Historical Feature May 2015 – SAHS report Historical Society to meet May 12

The Springville Area Historical Society (SAHS) will meet Tuesday, May 12, at 6:30 p.m.in the SAHS building, next door to City Hall. Meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each month, and everyone interested in the history of Springville and the surrounding area is cordially invited. Thirteen persons attended the meeting April 14, including two guests, Phil and Karen Randall. Non-members are always welcome. SAHS was saddened by the loss of member Walter "Wally" Searcy of Whittier, who died April 11. President Bev Franks spoke about Dollie Tabasinsky, who lived on a farm two miles west of Springville. Born in 1885, Dollie was a greatgreat-granddaughter of Revolutionary War veteran Elijah Jones, whose son Anson came to Springville in 1848. Dollie, a member of Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), died in 1968. Bev also reported on her contact with the Iowa Museum Association, which SAHS recently joined. It was voted to obtain the assistance this summer of a qualified college student, through IMA, to assist in organizing the growing collection of artifacts. Kelly Schmidt displayed several interesting Springville items he obtained online. Included were two photos, one that included Springville's first mayor, George Durno, and an engraving of the William Finley Wilson farm in Section 22 of Brown Township. Rick Heeren observed that the SAHS meeting date coincided with the anniversaries of two tragic historical events: the shooting of President Lincoln by John Wilkes Booth April 14, 1865, and the collision of the Titanic with an iceberg April 14, 1912. Dixie Brady discussed ongoing efforts to obtain expert advice about renovation of the Brown monument in the Springville Cemetery. It marks the graves of Revolutionary War veteran Nathan Brown, who died in 1842, and members of his family. Bev noted the Genealogical Society of Linn County's 50th anniversary May 2 at the Masonic Library in Cedar Rapids. Actor Tom Milligan will portray Grant Wood in a one-man show at 1 p.m. Bev also said SAHS will be open on the morning of July 24, when RAGBRAI bicyclists go through town. Pat Denny Reid was present and gave SAHS an original copy of the 1911 Linn County History, Vol. I. Bev brought a 1987 aerial photograph of Springville, a donation from Ann Petersen, who also loaned SAHS a second, undated aerial photo. Others at the April 14 meeting were James Crow, vice president; Jean Schmidt, secretary-treasurer; Karen Taylor, historian; Doug Beard; Wes Bender and Pat

Viola, Iowa, named for little girl

An early Linn County settlement was called Crow Creek for pioneer Edward M. Crow, who arrived in 1837. A later name was Leonard's Station. The town was platted June 27, 1861, on land owned by the Dubuque, Marion and Western Railroad, and Joseph Leonard – who

named it in honor of his youngest daughter, who was almost 7. Viola Clara Leonard was the seventh child of Joseph and Sarah J. Donahoo Leonard, married Jan. 4, 1838, in New Boston, III. Five children were born there. In 1851, the parents and Marcellus, Josephine, Benton, Jennie, and Walter, ages 12 to almost 4, moved to Crow Creek, Iowa. Baby Sarah was born in 1852 but lived only 10 days. Viola, born July 29, 1854, remained the youngest child for 11 years. In that time, two of her siblings married and another went to war. Josephine, 17, married widower John L. Ingram in 1858. Two years later, Marcellus, 21, wed Mary Catherine Ingram (sister of John). Benton, 20, joined Co. K, Sixth Iowa Cavalry in 1862. The youngest Leonard, Freddie, was born in September 1865. In March 1866, Jennie Leonard, 21, married DeWitt Ackley, a Civil War veteran who had served with Benton. Freddie, 9 1/2 months old, died in July 1866. Benton moved to Colorado, and Walter married Henrietta Newland in September 1871. Viola taught school at Viola, then married Ohio native James Crew Nov. 7, 1878. The 1880 census found them in Jones County, where James was a butcher. Their first child, Sarah Elizabeth (Bessie) was born in 1881 at Anamosa. Two more children, Ivan Leonard and James Ralph, were born in 1883 and 1886 at Viola. In the late 1880s, the Crew family moved to Clearfield in southwest Iowa, and James farmed. Daughter Florence (Flossie) was born in May 1890, and son Frederick Harold in March 1895. Around 1900, James Crew went into the furniture and undertaking business in Clearfield. Viola joined the Royal Neighbors and the Fortnightly Club. Her widowed mother, Sarah Leonard, lived with them. (Sarah died at Clearfield in 1901.) In 1905, Bessie became Mrs. Joseph D. Barrans. Ivan married Stella Viola Hartman in 1910. Florence wed Fred M. Ewalt in 1914, followed in 1915 by the marriage of Ralph Crew and Marie Grossmann. Fred Crew lived at Benton, Ark., and later Portland, Ore.; whether he married is unknown. Viola Leonard Crew lived to be almost 82. She died July 18, 1936, ten years after her husband. Surviving were her five children: Ivan in Diagonal, Iowa; Fred in Arkansas; the others in Clearfield; and seven grandchildren. Viola is buried beside James in Clearfield Cemetery, far from the Linn County village that bears her name. (Thanks to the Rev. ANOTHER VIOLA: A township in Audubon County, Iowa, is named Viola. A hamlet there, Viola Center, had a post office from 1881 to 1900. The Viola Center Cemetery dates to the 1840s.

