

- This is **NOT** curb side pick up.
- Drop off behind City Hall (304 Broadway)
- Must show proof of residency (open to residents and businesses that pay for solid waste)
- Items accepted: sofas, mattresses, furniture, noncommercial appliances, windows, doors, clean metal and other large bulky items. Any small motorized equipment brought in needs to be drained of gas and oil.
- Appliances limited to (2) per residential household or business (air conditioners and water heaters are considered appliances).
- Electronics accepted: copy & fax machines, cd players, VCRs, TVs, stereos, battery backups, cell phones, computer equipment, computer cords, etc.
- If you need assistance with your items, please call City Hall at 319-854-6428.

**Items not accepted: lead acid batteries, tires, railroad ties, radioactive materials, untreated medical waste, Styrofoam, any recyclable materials, pressurized tanks, and material usually deposited in garbage bags, raw construction materials (shingles, wood, concrete, re-rod, etc.), burn barrels and ash, large commercial appliances (walk-in freezers, commercial stoves, etc.) and hazardous waste items. 





The Dolly Parton Imagination Library makes this possible. Through their foundation for \$26 a year per child, a registered child will be mailed a book a month addressed to that child. olly Parton started the Imagination Library in honor of her father who couldn't 3ad. Dolly wants to put books in the hands of as many children as possible. ince it's beginning in 1995 over 204 million books have been mailed to chilren worldwide. In order to bring the Imagination Library to the 52336 zip 3de, we need to raise \$5,000 to get this program off the ground. This will 3ver the cost of the books and mailing for two years. We want to keep it 32 sing longer than two years, so this will need your support in the future also. 32 ooks typically cost \$13 each but with the buying power of the Dollywood 32 sundation the average book cost \$2.20.

ust an example of what your sponsorship/donation can do: \$26 sponsors one nild for one year; \$130 will give a child a book a month for five years; and 500 will give 19 children a book a month for a year. There is no greater joy an seeing a child read a book. With reading books comes knowledge and nowledge makes a thinking, caring adult.

A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS



Abraham Lincoln and Mary
Todd were married Nov. 4,
1842. Mary
lived 17 years
as a widow after
her husband's
April 1865 assassination.





Robert Todd Lincoln, only surviving son of President Lincoln, married Mary Eunice Harlan Sept. 24, 1868. Mary was very petite, weighing less than 100 pounds.

Iowa Wesleyan University had Lincoln family connections

Iowa Wesleyan University in Mount Pleasant was founded in 1842, four years before Iowa became a state. It closed permanently May 31 this year. The school had a longstanding connection with the family of Abraham Lincoln, 16th president of the United States.

Abraham and Mary Todd Lincoln had four sons, but only the oldest, Robert Todd Lincoln, lived to adulthood. On Sept. 24, 1868, Robert married Mary Eunice Harlan in Washington, D. C. The bride's father, James Harlan, was an early president of Iowa Wesleyan College, as it was originally called.

The widowed Mary Todd Lincoln attended the wedding, dressed in black mourning. Also present was her only other living son, Thomas "Tad" Lincoln, 15. He died three years later. Tad's brothers, Edward and William, had died in 1850 and 1859.

Robert and Mary Harlan Lincoln had three children: Mary "Mamie" Lincoln, wife of Charles Isham; Abraham "Jack" Lincoln II, who died of blood poisoning at 16; and Jessie Lincoln, who married three times.

Mamie's only child, Lincoln Isham, had no offspring. Jessie, at age 22, eloped with Warren Beckwith Jr., a fellow Iowa Wesleyan student and star football player. Their children were Mary "Peggy" Beckwith, who did not marry, and Robert Todd Lincoln Beckwith. The

Beckwith couple divorced; Jessie's other two marriages were childless.

Robert Beckwith, like his mother, married three times. He did not acknowledge paternity of any child, saying he was sterile due to surgery. However, his second wife, Annemarie Hoffman Beckwith, claimed Robert was the father of her son, called Timothy Lincoln Beckwith. She refused to allow paternity testing.

The Superior Court of the District of Columbia declared that Timothy was not Robert Beckwith's biological child. But the boy's claims to Robert's estate were never terminated. After Robert died, charitable organizations named as beneficiaries in his will offered Timothy \$1 million in exchange for giving up any claims to the estate.

Robert Todd Lincoln Beckwith, 81, died Dec. 24, 1985, in Hartfield, Va. He was the great-grandson and last direct descendant of President Abraham Lincoln.

