August was another busy month here in Springville. We celebrated together at another Springville Fun Days. The 5th Street project had us all wondering if we would be able to have our annual parade, but with group effort from our City staff and Eastern Iowa Excavating we made it happen.

There was a lot more activity in town that day. Wendling Quarries celebrated their 60th anniversary. They invited anyone and everyone to come tour the facility. They had fun for the kids and served free steak

It seemed like 5th Street took a long time to get paved. There was a lot of things happening under the street, but it finally got paved. There was a lot of big equipment and a lot of extra workers on hand. Obviously the project isn't done, but the crew is working on getting all the driveways poured, getting the curb and gutter in and putting in new sidewalk. It is going to look great when it is complete.

We also got the new emergency sirens and are working on getting them installed. You can read more about that on page 13.

I want to finish up by thanking all the volunteers that have shown up in some form or another this past month to make so many great things happen.

The City of Springville would like to thank our residents for their support and understanding as the 5th Street improvement project nears completion. The project has included upgrades of the water and storm sewer system along with roadway paving and sidewalk. The new roadway will provide improved access to our school, increased capacity to our water system, and improvements to storm drainage along 5th street. This project, in conjunction with our school, is another step in helping our community to grow.

The project has created inconveniences for those who live along the project as they have dealt with temporary relocation of mailboxes and trash pickup, as well as periods of times where access to their driveways were limited or unavailable. There have also been inconveniences for the rest of the community as it may have meant adjusting daily commutes and being extra vigilant as parents deliver students to the school. Staff has worked diligently to try and make these inconveniences as limited as possible by having daily planning meetings with the contractor to discuss what will happen next as well as making the contractor aware of any concerns that have been brought forward and getting the word out through social media about timing of individual construction elements.

The City had several public meetings prior to construction for residents to review and comment on the plans. It is understood that as the project nears completion what was shown on the construction plans comes into sharper focus. If you have any questions about what is going on please feel free to contact City Staff.

Again, thank you for your continued support and patience while we are making improvements to your community.



A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

Teen hurt while preparing for auto race on Springville Road

The following article, headlined "Steele Struck by Auto," was published in the Springville New Era Thursday, Sept. 23, 1915.

"Willis Steele was badly hurt Sunday (Sept. 19, 1915) when he was struck by M. R. Sterner's auto. His right knee was dislocated and he was badly bruised up; no bones were broken.

"Clair Davis and Wilmer Rittmer, each of whom drives an antiquated Brush Runabout, were planning a race between their cars . . . on the Springville-Paralta road south of the A. Greenawalt place, accompanied by a crowd of boys . . .

"They were getting their cars tuned up ready for the start and had the road almost blocked when Mr. Sterner came along in his car. Sterner sounded his horn . . . Steele, who was working with one of the cars . . . did not move until the Sterner car was almost even with him.

"Then he stepped back directly in front of it. He was struck by the fender, knocked down, and dragged for a short distance, but fortunately none of the wheels passed over him. Sterner applied his brakes, and the promptness with which he stopped his car probably saved Steele from more serious injuries.


"Steele was taken home in Sterner's car, and Dr. Graham was called . . . (Steele) will be laid up for some time, but it is hoped that he will make a complete recovery." [End of article]

'Cast of characters'

Willis G. Steele turned 17 four days after the accident. He was born in Maine Township, Linn County, to Charles and (Eva) Emma Stewart Steele. Willis was married to Mary Adelia Tacker, Norma Carruther, Edith Higgins Lacock, and Nina Alvord Stark Ellison. He died in 1984 at Winfield, DuPage County, Ill. Willis and Nina are buried at Springville.

Clair Thomas Davis, 22, was one of the would-be racers. His parents were John Andrew Davis and Julia Chapman Davis. Clair's mother was a niece of Julia Chapman Brown, daughter-

CLAIR THOMAS DAVIS was the uncle of former Springville and Martelle residents John Harl "Hank" Davis Jr., 92, of Morrison, Ill., and his sister, Wanda Lambert, 90, of Clear Lake. Clair was the great-uncle of Jean Schmidt and Don McShane of Springville. Their mother, the late Clara McShane, was Hank and Wanda's sister.



in-law of Revolutionary War veteran Nathan Brown.

After World War I service in England and France, Clair moved to Marion in 1924 and worked as a barber. He married Grace Wendler, and they had five children. Clair died in 1948 and is buried in Marion's Oak Shade Cemetery.

