#### WATER METER UPGRADE

In the coming months, the City will be conducting a Water Meter Upgrade project. The City is contract-

ing Ferguson Waterworks to complete the installation.

A few weeks before the project begins, you will receive a letter from the City containing additional information on how to schedule your appointment.

There is no cost for the upgrade, but you are required to have your water meter replaced.

To install the new radio upgrade:

Ferguson Waterworks will need access to the meter inside your home or business.

The water meter area should be clear and accessible.

An adult 18 years old or older must be present at the time of installation.

Ferguson Waterworks was selected based on their experience as a meter installation contractor. All installers will have identification, wear uniforms, travel in marked vehicles and have completed background checks.

The City of Springville and Ferguson Waterworks thank you in advance for your cooperation in making this a successful program.



## DUANE ARNOLD ENERGY CENTER DONATION

The Linn County Board of Supervisors awarded the City of Springville \$22,500 in economic and community development funding in August 2022. This funding will go towards the first phase of the construction of Emmons Park in 2023.



If you have a dog, clean up after it. The city will be forced to fine these dog owners if not taken care of immediately.




#### SALUTE OF THE FALLEN RUN/WALK

# A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

### George L. Durno, first of Springville's 38 mayors

On Wednesday, July 20, 1881, at a frame school-house on Springville's South Side, voters arrived to decide whether Springville should incorporate. (Only men could vote; women didn't receive that right until 1920.) The poll closed at 6 p.m., votes were tabulated, and the result was 45 to 36 in favor of incorporation.

Later that summer, George L. Durno was elected Springville's first mayor, of the 38 so far. He took office Aug. 29, 1881. Durno was born in 1838 in Old Deer, Aberdeenshire, Scotland. He was 2 years old when his parents brought him to Pennsylvania. Later the family moved to a farm near Rockford, Ill.

A Civil War Union veteran, Durno was wounded in the Battle of Shiloh and discharged for disability.

He married Elizabeth Christman on Christmas Day 1866 in Dubuque. They moved to Springville in February 1870, and had five children: Charles, William, Sarah, Edwin, and Gertrude.

Durno, a general store owner, was mayor until March 1883. His successor was **Byron M. Hopper**, another storekeeper. Springville's third mayor was **Adelbert D. Hill**, co-owner with his father William of a cheese factory located in what is now Lower Butler Park.

Edwin E. Tathwell, eighth and eleventh mayor, was a native of New Jersey. He fought for the Union in the Civil War, and was wounded in Louisiana. His first wife, Frances Clementine Gordon, died at 19 and is buried in the Springville Cemetery. Tathwell later married Josephine McKean.

Vernon W. Carris' term as mayor ended when he enlisted in May 1917 for World War I, in the 351st Infantry, 88th Division. He saw action in France, but came home unharmed. (Sadly, his son, Kenton I. Carris, was killed in France Aug. 2, 1944, while serving in World War II.)

Besides Durno, another mayor born outside the United States was **George W. Dyke**, who followed Carris. He was a native of the Pickering-Durham Regional Municipality in Ontario, Canada. His father was born in Somerset, England.

Robert E. Pollock, mayor from 1902 to 1904, was the brother of Thomas W. "T. W." Pollock, who served from 1932 to 1938. John F. Gritman, mayor in 1888 and 1889, was the father of Samuel J. Gritman, 1891 to 1892. J. Willis Brown, mayor from 1930 to 1932, was the father of Loren B.

"Bucky" Brown, mayor 1954-1959, 1962-1965, and Jan. 1, 1980, to his death Oct. 11, 1981. He was the only mayor who died in office.

One of Springville's mayors was a dentist — Gustavus North, D. D. S. He came in for some acid criticism by banker Charles F. "Fred" Butler, who also served as mayor. North must have done something right, because he was elected three times — March 1889-March 1890, March 1894-March 1896, and December 1896-April 1898. Butler served April 1904-April 1906.

Serious illness shortened the mayoral service of **Carl L. Burroughs**. He took office April 4, 1910, at age 24 – the youngest Springville mayor ever. In June 1911, he was stricken by polio while pitching a baseball game for Springville at Central City.

After recuperating for 18 months, Burroughs started a successful career as an independent insurance agent in Springville. He also returned to city government as a Council member in 1913. Despite the damage done by polio – both legs were amputated, and he was in a wheelchair – Burroughs lived to be 90

Springville's current mayor, Lyle Andersen, took office Jan. 1, 2022. He is the grandson of Mayor Wil-

liam K. Wild, who served from April 1928 to April 1930. Wild was born in Wisconsin and brought to Iowa by his parents when he was three months old. He was the father of the late Bernita Wild Andersen, mother of Lyle.

Five of the six mayors who preceded Andersen are Roger Shebetka, Rick Heeren, Ben Baily and Steve Carnahan, all of Springville, and Pete Gasper, Marion. They and the late Bill Cooper held office between November 1981 and December 2021.

