# WATER/SEWER RATE INCREASE

A Public Hearing was held Monday, June 19, 2023 at 6:00 p.m. to amend chapters 92 & 99 to increase water and sewer rates. The council is proposing to raise the water base rate charge 2% and the water overage rate by \$0.39/1,000 gallons. They are also proposing to increase the sewer debt fee by \$1.75/month. Council voted to approve the first reading of the ordinance. The second reading of this ordinance will be during the July 10, 2023 City Council Meeting.







# A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

# Gladys Howland preserved 1915-1918 high school memories

."The Girl Graduate: Her Own Book" is the title of a scrapbook compiled more than a century ago by Gladys Howland, who received her diploma in 1919 from Springville High School. She would have graduated a year later, had she not advanced directly from first to third grade. At that time, gifted students were allowed to skip an elementary school grade.

The scrapbook, which preserves memories of Gladys' high school years, was recently acquired by Peg Mason Ewart of Cedar Rapids, formerly of Springville. It measures 6 by 9 1/4 inches and is almost 1 1/2 inches thick. The size may be small, but it contains a wealth of memories from a bygone era.

Gladys Eldora Howland was born Aug. 19, 1902, at Springville to George "Frank" and Lulu Oxley Howland. After high school, Gladys earned her B. A. degree at Coe College. She then taught at Viola, Grandview in Louisa County, and Cedar Rapids Grant High School. On Feb. 25, 1934, she married George Lafe Drips of Martelle. They had one daughter, Ruth Elaine Drips (1935-2023), who remained single.

When Gladys was a senior, **A. Paul Cutler** was superintendent and **Hallie Jennison** principal. They also

taught classes. Faculty members included Grace Hunte, French; Lora Hunt, economics and domestic science (home ec); and Marie Bowersox, physical education. Miss Hunte later married Elmer Wellner of Springville. Miss Bowersox was a sister of Springville resident Mrs. Cora "Bess" Burroughs.

The 1919 senior class was the largest since Springville's first commencement in 1886. Of 21 seniors, 13 were girls, and three of them were named Gladys. The other two were **Gladys Falcon Sivers** and **Gladys Dawson Aildsen**. Classmates **Lee Andrew "Andy" Johnston** and **Margaret Gearhart** married in 1930. Margaret was the longest-lived class member; she died at 101 in 2003.

Charlotte Roberts Moore lived only 20 years; she died in February 1922. Before she became ill, she taught at country schools for two years. She was the last teacher at Paralta School in spring term in 1921.

In 1918-1919, special senior-year occasions included a senior-junior reception **Dec. 8.** However, Gladys "took sick with Spanish influenza" four days before the event and couldn't attend. Unlike many other people who contracted that flu, she survived and returned to good health.

April 24 was the date of the 31st annual junior-senior banquet. The four-course menu featured fruit cocktail, Creole chicken and mashed potatoes, apple salad with wafers, and for dessert, ice cream, cake, salted nuts, and hot cocoa.

On May 8, the girls' gym class hosted a weiner roast for senior girls. It was to be held under the railroad bridge west of town, but rain forced a move to the gym (no bonfire). The senior class play, "Kicked Out of College," was staged May 9 in the Butler Opera House. Adults paid 35 cents; children under 12, a quarter. Gladys portrayed Mrs. B. J. Benbow, a suffragette. (Women didn't get the vote until 1920.)

The baccalaureate service (now a vanished tradition) was conducted May 11 at the Springville Presbyterian Church by the Rev. R. A. Brough. Class Night (another victim of time) took place May 11 in the Springville Methodist Church. Gladys had the opening number in the program, a piano solo.

Commencement was May 16 in the Methodist Church. Following that was an alumni reception in the Knights of Pythias hall. The K of P was a fraternal or-



ganization; its hall was somewhere in downtown Springville, but the exact location is not known. To both events, Gladys wore a hand-sewn dress of white organdy, trimmed with tucks and a ruffles. A swatch of the material is in her scrapbook — 104 years later.

Gladys Howland Drips died Nov. 23, 1994, at age 92. Her husband, 94, died two years later. They and their daughter are interred in the Springville Cemetery.

