighting. At city hall we have been approached about vendor ads in the newsletter.

Cemetery: Cemetery statue was discussed. Jim Koppenhaver has talked with a guy interested in repairing the statue; he will need to look at it to make an estimate. Talk of paying for him to get here, and how. DAR, and several small grants.

Council Workshop: Penny reported on a workshop she attended with Kim. Good training, she came away with an idea to have short term discussions routinely, would help stay focused. Also, the possibility of getting more financial statements on a regular basis.

Old Business- Citizens Advisory Committee: , first meeting in July. Roger appointed Daryl Pearson as an addition to the committee consisting of Treva Davis, Deb Vaughn, Penny Sindelar, Brad Merritt and John Bohlken. This group is to look into the viability of 256 Broadway as a new City Hall, and the current salt shed be refurbished as the new maintenance building.

Affordable Care Act: A True North representative gave a presentation on the regulations with the Affordable Care Act.

Remote Read Meters: in packet is notice to bidders. Questions weather council can look at bids or better for Shoemaker and Haaland, as they would understand the variances and bonding better. Set date for bid opening on June 12th at 10 a.m.

Kurt Gillette: discussed solutions. Difficult to decide what to do. City cannot aid one homeowner more than another. Decision was made to remove this topic from the agenda, and readdress it at budget time next year.

Salt Shed: put on hold till budget amendment is done.

Elson Property, Weed Complaint: Clerk to send certified letter to joint property owners, requesting mowing of weeds.

5th Street Bridge Project: M/by Brady, 2nd by Sindelar, directing Todd and Karen to contact engineers to move forward with the 5th street bridge project. All ayes, m/c.

Tax abatement Request for 106 8th streets- M/by Ralston, 2nd/by Merritt to approve tax abatement request, all ayes, m/c.

Mayor's Report to City Council regarding submission of 2015-2016 City Budget and amended City budget to the state, and submission of payroll taxes to federal government. The 941 tax report and the budget submission were both late.

Motion by Brady, 2nd by Hoyt to give City Clerk a written notice/warning, to be put in her personnel file for disciplinary action. Including no more late submissions of required documents and payments will be tolerated.

Roll Call vote, Ralston nay, Merritt nay, Sindelar nay, Hoyt aye, and Brady aye, motion failed.

Present on roll call: Hoyt, Ralston, Brady, and Merritt. Absent was Sindelar.

Consent Agenda: Motion by Ralston, second by Brady to approve the consent agenda as posted. All ayes, Sindelar absent, motion carried.

Citizens with Concerns Not on the Agenda:

-Rick Evans, Tractor Pullers President wanted to thank the city for the use of the back hoe to unload the new barricades for their track. They have their portion of the creek bank done, even the seeding, so will return their permit to the DNR.

-A citizen approached Roger about having chickens in town. They were told to bring it to the council.

-Mareta and Doug Ralston attended the 21st Annual Fire Fighters Memorial in Iowa City, Ray Wyman's name was added to the wall, he had 55+ years of service.

Sheriff: Deputy Joe Lamere provided the service log for June 1, 2015 through June 15, 2015. There were 9 calls for service and 104.6 hours logged.

Public Works Maintenance Report:

The new side walk is complete between the maintenance shop and the fire department. Have done the MOR for the month of May. Have done some tree trimming at cemetery and 8th street. We received a warranty check for the backhoe tires, it covered about half the new tire cost. Presented to council water and sewer gallons YTD.

The council would like Todd to install some at least temporary no parking signs in the proximity of the softball diamond, with the possibility of making it permanent.

Mayor: Roger reported there was no installers show up to the bid opening meeting. Todd and he will meet with the gentleman from Marion to go over the specs and learn his concerns.

Clerk: Clerk reported things are going fine at the office, with very full days. Am using the aid of the Iowa League of Cities, and a few local clerks when in need.

Old Business - Cemetery Mowing Bid: It is the recommendation of the Cemetery Committee to hire Tom Donaldson for \$395 per mowing for the remainder of the 2015 mowing season and another 2 years per contract. Other bidders were, Paradise Landscaping for \$395, Wright Lawn Care for \$450, and Minger Mowing for \$570. With the city attorney present, he stated there is no concern with a conflict of interest having Kim in city hall and Tom employed to mow. M/by Brady, 2nd by Hoyt to accept the Resolution #19-2015 awarding the mowing contract for the Springville Cemetery to Tom Donaldson, all ayes, Sindelar absent, motion carried. Tom has insurance filed at clerk's office.