Monday Club founded in 1901

Part of last month's historical feature about Monday Club was accidentally omitted. The group's name was chosen at the first meeting Nov. 8, 1901. Monday Club was founded by 23 women "for literary research and study for the mutual enlightenment of its members." (Springville New Era, 1901) It is the second oldest social organization in town. The oldest is Springville's Masonic Lodge No. 139, chartered in June 1859.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS April 2, 2015

A Public Information Meeting was held on the 6^{th} Street South Sidewalk. Questions, comments and general discussion was held on the proposed 6^{th} Street sidewalk before the start of the council meeting.

Mayor Shebetka called the regular meeting of the City Council to order at 6:00 pm in Springville City Hall. Present on roll call: Brady, Hoyt, Ralston, Merritt and Sindelar.

Consent Agenda: M/b Brady, 2nd/b Hoyt, to approve the consent agenda as posted. All ayes, m/c.

Citizens with Concerns Not on the Agenda: Councilman Merritt voiced concerns about the newsletter. He has issue with the newsletter content and the time spent to author each publication. Varying opinions were expressed by council and those in attendance. Bixler noted many compliments on the newsletter are received from Senior Citizens. Mayor Shebetka noted it costs approximately \$85 per month to publish 200 newsletters. It was agreed that the newsletter is important to the citizens of Springville.

Sheriff: Deputy Steffans provided the service log for March 16, 2015 through April 6, 2015. There were 22 calls for service. March hours of service: 110.6.

Public Works Maintenance Report: Todd gave the maintenance report. They are trimming trees, getting ready for the spring lagoon discharge and have a catch basin problem on 6^{th} Street.

Clerk: submitted to the Council the weekly Broadway Street report, 256 Broadway

Old Business

256 Broadway Committee: Roger is still talking with citizens to develop a 256 Broadway committee. This will be discussed again at the April 6th meeting.

New Business

Audit: Bixler reviewed the "Audit Comments" with the council. A copy of the commentary is available at City Hall

5th Street Tree Bid: Todd had Bug of D&D Tree Service assess 3 trees on 5th Street. The trees have some branches hanging that need to come down at some point. Discussion was held on identifying dying or diseased trees to create a "tree list" in order that contractors could just bid an already approved list and to budget more effectively for tree removal in each fiscal year. Funding for tree trimming or removal is put in each fiscal year budget, but the amount is based on what was needed the previous fiscal year. D&D Tree Service gave a price quote for the removal of the 3 trees. When it is decided the trees need to come down bids will be taken for the project.

Seal Coat List: Todd explained to the Council that LL Pelling will be working extensively in the area this spring and would like to include Springville in their lineup of towns. Springville seal coat project for FY 2014-15 has not been completed yet. LL Pelling would combine the current fiscal year project and FY 2015-16 project and allow payment to be split between the 2 fiscal years. Designation of streets to be seal coated for FY 2015-16 will be an agenda item at the next council meeting.

Sidewalk Program: City employees informed the council that the sidewalk program as it is currently setup is not working. Assessing repair by the "square of sidewalk" is not conducive to homeowners fixing a single square or contractors bidding several single squares in different sections of Springville. Consensus was that the program needs to be started earlier in the season with an earlier completion date also. This will be discussed again at the April 6th council meeting.

M/b Brady, 2nd/b Hoyt approving **Resolution #11-2015: A Resolution Adopting FY 2015-16.** Roll call vote, Sindelar absent. M/c.

M/b Merritt, 2nd/b Ralston approving the 2nd reading of Ordinance **#1-2015:** An Ordinance Amending the Official Zoning Map, 2001 for the City of

Springville, Iowa in Accordance with Section 165.05, Changes in the Official Zoning Map (*Caraway***)** and to waive the 3rd and final reading. Roll call vote, Sindelar absent. Motion carried. Ordinance #1-2015 is duly adopted and shall be published and posted as prescribed by Springville Code, Chapter 18.05(2): Manner of Publication.