THE RED ROSE was the class flower of Springville High School's 1919 graduates. Their motto was "Climb, tho' the rocks be rugged."

A MAJOR WORLD event during Gladys Howland's senior year of high school was the end of World War I, marked Nov. 11, 1918, by the signing of the Armistice.

ANECDOTE FROM Gladys Howland's high school scrapbook: "John Little signed his name at the board in First Year French 'Jean Petit' (French for John Little). Miss Shepherd thot (sic) is should be 'Jean Grand' (French for John Tall as he was over 6 feet). The next year, Miss Hunte kindly informed him that was not his name."

# City Council Regular Meeting

June 5, 2023

The Springville City Council met in regular session on June 5, 2023.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Bart Barner, Cindy Kilburg, Jeff Baych, Karla Blakely, and Brad Merritt. City staff present: Public Works Supervisor Todd Wyman, City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Daryl & Shelly Pearson, Treva Davis, Jim Koppenhaver, Mark Parmenter, and Deputy Peas were also in attendance.

Blakely made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Baych made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of May 15, 2023, meeting minutes, claims, and American Legion's Class C Liquor License with Outdoor service and Sunday Sales, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report, Library Report, Public Works Report, Treasurer's Report, and Clerk Report.

Mayor invited citizens with input to speak. There being no public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Wagaman presented to council the need to update all the desktops/monitors in city hall and the shop. This has been discussed with VC3 who is getting a quote but anticipates each station to cost between \$1,500-\$2,000. There is money in the current budget to get these replaced. Baych made a motion to purchase four workstations w/monitors for no more than \$15,000 total, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Baych, Barner, Merritt, Blakely.

Council discussed getting a sidewalk installed on the east side of 8th St. from 1st Ave to Mill Ave. Shive-Hattery found the property pins and there is more room on the east side of the street than the west side of the street. It would be very difficult for the sidewalk to continue on the south side of 1st since there are two utility poles in the walkway. Nothing was discussed for the need for sidewalk on Mill Ave. Wagaman just received an email regarding possible funding from the IDOT for safe walkways. She will get more information on this. No further plans were made.

Council discussed water/sewer rates. Wagaman recommends adding \$1.75 to the sewer debt service fee and presented several scenarios for the water rates. After lengthy discussion, council settled on raising the base rate for water by 2%, then the charge for each 1,000 gallons would be charged at a rate of \$8.11. That would be  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the base rate so that those using more gallons are paying the same for water as they are for the first 2,000.

Blakely made a motion to approve Resolution 35-2023 to set a public hearing for June 19, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. for water/sewer rates, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Blakely, Merritt, Barner, Baych. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 35-2023 adopted.** 

Blakely made a motion to enter into closed session pursuant to lowa Code Section 21.5(j) to discuss the purchase of particular real estate where premature disclosure could be reasonably expected to increase the price the governmental body would have to pay for that property or reduce the price the governmental body would receive for that property, seconded by Barner. RCV: Baych, Blakely, Barner, Kilburg, Merritt. Council entered into closed session at 6:51 p.m.

Barner made a motion to come out of closed session at 7:52 p.m., seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Blakely, Kilburg, Merritt, Barner, Baych. NAYS: None. **Council exited closed session.** 

Blakely moved that the City purchase the land from Daryl and Shelly Pearson as shown in Parcel A, Plat of Survey #2664 for total purchase of \$6,750, the City will agree to pay for all transfer of title costs including preparation of warranty deed, groundwater hazard statement, and declaration of value, and

the associated filing fees with the Linn County Recorder. She further moved that the City will be responsible to remove the tree that will be sitting on the property line after the City acquires title to the subject property and the City will also agree to pay the filing fee with the Linn County Recorder for the fully executed partial release of the real estate mortgage for the Pearsons. She also moved that the council vote in favor of the City attorney preparing a purchase agreement with all terms and conditions and grant the Mayor authority to sign the purchase agreement on behalf of the City, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Baych, Merritt, Kilburg, Blakely, Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, June 19, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Baych moved to adjourn at 7:55 p.m., seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

# **City Council Special Meeting**

June 19, 2023

The Springville City Council met in regular session on June 19, 2023. Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Brad Merritt, Karla Blakely, Jeff Baych, Cindy Kilburg, Bart Barner. City staff present: Public Works Supervisor Todd Wyman, City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Treva Davis, Jim Koppenhaver, Julie Neebel and Courtney Wand of Origin Design, Mike Dobos, Jim Holz of MSA, and Ben Bruner of Dickinson Law were also in attendance.