ORY OF SPRINGVILLE, IOWA

Springville residents went to Iowa Wesleyan University

At least two people from Springville attended Iowa Wesleyan University. **Randy Lagos** earned his bachelor's degree there in 1972. **Barbie Martin Waltz** was a student there in 1991 and 1992, but had to drop out for health reasons.

The daughter of Karen Martin and the late Stephen Martin, Barbie graduated in 1991 from Springville High School. At Iowa Wesleyan, she was on the volleyball, basketball and track teams. A severe shoulder injury incurred while playing volleyball forced her to return home midway through her sophomore year. She later had surgery.

Iowa Wesleyan was 149 years old when Barbie en-

tered as a freshman. She recalls its beautiful campus and a large old bell mounted at ground level. When an lowa Wesleyan sports team scored a victory, students enthusiastically rang the bell. Barbie also has fond memories of the college dean, a woman whom she described as "very strict, but in a kind way."

A graduate of Kirkwood Community College, Barbie works in the investment field in Cedar Rapids as a senior administrator and limited partner. She and her husband Jeremy have a daughter, Morgan, and a son, Jacob, who graduated from Springville High in 2013 and 2022, respectively.

James Harlan, the man who fired Walt Whitman

James Harlan, whose daughter married Abraham Lincoln's son, was presient of Iowa Wesleyan College (later University) from 1853 to 1855, and gain in 1869-70. At other times, he was a U. S. senator from Iowa, and lecretary of the Interior in Presidents Lincoln's and Andrew Johnson's Cabiets. (He quit the latter over differences with Johnson.)

Harlan and his wife, the former Ann Eliza Peck, were good friends of Preslent and Mrs. Lincoln. Mary Lincoln encouraged her son Robert's courtship f Mary Harlan. Later in her life, however, she was estranged from her aughter-in-law.

One of Harlan's acts as Secretary of the Interior was firing poet Walt Whitnan in June 1865. Whitman was a clerk; Harlan was his boss. Harlan laimed publicly that the firing was for budget reasons. But he told another overnment official he was outraged by Whitman's book, "Leaves of Grass."

Going through the poet's desk one evening, Harlan found a proof of the ook. A strict Methodist deacon, he considered parts of the book improper nd suggestive. He fumed, "I will not have the author of this book in this deartment!" Whitman soon got another job in the office of the Attorney Genral. "Leaves of Grass" remained controversial for decades.



James Harlan (1820-1899)
Early president of Iowa Weslyan University
and trustee of the school for 46 years.

Harlan was born in Clark County, Ill., in 1820 and lived in Indiana as a hild. He moved his family to Iowa City in 1846 and to Mount Pleasant in 1853. His wife, Ann Harlan, died in 1884, nd her widower Oct. 5, 1899. A statue of James Harlan stands on the Iowa Wesleyan campus.



- An adult 18 years old or older must be present at the time of installation.


A four-hour block of time will be scheduled, and the installer will complete the meter installation within the four-hour time frame. The installation should take approximately 30 minutes.



The Springville City Council met in regular session on May 1, 2023. Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Blakely made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report, Library reports, Public Works report, and Clerk report.

Mayor invited citizens with input to speak. There being no public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Mayor Andersen opened the public hearing regarding the FY24 proposed budget at 6:14 p.m. No one spoke in favor or against the budget. No comments received in the office. Baych made a motion to close the public hearing at 6:15 p.m., seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Blakely, Kilburg, Baych, Barner, Merritt. NAYS: None. **PUBLIC HEARING CLOSED.**

Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 28-2023 to approve the FY24 budget, seconded by Kilburg. RCV: AYES: Baych, Barner, Merritt, Kilburg, Blakely. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 28-2023 adopted.**

Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 29-2023 to set a public hearing for FY23 proposed budget amendment, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Merritt, Blakely, Barner, Baych. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 29-2023 adopted.**

Council discussed the bids they received to repair the grass at 172 Broadway St. They received a bid of \$1,070 and a bid of \$622.40. Council decided to offer Hoyt \$850 for full and final settlement of the repairs. They will have the City Attorney draw up a release for Mr. Hoyt to sign then a check will be issued. Baych made a motion to pay Mr. Hoyt \$850 for full and final settlement of the grass damaged at 172 Broadway St., seconded by Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

Seal chip street list was presented. Final numbers came in at \$62,302.50, this is \$2,302.50 over budget. Wyman suspects by the time the project is done he will be under the \$60,000 budget. If not, monies will be taken from Road Use Tax or LOST funds. Blakely made a motion to approve the \$62,302.50 seal chip agreement, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

Council discussed a request for a "children at play" sign on 3rd Ave. They felt that if the problem is coming from the residents living on the dead-end road that a sign would not help. They felt a letter might be more effective. Clerk's office to send letter to the residents.

Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 30-2023 to add the utility work at Emmons Park, seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Barner, Merritt, Blakely, Baych, Kilburg. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 30-2023 adopted.**

Baych made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of May 1, 2023, meeting minutes, claims, and Casey's and JJ's Gas' cigarette/tobacco/nicotine/vapor permits, seconded by Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report, Fire Report, Engineer's Report, Public Works Report, Treasurer's Report, and Clerk Report.

Mayor invited citizens with input to speak. Treva Davis (309 North Ave) wanted to compliment Rich Blakely for the work he is doing in our parks and the library lawn. She says the library looks better now than it did when a lawn company performed the work. She also presented council with information for Dolly Parton's "Imagination Library". It is a program that Dolly Parton started to honor her father. The goal is to get books in the hands of as many children as possible. When this program has raised \$5,000, they will bring it to Springville. This is the amount to cover two years of books. The program will provide a child from birth to five years old a book every month mailed directly to them. All donations are tax deductible through the Springville Schools Foundation 501c3 status. There being no other public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Mayor Andersen opened the public hearing regarding the FY23 proposed budget amendment at 6:22 p.m. No one spoke in favor or against the budg et amendment. No comments received in the office. Merritt made a motion to close the public hearing at 6:23 p.m., seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Merritt, Barner, Baych, Kilburg, Blakely. NAYS: None. **PUBLIC HEARING CLOSED.**

Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 31-2023 to approve the FY23 budget amendment, seconded by Kilburg. RCV: AYES: Barner, Kilburg, Blakely, Baych, Merritt. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 31-2023 adopted**.

Todd McWherter spoke with council about getting a utility easement down the railroad ROW and our lagoon drive. This would be for fiber optic. He is looking to get as far away from the IDOT's interchange project. He would like to get this done during this year's construction season. This request will go before P & Z during their June 14th meeting.

Council discussed a City tree that was removed from in front of 206 5th St. No. This tree was mistakenly removed by the property owner. The tree has been cut down to ground level. Council would like to see the stump ground out and the area seeded. If the City had removed the tree, this is the standard to which it would have been done. A letter will go to the resident requesting that the stump be ground, and the area reseeded within 60 days.

Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 32-2023 to increase the scope of work done at Emmons Park, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Baych, Barner, Blakely, Merritt. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 32-2023 adopted.**

Council discussed getting a sidewalk installed on the east side of 8th St. fron 1st Ave to Mill Ave. Mayor would like to see a plan for other sidewalks around town. Council feels that this makes sense due to the safety issue and the amount of people who use that street to get from the new development to Mill Ave. This would be at the property owner's cost. Council would like to know where the sidewalks are on 1st Ave and Mill Ave to make a bet-

er decision as to the location. They would also like to get the property pins located so they know if there is room to install a sidewalk. Shive-Hattery will be called to do a retracement. This will be brought to another council meeting after more information is gathered.

Barner made a motion to approve Resolution 33-2023 to increase the wages for part time mower, seconded by Kilburg. RCV: AYES: Baych, Barner, Merritt, Kilburg. ABSTAIN: Blakely. RESOLUTION 33-2023 adopted.

Council discussed the weed spraying at the Cemetery. The City only has paid for a fall application. The cost would be \$996 to do a spring application. The City contracts Linn Coop to do a spring and fall applicaion in all the parks. Baych made a motion to add a spring application to the cemetery, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

Council discussed the proposed Ordinances that would need to be adopted to move forward with the agreement with Linn County to do the ental and home inspections. Council will have P & Z review the codes and give their recommendation at the June 19th council meeting.

3lakely made a motion to enter into closed session pursuant to lowa Code Section 21.5(j) to discuss the purchase of particular real estate where premature disclosure could be reasonably expected to increase he price the governmental body would have to pay for that property or reduce the price the governmental body would receive for that property, seconded by Baych. RCV: Barner, Blakely, Merritt, Kilburg, Baych. Council entered into closed session at 6:58 p.m.
