



Our Farmall Twelve

My dad wasn't much a believer Of a tractor a-farmin' the hills But Mason, the implement dealer, Talked dad into tryin' its thrills.

While Dad does the milkin' an' feedin,'
I take the oil can and grease gun
And fix up the "Iron Mule" for speedin'
Add gas and it's ready to run.

The land on our farm isn't level,
There's hills and there's hollers galore,
But the little F-Twelve is a devil
To "take it" and holler for more.

It starts when the sun is appearing
And, you can believe it or not,
With the good old McCormick-Deering
The exhaust's all that ever gets hot.

When cold weather comes there's no worry Where the feed's comin' from, or the bed, For the little F-Twelve, Dad's not sorry To have standing safe in the shed.

For the corn crop was short this last season
And grass seed will cost lots of "mon,"
But when the F-Twelve isn't workin'
It doesn't use hay, gas or corn.

No blankets to keep it from freezin,'
No bills to pile up on the shelf.
Dad says he just bought to please Mason,
But Dad's only kiddin' himself.

Poem by Moyer holds memories

The story starts in 1937, with three people and a machine: a Linn County farmer, his teenaged son, a Springville implement dealer, and a rugged little Farmall F-12 tractor. **James David Moyer**, a farmer in Buffalo Township, bought his first tractor when much of Iowa's farm work was still being done with horses.

Moyer's son, **Ivan James "Jim" Moyer**, 14, wrote a poem *(at left)* about the tractor. It names **J. Mason Gramling** of Springville as the dealer. The elder Moyer didn't know how well a tractor would perform on his hilly farm. "But Mason, the implement dealer, talked Dad into tryin' its thrills." (Poem, Verse 3) Dad became a tractor convert.

Where Jim attended high school is unknown. He was a student through his junior year, 1938-1939. On Jan 14, 1942 (the month after Pearl Harbor) Jim enlisted in the Marine Corps. That year on Nov. 13-15, he fought in the key battle of Guadalcanal, in the South Pacific.

Jim returned to the U.S. in August 1943, and entered a rehabilitation hospital in Santa Cruz, Calif.. (His injuries aren't known.) He earned an honorable medical discharge, and met **Joyce Campbell** while in rehab. They married Jan. 20, 1944, in Santa Cruz. Their children were **David Jack**, **Laura Janice** (Hamilton) and **Dana Joy** (Greve).

Jim Moyer farmed in Iowa for 15 years. In 1959, the Moyer family moved to the Sacramento, Calif., area. They owned a Karmelkorn business for several years. James then worked for the State of California, retiring in 1986. At 88, he died in Citrus Heights, Calif., March 2, 2011. Jim and Joyce are interred in Sacramento Valley National Cemetery, Dixon, Calif.

James David and Lena Harris Moyer, Jim's parents, farmed in Buffalo Township, Linn County. James was also a carpenter. When he retired from farming, he and Lena moved to Marion. In May 1958 Lena died at 64. The next year, Jim married Ruby Sandberg Fulmer (1905-1998).

Her daughter, Mrs. **Amelia Lemon** (1924-1994) of Springville, became James' stepdaughter. James was 76 when he passed away Oct. 24, 1968. He is buried beside Lena in Mount Clark Cemetery, Central City.

James and Lena Moyer also had a daughter, Romona Arlene, born in 1920. She married Loren A. Port in 1937. They had eight children: Maurice, Darlyce (Baily), Linda (Ham), Marilyn (Carpenter), Verlee (Hiner), Jackie (Bonebrake), Jeffrey and Mark. They had excellent singing voices. There were Ports at Springville School for 33 years.

John Mason Gramling, who went by his middle name, bought a 68-year-old frame building in Springville and opened a farm implement business in January 1930. (The location, 275 Broadway, is now Hiner Plumbing and Heating). Gramling relocated to the "brick block" about 1934.

On July 31, 1944, the implement business was sold to **Alfred P. Schmid** of Blairstown. Mason and his wife, the former **Pearl Williams**, moved to McGregor. Mason loved

M. DALE GRAMLING (1911-1987) was the only child of J. Mason and Pearl Gramling. Dale was his father's assistant at the Gramling Implement Store, and from 1938 to 1941 managed a branch in Central City. He married Leida Newman of Springville. The couple had four sons: Jerry and Larry, now deceased; Max Gramling of La Crescent, Minn., and Lyle Gramling, St. Charles, Ill, a 1969 graduate of Springville High School.

DURING WORLD WAR II, temporary regulations limited the manufacture and sale of farm machinery. This inevitably also limited Mason Gramling's income; he sold farm implements. Unwelcome competition came from an illegal black market in used farm equipment, run by two area men. (No names, no potential lawsuit!)

to fish. In 1949, he caught a 45-pound catfish at the junction of the Mississippi and Wisconsin rivers. He used a bamboo pole, heavy-duty line and nightcrawler bait.