Discussion on Ragbrai funding. After a lot of discussion, we need more information, especially on the minimum requirements of the Ragbrai group. Clerk to research this.

M/by Brady, 2nd by Merritt to accept the **resignation of Karen Anderson** as City Hall and Community Center Janitor, P & Z Board and Board of Adjustments member. Hoyt Nay, 3 Ayes, Sindelar absent, m/c. Discussion with no action on **temporary, part-time office staff employee**. Clerk to put information out on Clerk Net, and with the League of Cities. Looking at possibly a "contract" employee.

Discussion with no action on **City Hall and Community Center Janitor position**. This is tabled till options are looked into.

M/by Hoyt, 2nd by Merritt to approve the request of a **\$40 sponsorship for the Mayor's Trophy** for the St. Isidore's Care Show. Last year there were 101 cars and more than 350 attended. Ally Ayes, Sindelar absent, motion carried.

Motion by Brady, 2nd by Hoyt to approve the amended budget and set the public hearing date of June 29th at 6 PM in city hall, for the adoption of **Resolution #15-2015 Amending the City Budget for FY 2014-15**. All Ayes, Sindelar absent, motion carried.

Resolution #14-2015, setting wages for all city Employees for the FY 2015-16- Tabled. Motion by Hoyt, 2nd by Brady to bring stipend discussion back and talk with Zane Benefits. All Ayes, Sindelar absent, m/c. Discussion and possible action- Roger to read "The Library Board has made the recommendation to **re-appoint Treva Davis to the Library Board**, I so agree. I would like a motion and a 2nd from the council supporting this." Motion by Brady, 2nd by Ralston, Sindelar absent, motion carried.

Correspondence: Todd spoke-A citizen was concerned with the Blue Paint used to mark the sidewalks that need repaired or replaced. This individual had his sidewalk leveled up and now the paint will not come off, we might consider setting policy on this topic. The yard waste site is very full and in need of chipping. Bug is extremely busy and so Todd will contact the county and possibly haul to their site. Todd asked that all of council look at the east end of Mill Avenue, to discuss what action to take to correct that part of the street. Next Meeting: Budget Amendment Hearing June 29, 2015

Planning & Zoning Commission Meeting Minutes of June 23, 2015

Chairperson Pearson called the meeting of the Planning and Zoning Commission to order at 6:03 p.m. in City Hall. Present on roll call: Koppenhaver, Boren, Fowler, Council Merritt, and Pearson. One seat remains vacant. Also present, Iris Trampe, Susan Cooper, Donna Noggle, and Inspector Neal Caraway. Motion by Koppenhaver, 2nd by Fowler to approve the minutes of the April 15th and May 13th, 2015 meetings. All ayes, motion carried.

Lengthy discussion was held on the Elson Property- also in attendance for this was Corey Hodack-developer, Josh an engineer with Hall and Hall, and neighboring property owner Donna Noggle. Daryl acknowledged the new changes, Corey gave more details to these changes. Donna asked of the setbacks on the private drive hammerhead, and wondered about just removing it. She was assured it was an adequate setback. Josh referred to the Fire Departments need for a turnaround at the end of the private drive, Daryl suggested leaving it as presented as it can always be removed. It is also a place to push snow. This is a private drive, and will be maintained by the condominium association, per Corey. Donna asked if there was an agreement that none of the residences will be rental properties. No there is not. Councilman Merritt would like to hear Todd's opinion if the water and sewer is currently adequate to handle this project. Also, how will the changes to Burr Oaks be handled. The city will be responsible to update the road to reach the entrance to the new development, and then the development takes it from there. Neal asked if this property was in the City's 5 year plan, yes it is. Everyone looked at the map of the City's sewer system layout. Josh noted that manhole #2 is at an adequate depth, where #28 is too high. Board would like the city's engineers, Todd's, and the Fire Departments to look at the plans. Motion by Koppenhaver, 2nd by Fowler to recommend this copy of the Elson Edition be presented to the City Council, All Ayes, motion carried.

Neal Caraway assisted in the discussion over the writing of permits, what procedures, fees, and requirements the board and city would like to use. Neal is the Inspector for the City of Marion and also does Springville's inspections. He walked everyone through how he charges, and gave his suggestions. Several in attendance will work together to create our final forms. Council Merritt and the Clerk will get started on it.

Motion by Boren, 2nd by Fowler to recommend to the City Council a new member to the Planning and Zoning Board, Nick Besler. All Ayes, motion carried.

Chairman adjourned the meeting at 7:14 pm.

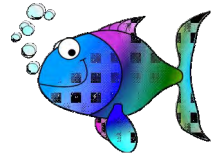