Baych made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

Barner made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of June 5, 2023, meeting minutes, and claims, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report, Library Report, Public Works Report, Engineer's Report, and Clerk Report.

Mayor invited citizens with input to speak. Mike Dobos of 602 1st Ave spoke to the nuisances identified on his property. All the vehicles now have current tags on them. He is making progress with the firewood which is currently being cut and stacked. His downed fence has been rolled up and he will be reinstalling it. He has switched jobs and is still trying to get used to the hours. He is concerned that Alliant dug out a large pipe and he is not sure what to do with that. Wagaman will check on the pipe with Alliant. There being no other public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Mayor Andersen opened the public hearing to review water/sewer rates at 6:18pm. Mr. Dobos spoke in favor of raising rates to continue to provide a quality product. Noone spoke against the proposed water/sewer rates. There has been no correspondence in the office. Kilburg made a motion to close the public hearing at 6:19pm, seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Barner, Baych, Merritt, Blakely, Kilburg. NAYS: None. **PUBLIC HEARING CLOSED.** 

Council still agreed to the original proposal. They propose to raise the Sewer Debt Fee by \$1.75 and to raise the water base rate by 2% and the water overage rate by \$0.39/1,000 gallons. Baych made a motion to approve the 1st reading of Ordinance 2-2023, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Blakely, Merritt, Baych, Barner. NAYS: None. 1st READING OF ORDINANCE 2-2023 PASSED.

Council will wait to consider the 2<sup>nd</sup> reading until the July 10<sup>th</sup> meeting.

Mayor Andersen moved to line item 13. The committee (Andersen, Kilburg,

Barner) reviewed with the council the two proposals for the engineering of the 5th Ave bridge project. The committee explained that they went through

the two proposals (Origin Designs & MSA) to verify that they both included the same scope of work. They felt like both companies would do a great job but went with the lowest bid (MSA). Julie from Origin suggested that both companies be allowed to present to council so to answer any questions. Merritt would like to talk to the committee more about their reasons and to go through the bids a little bit more. Barner stated that council is being proactive with the help of a grant. Barner made a motion to hire MSA for the 5th Ave Bridge Project, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Barner, Baych, Kilburg. NAYS: Blakely, Merritt.

Council discussed annexation request from Springville Properties. P & Z has reviewed the application and recommends approving the annexation. Blakely made a motion to approve Resolution 37-2023 to set a public hearing for the annexation request, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Merritt, Blakely, Baych, Kilburg, Barner. NAYS: None. RESO-LUTION 37-2023 adopted.

Merritt made a motion to approve Kelly Devore's appointment to the Library Board, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Wyman explained to council that a joint on Broadway St is pushed down and cracked. This will need to be repaired. He has reached out to Eastern lowa to get a quote. Will update council when a quote is available.

Mayor reminded council that staff had received a \$1.00/hour raise in January to help with the rising cost of living. It is anticipated that inflation will come back to the 3-3 1/2% range. Mayor presented Council with his proposal for staff wages. The monthly stipend was discussed. Barner agreed with the proposal. Merritt liked the proposal but also liked that the wages could be reviewed again in 6 mos. Council was agreeable to the proposal. Kilburg made a motion to approve Resolution 36-2023 to accept the FY24 staff wages, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Merritt, Barner, Baych, Kilburg. ABSTAIN: Blakely. RESOLUTION 36-2023 adopted.

Mayor Andersen has suggested that Council take a Monday off in July. They have covered a lot of ground and would be a good time to take time off. Merritt made a motion to cancel the July 24th council meeting. seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, July 10, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall. There being no further discussion, Baych moved to adjourn at 7:03 p.m., seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.
