

# **Do you remember when . . .** Stories from some 1947 Springville HS graduates

Springville High School's 70-year class will be among those honored June 3 at the alumni banquet. On May 29, 1947, diplomas were given to 26 seniors. Now there are eight: **Zelda Kinkead**, Springville and Fort Myers, Fla.; **Wava Terry**, Dubuque; **Patsy Harderson**, Anamosa; **Anita Schons**, Cedar Rapids; **Ann Janssen**, Cedar Falls; **George B. Whaley**, Sioux Falls, S. D.; **Dale Holst**, Hayden, Ida.; and **Dorothy Brunscheen**, Florence, Ariz.

As **Wava Peck**, Mrs. Terry came to Springville from Eddyville in second grade, when her widowed mother married dentist Claude Wells. She recalls all-school assemblies to say goodbye to older students drafted for World War II, and others to welcome back men who returned from service to finish school. Two were in the Class of '47.

Wava enjoyed playing in Roy Schwab's band. "My most embarrassing moment occurred when I fell off the back of the risers (during rehearsal) with a tuba and metal folding chair," she said. "It was a music-stopping event." She was unhurt, but some buttons popped open. Howard Briner Jr., helping untangle her from the horn and chair, said, "You may want to button up your dress."

Mrs. Harderson (**Patsy Archibald**) had throat problems and missed many days of school in seventh grade, so she repeated that year, joining the class of 1947. She played clarinet in band and sang in various vocal music groups. Miss Geneva Waters, who taught vocal music and English at Springville for many years, was "kind of strict," Patsy said.

She also remembers construction of the new high school in 1938-1939, when she was a fifth grader. As an elementary school pupil, she had to wear long tan stockings – at her mother's insistence. "I hated them," Patsy declared. "As soon as I got to school, I would roll them down so they looked like anklets."

Mrs. Schons (Anita Calvert) went to Springville School from first through 12th grades. Musically gifted, she was in demand as a soloist at weddings, and also sang in several high school groups. She took piano lessons from Mrs. Margaret "Maggie" Emmons, and also learned boogie-woogie and jazz, popular with teens.

Anita's father, Carl Calvert, was seriously injured about 1941 in a target rifle shooting accident. During his long hospital stay, Anita lived with her uncle and aunt, Ed and Lora Harris, near Linn Grove Presbyterian Church. Used

#### to town life, she was unhappy about being sent to the quiet country! (Her younger sister Vera stayed at the home of Kendall and June Gibson in town.)

**Boyd Whaley** (he used his middle name then) came to Springville in 11th grade from Cedar Rapids Franklin High School. He reminisced: "In the spring of the year, roads were nearly impassable . . . I recall double-dating using an F-20 Farmall as transportation. My date and I stood on the drawbar (my hand around her waist for stability), while the driver's date sat on his lap and steered. We arrived at the dance muddied but unbowed."

He didn't mention his No. 1 rating for French horn solo in the May 1947 regional national music contest at St. Joseph, Mo. (reported in by the Central City paper). George Boyd Whaley's distinguished career included playing in the U. S. Air Force Band and teaching in four states.

# 70 years ago: 7 high school teachers

In the 1946-47 school year, the Springville High School faculty numbered seven: Eric Jordan, Roy T. Schwab, Mrs. Beulah Sparr, Howard and Bonnie Strong, Lewis G. Thoma, and Miss Geneva Waters. Mr. Thoma was also superintendent. Monday, Sept. 2, 1946, was the first day of school. The K-12 enrollment of 374 was an increase of 23 over the previous year.

Heavy snowfall and extreme cold caused the closing of school from noon Jan. 29 until Feb. 12, 1947. The county basketball tournament had to be postponed. In early February, the Clarence Robertson family a mile north of town gave overnight housing to 14 people who were stuck in a snowdrift.

But spring arrived eventually. On Saturday, May 24, the senior class enjoyed a one-day trip to McGregor, where they picnicked by the Mississippi; Prairie du Chien, Wis.; and Dubuque, where they had supper and attended a show. Superintendent Thoma and his wife Aileen accompanied the class, and Ray McCleary drove the chartered bus.

On Tuesday, June 3, an 8 p.m. alumni reception was held at the high school. Refreshments were served, and a program with dancing followed. Postmaster Glenn C. Bowdish, Class of 1922, was in charge of reservations.


### SAHS member finds two Brown descendants

The Springville Area Historical Society (SAHS) will meet Tuesday, June 13, at 6:30 p.m. in the SAHS building next door to City Hall. Anyone interested in local history is welcome to attend.

