Starting on July 3rd, 2018

Garbage Pick up Day changes to Tuesday.

GARBAGE

You can continue to use your current garbage can and recycling bin. Please do not load more than 40 pounds. In place of tags, your solid waste portion of your water bill will be \$12.75 per month to cover all the garbage and recycling pickup. Yard waste fees will not change.

Tag-less Tuesdays means no more tags are needed for garbage.

Tag-less Tuesdays also means garbage pick up will be on Tuesdays instead of Wednesdays. It is highly recommended

2 Can Limit that you have your garbage/recycling out Monday night.

The new vendor is Wapsi Waste. Wapsi will pickup two cans and recycling from your curb.

RECYCLING

Newspaper, cans, aluminum, plastic, paper, cardboard, magazines, paper bags, are all picked up as recycling. Glass, such as bottles, jars, or containers, are not picked up. Glass items have a high insurance expense and are too costly to be hauled.

Window glass, mirrors, light bulbs, pottery, cookware and ceramics are also not recyclable.

Plastic shopping bags are not recyclable and can jam the

recyclable sorting machines. Please do not put plastic shopping bags in your recycling. No changes to

A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

Boxwells lived on Springville's South Side, 1920s to 1950s

Readers have reported two South Side locations for Charlie and Mae Boxwell. One was on the northeast corner of High Avenue and Fifth Street, now a vacant lot. The other, 312 High Ave., is Dennis and Susan Denny's address, the northeast corner of High Avenue and Fourth Street.

The abstract for 312 High Ave. shows that Mae Wiles Boxwell inherited this property, with a house that is no longer standing, from her uncle, Daniel W. Shellhammer. At 92, he died May 27, 1928. Boxwells had come to Springville at least three years before his death.

They were in Dunkerton July 22, 1923, for son William Orville's birth. On May 10, 1925, Bertha was born in Springville. Others were Margaret, born in 1913; Eunice, 1915; and Dorothy, 1921.

Behind (north of) the Boxwell home was a barn that housed several milk goats, plus two small mules that hauled coal, gravel, and other material. Charlie did various odd jobs. Dave Kelley of Springville said the family drank goat milk, but he thought they did not sell it to customers.

Charlie's goats grazed in ditches

Springville residents of a certain age might recall Charlie's goats tethered to graze in ditches. Goats could be seen in front of the Butler farm south of Springville, and along the highway west of town (151 was two lanes then, with much lighter traffic).

Three Boxwell girls graduated from Springville High School - Margaret in

1931; Eunice, 1935; and Dorothy, 1939. Margaret, first to marry, became Mrs. John E. Wilcox in 1936. In the 1940 census, only Bill and Bertha were at home. During World War II, Bill was in the Navy

On March 30, 1950, Mae Boxwell was granted a divorce. She received the family home, and \$15 per week alimony. Charlie had to pay court costs, including \$100 for Mae's attorney. Reason for the divorce is unknown.

Charlie and Mae eventually moved to Monticello. They apparently remarried, as their names, followed by "wife and husband," appear on a Sept. 30, 1966, warranty deed for sale of the 312 High Avenue property. The buyer was Carl Denny, father of Dennis.

Charlie Boxwell, 77, died in February 1968. Mae died at 86 in November 1973. They are buried side by side in Monticello's Oakwood Cemetery. In Springville, memories of Charlie

and his goats live on.

Boxwell brothers were Colorado natives

Charles Lennox Boxwell Jr. was born in Colorado Dec. 29, 1890. His Iowa-born father, Charles L. Boxwell Sr., headed west from the Linn Grove area at age 31 for his health. In Colorado Springs, he met Mary Hole, a native of England. They married Nov. 18, 1885.

The couple moved to La Junta, Otero County, where sons William and Charles Jr. were born. Both parents died of pneumonia in March 1900, orphaning their boys at 12 and 9. Later that year, the brothers moved to lowa. They lived at Linn Grove with their widowed grandmother, Elizabeth Huston Boxwell, a native of Scotland.

