

DO YOU REMEMBER WHEN...

Plans for restoration of Brown Monument announced

Revolutionary War veteran Nathan Brown died Nov. 25, 1842, near Springville. Now his badly deteriorated monument in the Springville Cemetery will be restored by Philip Michel of Solon, owner of Memorials by Michel, in 2018.

Grants will be applied for, and donations welcomed, to cover the nearly \$34,000 cost, said Bev Franks. "It's a large sum, but preserving this monument is important," she stated. "It honors the memory of one who fought for the founding of the U.S.A. and all the freedoms we enjoy today."

Ms. Franks represents the Marion-Linn Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) on the Brown Monument Restoration Committee. (Separate article lists other members.) Springville's City Council approved the project Oct. 16.

Springville owns the cemetery; the monument belongs to Brown's descendants. Two have been located, in California and Texas, and have okayed the restoration. American Legion Post 331 of Springville is the governing body for fundraising.

Nathan Brown was born just north of New York City in 1761 or 1762. His first combat was the Battle of Harlem Heights (N.Y.) Sept. 17, 1776. After the war ended in 1783, he lived in New York state, Pennsylvania, and Illinois before coming to Linn County, Iowa, in May 1839. In 1841, the township where he settled was named in his honor.







The Nathan Brown Monument, made of zinc, has stood in the Springville Cemetery since 1886. About 20 feet tall, it has bas-relief portraits of Nathan's son Horace and daughter-in-law Julia on two sides.

Brown's grave was originally in the Paralta Cemetery south of Springville. It was moved to Springville (date unknown), probably by order of his son Horace. Horace bought the monument in 1886, according to a Cedar Rapids Gazette article in 2014. Only one other Revolutionary War veteran's grave is in Linn County. Virginia native John Osborn is buried at Center Point.

Four recall Thanksgivings of many years ago

Merle "Van" Van Sickle of Marion, 99 on Nov.1, grew up near Springville. He spent childhood Thanksgivings at his Cashman grandparents' Clarence home, where he had "a whole bunch of cousins to play with." (Van had one sister.)

In the 1920s, his family made the 30-mile trip to Clarence in an open car with no side curtains. Van said, "My mother heated bricks to put at our feet, and we covered up with a horse blanket." Later, the family got an enclosed car.

Pat Peters Rose, 89, of Marion formerly lived in Springville and taught third grade. She grew up at Spragueville (Jackson County). Thanksgiving was spent with her aunt and uncle. Pat recalls her uncle's accent; he was born in Ireland.

"We ate duck or goose," she said. "And Aunt Margaret made great angel food cakes." There was just one cousin, and "he usually had the latest toys," recalled Pat. He shared them willingly. Pat liked his tricycle, as she didn't have one.

Pauline Dostal Randall, 94, of rural Springville, grew up near Toledo (Tama County). Thanksgiving was celebrated either at her parents' home, or with one of her father's eight brothers and sisters, all living within 10 miles.

Her mother raised ducks, so that was the Thanksgiving meat, roasted in a wood-burning stove. (Pauline had to bring in wood.) "We raised almost all our own food," she said. "About all we bought at the store was sugar and flour."

Finishing cornpicking – by hand, with horses – before Thanks-giving was the goal in **Paul Nielsen**'s childhood, he said. He will turn 90 in January, and has lived on the same farm southwest of Springville for 85 years.

His mother bought 300 baby chicks yearly, kept the pullets (females), and sold most of the roosters. Roast chicken was the Thanksgiving bird. Paul's great-aunt and great-uncle from Kenwood (now part of Cedar Rapids) feasted with the Nielsens.

Nov. 14 meeting for Historical Society



Ms. Anderson, who was unknown to planners of the service, had seen KCRG-TV's report on the dedication. She has photos and other mementos of Robert, who was lost at sea during the Korean War. It is hoped she will attend and speak at a future SAHS meeting.

Jean Schmidt, secretary-treasurer, announced that Dale Lassen of Springville would be inducted to the Iowa Fast-Pitch Softball Hall of Fame Oct. 15. She showed a photo he had donated. Also, SAHS voted to contribute \$100 to the Iowa Museum Association's "Teaching Iowa History: Tools for Teachers" project.

Others present were James Crow, president; Karen Taylor, historian; Doug Beard, Dixie Brady, Rick Heeren, Dave and Eleanor Kelley, Bob McArthur, the Rev. Anna Mae Peck, and Phil and Karen Randall.