Correspondence: Library liaison Maretta Ralston noted that Library Board President has problems with the newsletter.

Next Meeting: April 16, 2015.

M/b Hoyt, 2nd/b Merritt to adjourn at 7:48 p.m. All ayes, m/c.

Work Session - April 13, 2015

Mayor Shebetka called the special session of the City Council to order at 6:00 PM at City Hall. Present on roll call: Ralston, Brady, Merritt, Hoyt and Sindelar. Attorney Megan Dimmitt was also present.

The city council met to review the employee manual and make needed changes. Attorney Dimmitt noted changes in wording or terminology that were needed due to changes made at the state or federal level. Council reviewed the manual page by page and noted changes made by the attorney. Pertinent sections were reviewed and some changes made. Another work session will be scheduled if needed.

Mayor Shebetka adjourned at 8:26 p.m.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS April 20, 2015

Mayor Shebetka called the regular meeting of the City Council to order at 6:00 pm in City Hall. Present on roll call: Brady, Hoyt, Ralston, Merritt and Sindelar.

Consent Agenda: M/b Brady, 2nd/b Sindelar, to approve the consent agenda as posted. All ayes, m/c.

Citizens with Concerns Not on the Agenda: Treva Davis announced The Red Cedar Chamber of Music Group will be at the Library this Saturday, April 25th from 1-3. A generous donation from Jones Regional Hospital made this free event possible.

Sheriff: not available.

Public Works Maintenance Report: Todd gave the maintenance report. He has removed the 2 Evergreen bushes in front of city hall, council to decide what to put back in their place? Todd has talked with the tire representative, and we are, in the system of the tire company to receive a rebate due to failure. Todd and Brandon have also gotten the water installed to the edge of Upper Butler Park. If the weather continues to not delay work, Todd noted they could start paving in 2 to 3 weeks on the last Phase of Broadway.

Mayor: Mayor received a request from the school to chalk the side walk in Butler Park, it is just chalk so will come off, this will be done on April 25th. He encouraged and suggested to the council to attend available workshops/work sessions. Also Springville has received a Safety Dividend from Iowa Association Of Municipal Utilities (IAMU) in the amount of \$2315.00.

Clerk: Clerk reported the days the contractor worked on the Broadway Project, and that the first payment had been made. She referred to the packet, the Fire Department quarterly report, the Parks and Libraries monthly reports, and the Library minutes were included. We are needing to set the first Ragbrai meeting for the town so look for that upcoming date. Councilman Hoyt volunteered to be on the Ragbrai committee.

Fire Department : nothing to report OldBusiness

256 Broadway Committee: We are still working on putting this group together, am in need of interested parties.

Mower Bids: Rexco entered a late bid for the purchasing of a new mower. It included a trade in of the old ExMark. Part of council supports the Rexco bid while others supported the Scherrman bid. M/b Hoyt, 2nd/b Brady to accept the Scherrman bid, m/f. M/b Sindelar, 2nd/b Ralston, to accept the Rexco bid. Ayes-Ralston, Sindelar, Merritt. Nays- Hoyt, Brady. M/c.

Broadway Street Project Lighting: Councilman Hoyt and Sindelar have worked and came up with a placement of 22 new street lights for along the Broadway Project. Their plan will be sent to the Engineer to make sure the placement is good for accurate lighting.

New Business

Scott Motors Cemetery Driveway Proposal: tabled

MSA Contract Signing to begin Sewer Rehab Study: M/b Brady, 2nd/b Sindelar to accept and sign the contract to begin the Sewer Rehab study. All ayes, m/c. Seal Coat List: A lot of discussion on the streets and what everyone thinks needs repaired and future fixes and problems. All agreed it would be nice to do more but limited on funding. Todd reduced LL Pellings original list to fit into the allowable budget. M/b Brady, 2nd/b Hoyt to accept the list of streets to be seal coated as per Todd's redo. All ayes, m/c.

Parking Sign between the Library and Post Office: Several vehicles have been parking in the Post Office parking lot, from misinterpretation of the parking sign location. Todd settled with Treva that the sign will go in the flower bed by the fire hydrant.

Beginning of Engineering for the 5th Street- Street Project: Councilman Hoyt stated the school should be involved, as we need the specs for the proposed new building and how to correct some poor drainage issues. The city has no real scheduled date at this time so are just starting the discussion and planning phases. Until some unanswered question get solved no need to spend time and money on this project.

Resolution #06-2015: A Resolution Approving Temporary Construction Easements Related to the Broadway Phase IV Project for Burnell (as amended).
