

## Safety First for Riders & Walkers ...

As the weather warms up, more residents are enjoying Springville by bike, scooter, or motorized bicycle—and we love to see it! But with increased traffic on sidewalks, crosswalks, and roads, it's important to stay safe and respectful of others while getting around town.

Here are a few reminders for all riders:

#### Be Mindful of Pedestrians

- •Sidewalks are for walkers first. If you're riding a bike or motorized scooter on the sidewalk, please slow down and give plenty of space to pedestrians.
- •Always **yield to walkers**, and when passing, announce yourself clearly with a bell or a polite "on your left!"

#### Ride Responsibly

- •Motorized scooters and bikes should be used with caution—especially near busy intersections, parks, and school zones.
- •Obey all stop signs, traffic signals, and posted signs. These rules apply to scooters and bikes just like cars!

#### Gear Up for Safety

- •Wear a **helmet**—it's the simplest way to protect your-self.
- •Check your lights and brakes before riding, especially if you're traveling near dusk or dawn.
- •Ride single file when on streets and never swerve in and out of traffic.

#### Watch for Traffic

- •Always ride with the flow of traffic—not against it.
- •Be alert at driveways and crosswalks. Just because you see a car doesn't mean they see you.
- •Signal your turns and make eye contact with drivers whenever possible.

Let's all do our part to keep Springville safe and enjoyable for everyone—walkers, riders, and drivers alike!

### A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

#### Linus M. Dunbar 'didn't take any guff from anyone'

Linus Myron Dunbar, a memorable town character who Linn County, Iowa. One of his first jobs was helping lived in Springville from 1877 to 1949, had "a very strong personality" and "didn't take any guff from anyone," according to a great-granddaughter, Sara Dunbar of Caldwell, Ida. He was called L. M. by his friends and Mr. Dunbar by others.

Sara and her first cousin, Nancy Taylor of Lake Arrowhead, Calif., have a wealth of family anecdotes about L. M. They have written a lively memoir titled "The World According to L. M. Dunbar." Much of this article is borrowed from the memoir, with permission.

Linus Dunbar, the third and last child in the family, was born May 31, 1865. His father, Massachusetts native Josiah Dunbar, served during the Civil War in the 53rd Ohio Infantry. Linus' mother was the former Rebecca Foreman, born in Virginia.

In 1865, shortly before Linus' birth, his parents, with son Cheney and daughter Vienna (pronounced Vieenna), moved from Athens, Ohio, to Mount Vernon in southern Illinois. Despite his father's Civil War service for the Union, Linus always thought of himself as a Southerner.

In 1877, when Linus was 12, his parents relocated to

harvest ice on Springville's Crystal Lake (now Cox Lake). He led a mule that furnished power to lift blocks of ice up a chute into the ice house. With a paying job and a "chaw" of tobacco, the boy felt very important and grown up!

As Linus grew older, he worked by the day or week for various area farmers. Gold was still in use as currency, and one farmer, Mr. House, paid him for two weeks' work with six small gold coins. Linus put the coins in his pocket and walked several miles home, but his pocket was empty – due to a tiny hole. It was a bitter and lasting lesson.

On May 6, 1885, Linus married Flora Olive Campbell at the parsonage of Linn Grove Church near Martelle. The bride was 22; the bridegroom soon turned 20. Flora and Linus named their first child Jennie Josephine. She chose to use her middle name – saying Jennie sounded like a female donkey! Two more children, Merle Linus and Grace Edith, were born in 1890 and 1897.

Josephine Dunbar grew up and married Fred G. Taylor, originally from Atlantic, Iowa. They lived at Springville

and had 9 children, born over a 22 ½ year span. Linus and Fred were partners in the livestock business. Starting as small boys, the grandsons helped their father and grandfather drive cattle. One of them was guarding an intersection, and was insulted when a man told him to get out of the way because a herd of cattle was coming!