Milton R. Sterner, 57 in 1915, was a Springville grocer. (His son Paul joined the business later.) Dr. J. DeWitt Graham, 56, practiced medicine in Springville 44 years. The race – on a public road! – was to be near the home of Abraham and "Verna" Fox Greenawalt, 63 and 58. Their house still stands, at 2530 Springville Road, south of Highway 151.

No information was found about *Wilmer Rittmer*. The Brush Runabout cars owned by him and Clair Davis were produced in Highland Park, Mich., from 1907 to 1913. They weren't really "antiquated" in 1915!

1940s childhood escapades of two little Gramling brothers

Max and Margaret Gramling of LaCrescent, Minn., subscribe to the Springville News. Max wrote, "The July issue gave me a flashback to when I was 3 to 4 years old. I vividly recall Larry (my brother one year older) and I leaving our yard and going to Charlie Boxwell's to watch the animals, specifically the mules.

"Larry was a 'runner' and I would follow wherever he went . . . I recall one time we ventured down to the (Broadway) bridge . . . and some older boys grabbed Larry and held him over the side of the bridge, telling us this was their part of town, and if we ever came back they would throw us over."

Max added, "Mother eventually started 'tethering' Larry to the clothesline, and then we learned to stay in the yard." The Gramlings left Springville when Max was 5. His wife, the former Margaret Chambers, grew up here and graduated from Springville High School in 1963.

Wood couple in Paralta area lost 8 of their 13 children

In April 1879 near Paralta, diphtheria killed five children in the Wood family: *Ida E.*, 23 months; *Mark*, 4 ½; *Lenora A.*, 6; *William Nelson*, about 9; and *Columbus*, 11 ½. Three of their siblings died at other times.

In Paralta Cemetery, six boys and two girls are memorialized on one stone. It gives no birth or death dates for *Thomas J.*, 6 months, 17 days; *David F.*, 8 months, 4 days; and *John W.*, 2 years, 9 months. Possibly they were born in the early 1850s, but this is conjecture.

The five surviving Wood sons were in their teens or early 20s in April 1879: Axen Ira, born in 1856; Charles Commodore, 1858; Jasper Eldorada, 1860; George Albert, 1862; and Theodore Sherman, 1865. Thankfully, Axen's tragic demise years later could not be foreseen.

The parents were William Washington Wood, born in 1822 in Washington County, Ind., and Mary "Polly" Whitlatch, 1832, a native of Athens County, Ohio. The Whitlatches settled near Paralta, south of Springville, in 1839. William came to Iowa before December 1846.

On April 8, 1849, William, 27, and Polly, going on 17, were married by Ezekiel Cox Jr., J. P. The wedding may have been at the home of the bride's parents, John W. and Annie Whitlatch.

The Woods had been married 30 years when they lost five children to diphtheria. Their golden wedding anniversary was April 8, 1899. They lived 1 ½ miles south of Mount Vernon then, but earlier had spent a year in Cherokee County, Iowa.

In December 1899, Polly lost her husband, 77. He was buried at Paralta. Less than a year later, she returned to Paralta for her son Axen's services. At 44, he died on his farm southeast of Martelle Sept. 1, 1900.

THE ANAMOSA JOURNAL reported that Axen followed his wife Anar from their house, pointing a pistol at her. Then he saw

their son Emery, 18, going squirrel hunting, and ordered him to put down his shotgun. Emery told his father to put down his pistol. Axen cocked his gun, preparing to fire.

"With his mother in imminent peril," the Journal stated, "young Wood closed his eyes and pulled both triggers on the shotgun." Axen died instantly; Anar was safe.

Emery was jailed at Anamosa. An inquest was held Sept. 2. Axen's funeral was Sept. 3 at Paralta Presbyterian Church, on the southwest corner of Springville and Paralta roads. On Sept. 5, following preliminary examination, the judge released Emery. No trial was held.

Polly Whitlatch Wood, 72, who suffered so much grief in her life, died July 6, 1904, at her home on South First Avenue, Mount Vernon. In Paralta Cemetery, she and William rest with nine of their 13 children.

NOTE: The Anamosa Eureka, competitor of the Journal, gave a different account of events leading to Axen's death. But in both newspaper versions, Emery Wood, defending his mother, killed his father.