The longest serving Springville mayor was Lee Andrew "Andy" Johnston. He was mayor from April 1938 through December 1953, and from January 1960 through December 1961 – a total of 17 years and nine months. Johnston's wife was the former Margaret Gearhart, daughter of long-time Springville physician G.W. Gearhart.

#### SPECIAL ELECTION - VOTED PPEL LEVY - March 7, 2023

Dear Springville Patrons,

My name is Autumn Pino, and I am the current Superintendent of Springville Community School District. I am reaching out today because we have an important vote coming up that will allow us to continue the great work we are doing for our students— and we need your help.

On March 7, 2023 the Springville Community School District will be asking voters to extend the Physical Plant and Equipment Levy (PPEL). The current levy which was previously approved for 10 years expires June 30, 2024.

The PPEL levy is a levy that can be used for a number of expenditures such as: construction and remodeling of buildings and property; purchasing property, buses, and technology equipment; and energy conservation expenditures. The levy <u>CANNOT</u> be used for staff salaries or supplies - those expenditures must come from a school district's General Fund.

Our district has had the voter approved PPEL for many years and a "yes" vote would simply <u>continue</u> the amount of funds that the district is currently receiving, it would <u>NOT</u> increase the current tax rate our patrons are paying. This levy requires a simple majority vote (50% plus 1) for passage. Property tax rate is limited to the equivalent of \$1.34 per \$1,000 of net, assessed taxable value for the Voter Approved PPEL levy. *Approval of this levy would simply continue the existing PPEL tax and <u>NOT</u> increase the tax rate.* 

Some items currently funded with PPEL are necessary, such as buses, technology, equipment and infrastructure needs. If these items aren't funded with PPEL, then scarce General Fund dollars have to cover these expenses. Today, General Fund dollars are currently dedicated to instruction -supporting classrooms with teachers, text-books, heat and lighting, and providing for the library and support staff that students need.

Attached you will find additional information regarding PPEL that includes: 1) A description of allowable expenditures of the PPEL Fund, 2) prohibited uses, 3) a summary of Springville CSD's PPEL expenditures over the last 10 years, and 4) the Fiscal Year 2023 local tax rate comparisons.

Our district is committed to providing the highest quality education to the students of our district, and we hope with your help, that we are able to continue to use the Physical Plant and Equipment Levy to support the needs of our students. So, please join us for this important vote on March 7th.

#### Allowable Expenditures from the PPEL Fund:

Section 298.3 https://www.legis.iowa.gov/docs/code/2022/298.3.pdf covers the allowable expenditures. Generally they include the following:

- Purchase and improvement of grounds
- Improvement of property
- Construction of schools, buildings and roads
- Purchase or lease purchase of equipment and technology exceeding \$500 per transaction (each transaction may include multiple equipment or technology units)
- Payment of debt for schools or buildings
- Procuring or acquiring library facilities
- Repairing, remodeling, expanding, and reconstructing of existing facilities
- Expenditures for energy conservation
- Rental of facilities under 28E
- Purchase of transportation equipment for transporting students
- Purchase or lease purchase of buildings
- Equipment for recreational purposes

#### Prohibited Uses from the PPEL Fund:

- School district employee salaries or travel expenses Supplies
- Printing costs or media services
- Any other purpose not expressly authorized in this section

Mayor invited citizens with input to speak. Karen Anderson informed council that the platform in the front of the bank of mailboxes up on 8<sup>th</sup> Ave are not getting cleared off and she is having a hard time getting the mail. She is wondering if the City can do anything. Mayor will take under advisement. There being no further public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Mayor Andersen opened the public hearing for the Max Tax Levy at 6:12 p.m. No one spoke in favor. Audience would like an explanation of the Max Tax Levy. Wagaman explained that the Max Tax Levy is the first public hearing that the council is required to hold before they publish their budget. What the Max Tax Levy is telling the residents is that the City is guaranteeing that they will not tax over that amount. She also explained that this hearing doesn't include all the levies that the city will be taxing for. She realizes that it is very confusing when they call it the Max Tax Levy, but will ultimately include additional levies. Springville is not intending on raising the current tax rate. Scott Nealman of 749 1<sup>st</sup> Ave talked to the council about being voluntarily annexed. He would like to remain Ag, a transition of taxes, to be allowed to maintain his current well with the opportunity to connect to city water when the well goes out, and to be allowed to maintain his current septic with the opportunity to connect to city sewer if/when the adjacent parcel ever gets developed. Council was in favor of all these requests just so that it was clear that the city could not afford to run sewer to their property without a development to the adjacent parcel. Both parties agreed. Wagaman to get letter written up with all the requests.

Barner made a motion to approve Resolution 6-2023 to delegate authority to certify unpaid utility services to the County Treasurer, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Merritt, Blakely, Baych, Kilburg, Barner. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 6-2023 adopted.** 

An alley was vacated in 2019, but the GIS mapping system had the wrong legal description. The error was found while our surveyor was retracing for the Emmons Park project. The city just needs to get a corrective deed signed and recorded for Daryl Pearson. Baych made a motion to approve Mayor Andersen to sign the corrective deed, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.