Later the same year, the Gramlings were wintering in Florida when Mason passed away in Orlando on his 60th birthday, Dec. 1, 1949. Pearl survived him over 30 years. Their graves are in Mount Clark Cemetery.



City Council Regular Meeting

February 5, 2024

The Springville City Council met in regular session on February 5, 2024. Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Jeff Baych, Cindy Kilburg, Makenna Hollandsworth, and Karla Blakely. Bart Barner was absent. City staff present: Public Works Todd Wyman and City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Jim Koppenhaver and Jim Holz from MSA were also in attendance.

Baych made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

Baych made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of January 17, 2024, meeting minutes, January 22, 2024, meeting minutes, January 31, 2024, meeting minutes, and claims, seconded by Blakely. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report, Library Report, Public Works Report, Treasurer's Report, and Clerk Report. Mayor Andersen talked about the parking on Broadway St. during busy school events. No council reports.

Mayor Andersen invited citizens with input to speak. There being no public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Mayor Andersen opened the public hearing at 6:17 p.m. There were no comments for or against the proposed comprehensive plan. No comments came into the office. Blakely made a motion to close the public hearing at 6:18 p.m., seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Blakely, Baych, Hollandsworth, Kilburg. ABSENT: Barner. **PUBLIC HEARING CLOSED**. Baych made a motion to approve Resolution 6-2024 to adopt the new Comprehensive Plan (2024), seconded by Kilburg. RCV: AYES: Baych, Kilburg, Hollandsworth, Blakely. ABSENT: Barner. **RESOLUTION 6-2024 adopted.**

Blakey made a motion to approve Resolution 5-2024 to set the public hearing for the proposed property tax levy for April 1, 2024, at 6 p.m., seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Baych, Blakely, Hollandsworth. ABSENT: Barner. **RESOLUTION 5-2024 adopted.**

Council discussed the light pole on the northeast corner of Mill Ave and Broadway St. It will cost \$8,900 to replace that pole. The office has already been in contact with the vehicle owner's insurance company and turned the claim in. The council is discussing whether to replace the pole where it was, relocate the pole or not replacing the pole and putting a light on the current wooden pole on the northwest corner. They would like to wait to make a decision to see if the insurance company pays for the replacement pole.

Jim Holz discussed with the council what a CIP (Comprehensive Improvement Plan) consists of and how they can go about getting one started. Wyman has come up with a list of equipment and projects that were left uncompleted by the previous CIP plan. The council will bring their ideas to the table. Wagaman has received the fire department's 5-10-15 year plan and will get that into the plan. She will also get the library's list. This will be an ongoing conversation.

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, February 19, 2024, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Hollandsworth moved to adjourn at 7:08 p.m., seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

City Council Regular Meeting

February 19, 2024

The Springville City Council met in regular session on February 19, 2024.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Karla Blakely, Jeff Baych, Cindy Kilburg, Bart Barner, and Makenna Hollandsworth. City staff present: City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Treva Davis was also in attendance.

Blakely made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Baych made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of February 5, 2024, meeting minutes, and claims with corrected totals, seconded by Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

The following reports were presented: Sheriff's Report and Clerk Report. No comments from Mayor or council.

Mayor Andersen invited citizens with input to speak. There being no public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

A discussion was held with the council and Rick Kraft. Rick's concern is that the city has codes but is unable to enforce them. After reading our codes (Chapter 51 pertaining to Junk Vehicles), it appears that the city would have the right to abate most nuisances without a court order. The council has agreed to get a committee together and meet with the city attorney to talk through these codes so that we all better understand them and can make appropriate changes so that we might not have to drag the process out so long. Kraft was also concerned that the city uses ECICOG to do our nuisances. We contract with them to come and observe, take photos, and mail the first two letters out. If the resident does not comply within that time frame, it comes back to us and moves to the attorney. The council is against bringing it completely back in house due to the relationship between staff, council, and residents. By contracting it to be done, it takes that part out of the equation.

Kilburg made a motion to approve Resolution 7-2024 to approve budgeted transfers, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Barner, Baych, Kilburg, Hollandsworth, Blakely. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION 7-2024 adopted.**

The council discussed moving the 2^{nd} meeting in April from the 15^{th} to the 22^{nd} to accommodate the budget hearing. The other alternative would be to have a special meeting. Blakely made a motion to move the second council meeting in April to April 22^{nd} , seconded by Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

The council discussed a delinquent water payment at 507 6th Ave. The water has been shut off and it appears that the residents have moved to Marion. Wagaman would like to put a lien on their property for the delinquent bill. Blakely made a motion to file a lien on the property at 507 6th Ave, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

The council discussed the location of the damaged pole. Most are in favor of moving the pole from the corner of Mill Ave and Broadway St. They are looking at possibilities in Upper Butler Park. The council will make an assessment by the next council meeting.
