

Oct. 10 ceremony for Newman, lost at sea

On Oct. 10, a plaque will be dedicated at the Springville Cemetery in memory of Robert L. Newman, who died in the Korean War. The public is welcome at the short 10 a.m. ceremony. American Legion Post 331 will participate, and Anna Mae Peck of Cedar Rapids, formerly of Springville,

will sing the Navy Hymn.


Kim Shipley of Cedar Rapids, Newman's distant cousin, will also take part. There are no closer relatives, since Newman had no children, nieces, or nephews.

He was one of eight crew members lost at sea Dec. 26, 1952, when a Navy bomber's engines failed and it crashed off the coast of North Korea. Four men were rescued by a U. S. destroyer, and two crewmen's bodies were recovered. The plane was based at Iwakuni, Japan.

A 1948 Springville High School graduate, Bob was the son of Hubert "Stub" and Elizabeth Soper Newman. He joined the Navy in 1950 and was stationed at Whidbey Island, Wash. His schoolmate, Norman Nielsen, visited him before New-

man was sent to Japan and Nielsen to Alaska with the Army.

DO YOU REMEMBER WHEN...

Matsell siblings lived in Mexico, England, several U.S. states

Mrs. Mary Finn was born in England in 1798, lived in New York City, and died in Iowa 160 years ago. Her grave is in Hazel Knoll Cemetery north of Viola. Few know her link to a notable early part-time resident of Linn County.

She was the sister of George W. Matsell, a New York City police chief. In the 1850s, he bought lowa land and built a large summer home overlooking the Wapsipinicon River in Buffalo Township. Oct. 26 will be the 206th anniversary of his birth.

Mary was 19 and George going on 6 when they arrived in the U. S. from England in July 1817 with their parents, four siblings, and grandmother. Another Matsell child was born in New York City, where the family settled.

As a widow, Mary came to lowa about 1856 with her son, Matthew D. Finn Jr. A carpenter, he helped build the Matsell mansion. Mary died Oct. 19, 1857. Her brother George donated land for Hazel Knoll.

Mary and George's siblings were William, born in 1800; Susan, 1802; Augustus, 1813; Elizabeth, 1817; and Henry (Harry), about 1820. Like his father, **William Matsell** was a tailor, but nothing else is known.

In 1846, **Susan**'s husband, James Fiora, was appointed U. S. Consul to Manchester, England. Susan died there in 1857, the same year as her sister Mary. (Ardwick Cemetery, the Fioras' burial place, was destroyed in 1965 to make a soccer field.)

Augustus owned a Manhattan bookstore, then went to California in the late 1840s. He returned to New York City in September 1850 to marry Margaret Augusta Smith. They moved to Acapulco, Mexico. On March 15, 1852, when their baby Paula was not yet two months old, Augustus died at 38.

Elizabeth Matsell and Joseph Sweet, a ladder-maker, were married in 1841 by New York City Mayor Robert H. Morris. Joseph apparently died before 1874, the year Elizabeth wed Frederick Aldridge. Elizabeth died after June 1890.

Harry was a lieutenant in the Mexican War, 1846-48. He married Augustus' widow in June 1854 in New York. They lived in California, Wisconsin, and

Butler friendship with Matsells

An article about George W. Matsell in the July 1924 Palimpsest, Iowa history journal, stated: "C. F. Butler of Springville relates that in company with his father, Joseph Butler, he was a frequent visitor in the Matsell home and was on friendly terms with the boys (*George Jr., Gus, and Harry*).

"He remembers particularly the immense stature of the father Matsell, who must have weighed 300 pounds. He always rode in the back seat of a carriage built especially for his use." George Matsell died in 1877, when C. F. (Fred) Butler was 20.

Matsell mice, and adoption offer

Mrs. Mary Jane Kohl Smith of Cedar Rapids, a 1936 Springville High School graduate, shared a Matsell story told by her grandmother. As children in the 1870s, the grandmother (also named Mary Jane) and her sister Amanda were hired to catch mice at the Matsell place. The pay was 2 cents per mouse.

