





Once you do this, online enhancements such as activities, key words, audio, video, quizzes, etc., become available. The book becomes something more than just a reading experience. We currently have AV-2 materials about animals, other countries and art. We'll be receiving three more each month. 

Pledge of allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm. Council members present: Bart Barner, Brad Merritt, Cindy Kilburg, and Jeff Baych. Karla Blakely was absent. City staff present: Public Works Director Todd Wyman and City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Luke Maloney with Linn County Building Department and Treva Davis were also present.

Kilburg made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

Barner made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of April 18, 2022, meeting minutes, approval of bills, and approval of Springville Station alcohol license renewal, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mayor Andersen updated council on meeting with Wendling and IDOT meeting.

Mayor invited citizens with input to speak. There being no public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Discussion held on selling trailer via auction. Baych made a motion to use Hoge's Auction to dispose of the trailer, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Barner abstained, Blakely absent. Motion carried.

Luke Maloney presented to council the new program Linn County is offering to rural communities. It is for Rental & Property Maintenance Inspections. Council is in favor of the program. Funding won't be available until July 1. Council would like to invite current landlords to a casual question and answer session before adopting the program.

City Council Joint Meeting

May 4, 2022

The Springville City Council met in a joint session with the Springville CSD School Board May 4, 2022.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm. Council members present: Cindy Kilburg, Jeff Baych, Bart Barner, and Karla Blakely. Brad Merritt was absent. City staff present: City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Also present was School Board Members: Albert Martin, Leisa Breitfelder, Kate O'Brien-May, Amy Hosek, Superintendent Pat Hocking, future Superintendent, Autumn Pino, Board Secretary Stacey Matus. Also present was Major Chad Colston with the Linn County Sheriff's Office.

Discussion held on the safety of the kids walking across the cross walks. Major Colston brought up some suggestions that might help bring attention to the cross walks. His department has a hard time getting extra patrols to school districts as that time. That is when traffic naturally picks up and the majority of their accidents are occurring at that time taking the officers away. The City and school will continue to work out solutions.

Mayor Andersen updated the group of the City happenings. The Hwy 151 overpass is on a 5-year plan, the City is continuing to work on getting another housing development going. No other major street projects will be happening in the next year.

Superintendent Hocking updated the group on the facilities. None of the projects that the school is doing will affect property taxes. The SCSD has one of the lowest tax rates in the area. Derecho damaged the old elementary roof and the insurance company paid for a new roof. The tennis courts were deemed irreparable and will be removed and seeded for now. The school has seen growth since the building of the new elementary. It is just now starting to hold steady with an enrollment of just above 400 students.

Both parties agreed these meetings were good and that they help to maintain a good working relationship between the school and the city.

They will look at next fall for their next meeting.

There being no further discussion, Barner moved to adjourn at 6:50 p.m., seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

May 16, 2022.

Blakely made a motion to approve Resolution 26-2022, a resolution approving MSA to add water, sewer, lead & copper, task management and staff training in the amount of \$6,450, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Barner, Kilburg, Merritt, Blakely, Baych. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 26-2022 adopted.**

Mouw presented the initial water study to council. She is looking for guidance on future sites for water tower. No action taken.

The next regular council meeting will be June 6, 2022, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Barner moved to adjourn at 7:50 p.m., seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.