As an adult, Linus was tall, imposing, and self-confident to the point of arrogance. He prided himself on getting the best of business deals. However, his "no-prisoners" approach sometimes created problems with obtaining repeat business!

In September 1906, Linus and Flora bought a large house on North Broadway. It had previously belonged to Leonard Christman, a Springville storekeeper, and his wife Anna. Real estate agent Everett McShane handled the sale. The Springville New Era called it "one of the most desirable properties in town." The house is still standing.

In their later years, Linus and Florida Dunbar spent several winters in California. The Nov. 14, 1940, Mount Vernon Hawkeye-Record and Lisbon Herald reported, "Mr. and Mrs. Linus Dunbar left Thursday of last week

for Alhambra, Calif. The Dunbar's seem to scent the first snowstorm and leave for the west coast every year just in time to escape it."

On Oct. 16, 1949, Linus attended a birthday dinner for a grandson, Bob Taylor, held at the Springville home of Bob's parents, Fred G. and Josephine. Four days later, Linus died of cancer at St. Luke's Hospital in Cedar Rapids. Flora then moved to San Gabriel, Calif., to live with her daughter, Grace Johnson. Flora died there June 29, 1959, at age 96. She and Linus are buried in the Springville Cemetery.

#### L. M. and the horseless carriage

L. M. Dunbar was the product of horse and buggy days, and was never entirely comfortable with automobiles. Sometimes a grandson chauffeured him. Once, grandson Fred Taylor (son of Fred G. and Josephine) was driving up the hill out of Anamosa.

L. M. warned, "You'd better step on it, boy, or you're gonna have to shift gears!" Fred shifted and replied, "Why, that's no big deal. That's what they're there for." (Fred Taylor still remembers that incident. He is 103 and lives in La Mesa, CA)







Baych made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Hollandsworth. All ayes. Motion carried.

Blakely made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items with corrections to the April 21, 2025, minutes, approval of claims, and Casey's cigarette/tobacco/nicotine/vapor permit, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report, Library Report, Public Works Report, and Clerk's Report. No mayor or council comments.

Mayor Andersen invited citizens with input to speak. There being no public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Joe Horaney spoke to the council and gave an annual update on the costs and services to the Linn County Solid Waste Agency.

Mayor Andersen presented the IDOT's predesign agreement. MSA has looked through this agreement and discussed with Mayor, public works and the city clerk the substantial concerns. The city will be required to remove any city owned signage that will be in the construction zone at our cost. We will also be responsible for capping the water main that goes to the bank. When the project is completed, the city will need to maintain the walking trail on the overpass and will be responsible for some of the lighting. Mayor Andersen explained that this is the first of three agreements. Barner made a motion to approve Resolution 17-2025 to allow the mayor to sign the predesign agreement, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Baych, Hollandsworth, Blakely, Barner. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 17-2025 adopted**.

The council had a lengthy discussion on several topics about sidewalks. They will send the code to the P & Z board to revise our current code to align with ADA specifications. They also discussed the inspection process of sidewalks and what routes they might want to look at to make our community walkable.

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, May 19, 2025, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Hollandsworth moved to adjourn at 7:33 p.m., seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

#### City Council Regular Meeting

May 19, 2025

The Springville City Council met in regular session on May 19, 2025.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

Council members present: Karla Blakely, Cindy Kilburg, Bart Barner, and Jeff Baych. Makenna Hollandsworth was absent. City staff present: Public Works Director Todd Wyman and City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Treva Davis, Jim Hopkins and Suzanne Carter with ABC Disposal, and Matt Pivit with Republic Services were also in attendance.

