DO YOU REMEMBER WHEN...

Pancakes for supper, and a 'holdup' that wasn't

On a calm September evening in 1954, the two teenaged employees of Springville's Cup and Saucer Café were getting reading to close. Then a young, neatly dressed man came in, sat at the counter, and ordered pancakes and fried potatoes.

Pancakes for supper: not an unusual meal today, but odd 63 years ago. While Nancy Bebber, 17, and Bev Heald, 15, began to prepare the order, the man went next door to use the pay phone at Ernie Johnson's Standard Oil gas station. Ernie's son Bob, 17, was working that night.

Returning to the café, the man ate his supper, then went to the cash register. Suddenly things got tense. He showed a handgun, said "This is a holdup," and ordered Nancy to open the cash register. "It was definitely scary," she said, recalling the situation.

Somehow she stayed calm and made casual conversation. The man seemed to relax. At last, he put the pistol in his pocket and said, "It's just a joke." He paid his bill as if nothing had happened. As he left, Nancy asked if the gun was real and loaded. Yes, and yes.

Bev then called the Linn County Sheriff.

The man was traced through the phone call he had made. A college junior from Elgin, Ill., he had been under a psychiatrist's care. He'd never been in trouble with the law before, and charges were dropped. Today he would be about 84.

Nancy Bebber Akers now lives in Central City. Bev Heald Franks lives in Marion, as does Bob Johnson. Bev's mother, Phoebe Root Heald Brooks, who ran the café, died in 2001 at 82. The café was torn down years ago. Ernie Johnson died in 1996 at 88. The former Standard station, on the southeast corner of First Avenue (old 151) and Fifth Street, stands vacant.

15 more CCC men named

Last month's Springville News listed three local men who served at Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) camps in Iowa, and Loren "Bucky" Brown, who served in Arkansas. But the actual number of Springville men in Iowa camps was 18, according to CCC Museum records at Backbone State Park.

Besides Clair "Kye" Carnahan, Paul Ewart, and Ray McNeilly, Springville men at Iowa CCC camps were Lewellyn Bebber, Ronald Caldwell, Evan Calvert, Francis "Jim" Carnahan, Burdette Christian, Merle Clark, G. C. Falson, Marlin Foust, James Harness, Delbert Lassen, Melvin Nelson, Harrison Paul, Robert Reed, Clarence Taylor, and Harold Woods.

Museum records also list Merle Ross of Whittier and Roy Miles of Waubeek, plus four Martelle men: Melvin Decious, Raymond Dodse, Kenneth May, and Dwight Willison. The CCC Museum is open weekends, Memorial Day through Labor Day.


L. J. Rose robbed in 1930

A real holdup occurred at Springville's Standard Oil station June 28, 1930. Two armed men accosted owner L. J. Rose and took the day's receipts. They then forced Rose to accompany them (how far, the Springville New Era didn't say), to delay his reporting of the holdup. Apparently the bad guys were never caught.

Rose was born in 1898 in Jones County, and married Mildred Merrell. He was in Springville from 1927 to his death in 1953.