The May 9 SAHS meeting was held exactly 156 years after the arrival of the first train into Springville. Eleanor Stewart Kelley said that in spring 1941, she took the train daily from Viola to Springville to complete her freshman year of high school. Her parents had moved into the Viola school district March 1 that year. As a sophomore, junior, and senior, she attended Viola High School.

Bev Franks reported locating two descendants of Nathan Brown, Annette Brown of Texas and Ralph Martin of California. They are three-greats grandchildren of Nathan's daughter Harriet, who married Solomon C. Peckham in 1843 in Linn County. Their children were Celina Peckham Wood, Hamilton N., Philip E., Martha Peckham Shearer, and Guy C. Peckham.

Secretary/Treasurer Jean Schmidt suggested having copies of the June Springville News at the Springville High School alumni banquet June 3. #### SPRINGVILLE CITY COUNCIL Regular Meeting Minutes May 1, 2017

The pledge of allegiance was recited to begin the meeting.

Mayor Shebetka called the regular meeting of the Springville City Council to order at 6:00 pm in Springville City Hall. Present on roll call: Dennis Thies, Brad Merritt, Pat Hoyt, and Mareta Ralston. Penny Sindelar was absent. Also in attendance were: Public Works Supervisor Todd Wyman, Jennifer Wyman, Deputy City Clerk Dee Wagaman, Treva Davis, Mark Bloom, and Cynthia Stimson.

M/B Ralston, 2nd/B Thies, to approve the consent agenda. All ayes. M/C.

Acting City Clerk Cynthia Stimson discussed the new claims format.

Treva Davis stated that the Library Board has some budget changes that she will discuss with staff and get incorporated into a proposed budget amendment.

A Professional Services Agreement with Justin Cambell was discussed. It was decided to wait until the City has received interest about a possible annexation or development.

The status of Water Street was discussed. No action will be taken at this time. Adjacent property owners are to be notified to remove vehicles.

Bob Tobin, with Shoemaker and Haaland, discussed the construction documents from Elite Developers for Spring Meadows 4<sup>th</sup> Addition. M/B Merritt, 2nd/B Thies to approve the construction plans for Spring Meadows 4<sup>th</sup> Addition. Ayes: Hoyt,

Ralston, Merritt, and Thies. Absent: Sindelar. M/C.

Linn County Deputy Sheriff Egli presented the list of calls.

M/B Thies, 2nd/B Hoyt to approve an agreement with Shoemaker and Haaland for construction observation and testing in Spring Meadows 4<sup>th</sup> Addition for a cost estimate range of \$5,000 - \$6,000. Ayes: Hoyt, Ralston, Merritt, and Thies. Absent: Sindelar. M/C.

Discussion was held about the sidewalk project. Installation of sidewalk on the north side of Fawn Avenue is planned as a possible alternate. ADA requirements were reviewed with Glen Wazny from Shoemaker and Haaland. M/B Thies, 2nd/B Ralston to approve an agreement with Shoemaker and Haaland for design services for a four foot sidewalk along 6<sup>th</sup> Street and 1<sup>st</sup> Avenue with a quote of \$6,900.00. Ayes: Hoyt, Ralston, Merritt, and Thies. Absent: Sindelar. M/C.

Todd Wyman discussed placing directional signs for school, business district, and others. He will have a design and quote for next meeting.

Todd discussed Linn Co-op spraying for weeds. He will have a quote for next meeting.

A quote from Kluesner for street maintenance was reviewed. Shoemaker and Haaland are to be contacted about a possible maintenance bond for some of the area. This topic will be on the next agenda.

M/B Hoyt, 2nd/B Thies to approve a donation of \$250.00 to Springville Quarry Run for sponsorship. Ayes: Hoyt, Ralston, Merritt, and Thies. Absent: Sindelar. M/C.

Cemetery property discussion was tabled.

Mayor Shebetka stated that since Deputy City Clerk Dee Wagaman's responsibilities have increased since the resignation of the city clerk, he recommends the City increase her hourly wage amount by \$1.00.

M/B Hoyt, 2nd/B Ralston to approve a pay increase to \$13.00 an hour for Deputy City Clerk Dee Wagaman effective as of April 12, 2017, because of increased responsibilities. Ayes: Hoyt, Ralston, Merritt, and Thies. Absent: Sindelar. M/C.

Acting City Clerk Cynthia Stimson discussed the budget amendment process.

M/B Merritt, 2nd/B Ralston to set Monday, May 15, 2017, as a public hearing date for a budget amendment for FY17. Ayes: Hoyt, Ralston, Merritt, and Thies. Absent: Sindelar. M/C.