Baych made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

Baych made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items the May 5, 2025, minutes and claims, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report, Engineer's Report, Library Report, Public Works Report, Treasurer's Report and Clerk's Report. Mayor Andersen brought up the possibility to get some curbs painted near the school so that the kids will hopefully park past the intersection. He also updated the council with regards to a meeting he had with Wendling Quarries to talk about the shared responsibilities of the new O'Brien Lane. They will be setting up a meeting with Linn County, Springville, and Wendling. Baych asked about the wall at Carissa Johnson's residence. Mayor Andersen explained that it was just brought to his attention that there is a broken layer in the wall and will have someone come to see if it could be replaced from that layer up.

Mayor Andersen invited citizens with input to speak. There being no public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Mayor Andersen opened the public hearing to consider the proposed FY25 budget amendment at 6:12 p.m. Davis was in favor and understands the reasons behind the amendment. No comments against the proposed amendment. Kilburg made a motion to close the public hearing at 6:13 p.m., seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Baych, Barner, Blakely. ABSENT: Hollandsworth. **PUBLIC HEARING closed**. Blakely made a motion to adopt Resolution 18-2025 to approve the FY25 Budget Amendment, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Blakely, Kilburg, Baych, Barner. ABSENT: Hollandsworth. **RESOLUTION 18-2025 adopted**.

Wagaman explained to the council that our current GIS system hosted by ESRI will be migrated to another platform still hosted by ESRI. MSA will coordinate and do the migration for us. Blakely made a motion to approve Resolution 19-2025 to approve a professional services agreement for GIS services, seconded by Kilburg. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Baych, Blakely, Barner. ABSENT: Hollandsworth. **RESOLUTION 19-2025 adopted**.

Mayor Andersen explained the request for a burn permit from the Spring House Board. This would be a controlled burn executed by the Springville Fire Department. Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 20-2025 to approve a controlled burn permit for the Spring House Board, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Barner, Blakely, Baych. ABSENT: Hollandsworth. **RESOLUTION 20-2025 adopted**.

Barner made a motion to approve Resolution 21-2025 to remove a streetlight from Emmons Park, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Baych, Kilburg, Blakely, Barner. ABSENT: Hollandsworth. **RESOLUTION 21-2025 adopted**.

Kilburg made a motion to approve Resolution 22-2025 to close Broadway St. from Liberty Ave to John Street for the Memorial Day 5k run/walk, seconded by Blakely. RCV:

AYES: Baych, Blakely, Kilburg, Barner. ABSENT: Hollandsworth. **RESOLUTION 22-2025 adopted**.

Council person Makenna Hollandsworth has submitted her resignation effective May 22, 2025. Her family is moving out of the city, so she is no longer able to prove residency. Blakey begrudgingly made a motion to accept Hollandsworth's resignation, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried. The council is saddened by this news, but happy about Makenna's next journey. They wish her well.

The council discussed their options to fill the vacant council seat. They have the option to hold a special election or to appoint someone. A special election would be costly to the residents because the cost would not be shared with other entities since we would be the only voting taking place. They felt that they would prefer to appoint someone. Whoever is appointed will have to take out papers and get on the ballot for the November general election to remain in that seat. The appointment would only be from the time the council appoints until the November election is certified. Blakely made a motion to approve Resolution 23-2025 to fill the council vacancy through appointment, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Blakely, Baych, Barner, Kilburg. AB-SENT: Hollandsworth. **RESOLUTION 23-2025 adopted.** 

The council discussed the two proposals presented by Republic Services and ABC Disposal. They asked several questions of both companies. Wapsi Waste is selling their company, and the owner is retiring. The council would like to have a new contract in place starting services by August. Both companies will move to automated trucks so totes would need to be used. Both companies also have options for yard waste. The council would like to discuss both companies a little more before making a decision.

Mayor Andersen talked with the council about looking at getting our code updated to include motorized scooters and electric bicycles. He sees the danger in allowing them to use the sidewalks since most of our sidewalks are only 4' wide. He would like to see what other communities are doing and how they are handling the new technology and how they are working to keep their walkers safe while on the sidewalks. He would like this topic to be on the next agenda for further discussion.

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, June 2, 2025, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.