Charlie's brother, William Huston Boxwell, was born May 5, 1887. He married Lueretta Amy Eldred (Steve Eldred's great aunt) in 1908. Their children were Carmen (Mrs. Harold Palmer), Willard, Lloyd, and Lolen. William died Dec. 22, 1918, in the flu epidemic. He never saw his youngest son, Lolen, born July 6, 1919.

96 years ago, baby girl thrown into creek by accident

The following article is from the Springville New Era April 27, 1922. The story was in the Mount Vernon Hawkeye dated

one week earlier, and also in the Cedar Rapids paper.

"When Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Gray and party were thrown into a swollen creek down a ten-foot bank, by the soft earth of a new grade giving way under their automobile, their ten-week-old baby floated away down the stream but was later rescued unharmed.

"Mr. and Mrs. Gray, who reside on the Dr. Parker farm east of Lisbon; the baby; and a cousin were driving north of Lisbon when the accident happened. It was necessary to break the glass of the windshield in order that the occupants might escape, but none of the party suffered injury in the mishap."

Story has Springville connection

Mrs. Gray, the former Bessie Leola Wild, was a half sister of Bernita Wild Andersen of Springville. In April 1922, Bessie was 22, Bernita 2. Bessie's parents were William K. and Lucy Day Wild. Bessie, born July 29, 1900, married Lloyd H. Gray, a

Their baby, Betty Maldean Gray, was born March 3, 1922. She was no more than six and a half (not 10) weeks old when she almost drowned. In the 1940 census, Lloyd, Bessie, and Betty, 18, were living on Elm Street in Anamosa. Betty was the


Grays' only child.

Lloyd Gray died in October 1954 at Lebanon, Ind. Bessie died Oct. 13, 1966, at Cedar Rapids. Both are interred in Cedar Memorial Park Cemetery, Cedar Rapids. Their daughter Betty married Frank August Mortier, nine years her senior. Bernita recalled that the Mortiers moved from Cedar Rapids to Indiana, either Lebanon or Whitestown.

Betty and Frank Mortier had three daughters, Bernita said. Frank was manager of the J. C. Penney store in Lebanon. After he died in May 1989, Betty moved to Zionsville, an Indianapolis suburb. She died April 11, 2000 - 78 years after her near-

drowning in an lowa creek.

William Wild's children: Bessie Gray's full sister was Izetta Opal Wild Helbig, born in 1904. William Wild married his second wife, Lydia Wilhelmina "Mina" Muenstermann, in 1918. Their children were Bernita Wild (1920-2013), who married Kenneth Andersen, and Robert B. Wild (1922-1955) of California.

William Wild, an Englishman's son

William K. Wild was the third of 13 children of David Wild, a native of Cumberland County, England. David, born in 1836, came to the U.S. in 1858, living in Dubuque and Grant County Wis. He married Mary Ann Kay, and was in the Eighth Wisconsin Infantry in the Civil War.

He and his family moved to Linn County, Iowa, in 1868 and settled on a farm in Section 8, Brown Township (northwest of Whittier). David resided there 42 years. After losing his wife in 1909, he moved to

Springville. David Wild died Aug.

31, 1920. David's children, besides William, were Sarah "Sade" Pearson, Grace Calvert, Jennie Smith, John A. S. Wild, Charles S. Wild, Alice Cooper, George H. Wild, Rosa Mae Hakes, Edd Wild, and Leona, Bertha, and Fred


Historical Society meets again in September



2018-2019 Water/Sewer, Solid & Yard Waste Rates

Ordinance 1-2018 was adopted by the Springville City Council on May 21, 2018.

Water Rates: Water service shall be furnished at the following rates within the City:

- Meter Rates. Service provided through meters shall be charged as follows:
 - A. First 2,000 gallons used per month @ \$14.84 minimum charge);
 - B. All usage over 2,000 gallons per month @ \$7.42 per 1,000 gallons or part thereof.
- Bulk Rates. Water used for commercial purposes from the pump, at the tower, or from hydrants or hoses shall be paid for at the rate of \$6.00 per 1,000 gallons.
- Automatic Increase. Water rates shall automatically increase three percent (3%) thereafter on July 1 annually starting July 1, 2019, unless such increase is waived or modified by resolution of the Council prior to the effective date of this increase.