Cats would have been more efficient, but "Miss Susie," unmarried daughter of George W. Matsell, perhaps liked children better. She wanted to adopt Mary Jane, but the girl's parents, Samuel and Monterey (Montie) Cook, would not consider it.

Kansas. Widowed, Harry moved to the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers in Virginia. He died in 1898 and was interred in Hampton (Va.) National Cemetery.

A foot injury was blamed for **George W. Matsell**'s death July 25, 1877, at his New York
City home. He was 65. He left a widow, Ellen, and
four unmarried adult children. All are buried in
Manhattan's Trinity Church Cemetery – far from
the quiet lowa grave of Mary Finn.

SAHS pursuing repair of Brown monument


The Springville Area Historical Society (SAHS), meeting Sept. 12, continued to discuss the deteriorating Brown monument at the town cemetery. It marks the grave of Nathan Brown, a Revolutionary War veteran. He died in 1842.

Bev Franks, who is in SAHS and Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), reported she has contacted the owner of Memorials by Michel in Solon. He will inspect the monument soon and recommend repair options.

Dedication Oct. 10 of a memorial plaque at the Springville Cemetery for Robert L. Newman, a Korean War casualty, was also discussed. (See article, Page 1.)

SAHS has received two welcome gifts, a copy of the Marion Sentinel's 1937 Linn County centennial issue from Pat Klopfenstein of Marion, and an 1880s or '90s stereoscope slide of Springville's Main Street from Max Gramling of La Crescent, Minn.



FALL IS HERE!

The changing of weather and seasons is a beautiful time of year, some would even say it is their favorite time of year. The leaves changing colors is an amazing site, but it can also leave a mess behind (no pun intended). Just a reminder about your leaf pick up, the City of Springville

does not allow you to burn your leaves or put them in the street. We don't have the equipment to pick them up. We do have a yard waste site that you are welcome to use. We appreciate your cooperation with this.



YARD WASTE SITE

The City operates a yard waste site for residents to dispose of grass clippings, shrubbery, garden waste, leaves, trees and branches. The site is located at the north end of JR Barnes Parkway. This area is to be used by SPRINGVILLE RESIDENTS ONLY and is NOT FOR GARBAGE. You must divide your yard waste in the appropriate areas: (1) grass, leaves, garden waste, and small brush up to 1/2 inch in diameter, or (2) brush and trees. No yard waste shall be left at the site in any container, such as garbage bags, boxes, garbage cans or other receptacles. All of the by-products resulting from the use and maintenance of the yard waste site (mulch, compost and firewood) may be used at no charge by any City resident.



Mayor Shebetka called the regular meeting of the Springville City Council to order at 6:00 pm at City Hall. Present on roll call: Councilpersons: Dennis Thies, Brad Merritt, Pat Hoyt, and Mareta Ralston. Also in attendance were: Bev Franks, Deb Vaughn, Lyle Andersen, Treva Davis, Justin Mottet, Michele Stone, Jean Schmidt.

M/B Thies to approve the consent agenda, 2/B Merritt, all ayes, motion carried.

Mayor Shebetka Proclaimed the week of September 17 through 23 as Constitution Week as requested by the Daughters of the American Revolution represented by Bev Franks.

Justin Mottet of Alliant Energy gave an update on their plans for upgrading equipment to reduce costs in and around Springville.

Motion by Hoyt, to accept Michele Stone's Board Application for Planning and zooming Commission, 2/B Merritt, all ayes, motion carried.

Discussion was held to allow non-profits to purchase and place banners with council approval on the City's 36 sign capable poles. Clerk was directed to find interested citizens in serving on a Banner Committee.

Clerk was directed to get intention signatures from parties adjacent to alley between 151 5th Street and 119 5th Street before proceeding to a public hearing on the alley's vacation.