RUTH WURSTER of rural Springville is the granddaughter of Jasper Wood, William and Polly's son. William's mother, Elizabeth Turpin Wood (1802-1868), is interred at Mount Zion Cemetery, about 5 miles south of Springville. She was a "Real Daughter of the American Revolution," meaning her father fought in the war.

GEORGE A. WOOD, son of William and Polly, opened a grocery store on Springville's south side in June 1920. How long he operated it is unknown. He later moved to Orange County, Calif., and died Nov. 26, 1952, at age 90.

AXEN WOOD'S WIFE Anar was the daughter of Eliza Melissa *Mann* Barto. Annie *Mann* Whitlatch was the maternal grandmother of Axen; he and Anar might have been distantly related. After Axen's death, Anar remarried and at 46 gave birth to Margaret Ellen Houseworth in 1912.

"The remaining stock of the former Christman hardware store, including hog waterers, hog feeders, oil burners, electric motors, lawn mowers, paint, shotguns, electric clocks, fishing equipment, garden tools, kitchen ware, lots of electrical appliances, bolts, nuts and screws, and hundreds of other small articles – all new."

These were some of the many items auctioned July 10, 1954, at the final sale of Christman's Hardware on Broadway in Springville. Auctioneers were W. F. Mitchell and Stanley "Bud" Smith. The sale was clerked by the Exchange State Bank.


JUNK VEHICLES

JUNK VEHICLES ARE PROHIBITED. It is unlawful for any person to store, accumulate, or allow to remain on any private property within the corporate limits of the City any junk vehicle.

"Junk vehicle" means any "vehicle," as defined by Section 321.1 of the Code of Iowa, or any motor vehicle, recreational vehicle, boat, trailer or semi-trailer which is located within the corporate limits of the City which lacks a current registration, valid for that vehicle, and/or which has any one or more of the following characteristics:

- A. Broken Glass.
- B. Broken, Loose or Missing Part.
- C. Habitat for Nuisance Animals or Insects.
- D. Flammable Fuel. E. Inoperable.
- F. Defective or Obsolete Condition.






- B. A currently registered recreational vehicle (camper, snowmobile, motorcycle, boat or utility trailer) parked in a rear or side yard that is not a driveway, provided that:
 - (1) The vehicle does not violate any of the other solid waste or junk vehicle ordinances;
- (2) The vehicle is on a concrete, crushed compressed rock or blacktop surface, free of weeds and vegetation, no smaller than the width and length of the vehicle; and
- (3) The vehicle placement is no closer than twenty-five (25) feet to the front yard line and not closer than one foot to the adjoining side or rear lot lines.

WEEDS AND GRASSES




- A. Each owner and each person in control of any land shall cut or otherwise destroy all noxious weeds and shall keep said lands free of such growth.
- B. Each owner and each person in control of any property shall be responsible to keep said lot, along with parking adjacent thereto, alleys, public ways or areas up to the centerline of said ways free of any noxious weeds and to keep grasses and weeds on said lot mowed so that grass and weeds are less than twelve (12) inches in height.
- C. Each owner and each person in control of any lands shall not allow any plant growth of any sort to remain in such a manner as to render the streets, alleys or public ways adjoining said land unsafe for public travel or in any manner so as to impede pedestrian or vehicular traffic upon any public place or way.
- D. No owner or person in control of any developed or undeveloped lot shall allow plant growth or the accumulation of plant materials on such lot to remain in such a state so as to constitute a fire hazard.





SANITARY DISPOSAL REQUIRED. It is the duty of each owner to provide for the sanitary disposal of all solid waste accumulating on the owner's premises before it becomes a nuisance. Any such accumulation remaining on any premises for a period of more than thirty (30) days shall be deemed a nuisance and the City may proceed to abate such nuisances.



They feel this would be a safer option than coming out of the public parking on Broadway Street where the angle parking is. They could go down Water Street and come onto Broadway from 2nd Avenue. Hoyt discussed his concerns with this option. This topic will need to be brought in front of the community in a public hearing.

There being no further discussion, Thies moved to adjourn at 7:23 p.m., second from Andersen. Motion carried.

The end of an era!!

Springville has two new (refurbished) emergency sirens. Early this year, one of the old sirens stopped working and the other was getting almost impossible to repair. The council acted to get newer sirens. We have waited all summer and they are finally here.