Sewer Rates: There shall be and there are hereby established sewer service charges for the use of and for the service supplied by the municipal sanitary sewer utility based upon the amount and rate of water consumed, as follows:

1. First 2,000 gallons or lesser amount @ \$17.50 per month (minimum charge).

All usage over 2,000 gallons per month @ \$8.75 per 1,000 gallons (service charge).

Sewer rates shall automatically increase three percent (3%) thereafter on July 1 annually starting July 1, 2019, unless such increase is waived or modified by resolution of the Council prior to the effective date of this increase.

Solid Waste and Yard Waste Disposal:

1. Recycling. The fee for the collection of recyclables is \$5.25 per month for single-family residential premises only.

2. Yard Waste Disposal. The regular fee for the maintenance and use of the yard waste disposal site is \$4.25 per month. This yard wste fee will be charged to each single-family dwelling within the city.

 Garbage. The fee for the collection of garbage is \$7.50 per month for single-family residential premises only.

The Clerk's reported that the new waste vendor would pickup commercial as well as residential waste as long as the business lets City Hall know and no more than two cans and recycling is put out each week (as with residential). Archery is legal inside city limits as long as it is on private property, written permission from council is required for archery on public property, except the school which may approve archery on school ground. A vendor has been found who can catch/neuter/release feral cats. The clerk was directed to create a first draft of possible pet ordinances for the council to consider at future meetings to include, pet licensing as funding, catch/neuter/release.

Public Works reported that the work on the 5th Street and Sewer Rehabilitation projects was proceed well. Weather and some discovered, underground issues have delayed a couple of days, but the projects remain well within schedule and budget. Residents are being notified as soon as possible of future disturbances to traffic, water, and sewer flows. Motioned by Merritt, seconded by Thies, to accept the Library Board of Trustees recommendation for Deb Vaughn to renew her term. All ayes, motion carried. Mayor Shebetka officially appointed Deb Vaughn to the Library Board of Trustees.

Motioned by Merritt, seconded by Grimley, to accept Resolution 38-2018 setting the library wages and salaries for employees of the Springville Memorial Library. Ayes: Thies, Merritt, Grimley, Andersen, Ralston. Nays: none. Motion carried.

Motioned by Merritt, seconded by Grimley, to accept the application of Iris Trampe for the Board of Adjustments. All

ayes, motion carried. Mayor Shebetka officially appointed Iris Trampe to the Board of Adjustments.

Motioned by Grimley, seconded by Thies, to accept Resolution 39-2018 to authorize a fire operations agreement with Brown Township. Ayes: Thies, Merritt, Grimley, Andersen, Ralston. Nays: none. Motion carried.

Motioned by Andersen, seconded by Ralston, to accept Mark Bloom's resignation. All ayes, motion carried.

Motioned by Ralston, seconded by Merritt, to hire Deputy City Clerk Dee Wagaman as the interim City Clerk at a pay rate of \$14.62. This position will be effective June 19, 2018 until August 31, 2018. Ayes: Ralston, Merritt, Thies, Andersen, Grimley. Nays: none. Motion carried.

Motioned by Andersen, seconded by Ralston, to hire Assistant City Clerk Michele Weinschenk as the interim Deputy City Clerk at a pay rate of \$12.00. This position will be effective June 19, 2018 until August 31, 2018. Ayes: Ralston, Merritt, Thies, Andersen, Grimley. Nays: none. Motion carried.

Discussion was held on City Hall hours. The council is in favor of making the office hours from 7:30AM to 4PM. This would also keep the office open during the lunch hour.

Discussion was held on the July council meetings. The council decided that since the next meeting falls on July 2nd, they would move the regular July council meetings to July 9, 2018 and July 23, 2018.

Todd Wyman reviewed the maintenance department report.

Mayor Shebetka thanked Wagaman and Weinschenk for their hard work and willingness to step up.

Andersen updated the council on the old Kubota lawn mower. We were denied for our insurance claim. The council will put it for sale with a sealed bid.

Interim City Clerk Dee Wagaman explained to the council that Ordinance 1-2018 that raised garbage, recycling and yard waste rates has the incorrect amount on file. The council will look at options to correct this.
