

BULKY TRASH AMNESTY DAY SEPTEMBER 17 7:30 AM - 11:00 AM



- This is NOT curb side pick up.
- Drop off behind City Hall (304 Broadway)
- Must show proof of residency (open to residents and businesses that pay for solid waste)
- Items accepted: sofas, mattresses, furniture, noncommercial appliances, windows, doors, clean metal and other large bulky items. Any small motorized equipment brought in needs to be drained of gas and oil
- Appliances limited to (2) per residential household or business (air conditioners and water heaters are considered appliances).
- Electronics accepted: copy & fax machines, cd players, VCRs, TVs, stereos, battery backups, cell phones, computer equipment, computer cords, etc.
- If you need assistance with your items, please call City Hall at 319-854-6428.

**Items not accepted: lead acid batteries, tires, railroad ties, radioactive materials, untreated medical waste, Styrofoam, any recyclable materials, pressurized tanks, and material usually deposited in garbage bags, raw construction materials (shingles, wood, concrete, re-rod, etc.), burn barrels and ash, large commercial appliances (walk-in freezers, commercial stoves, etc.) and hazardous waste items. A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

Bob Hunte owned car that had belonged to gangster

When Bob Hunte, 90, was a Springville High School student, he had a black 1937 Lincoln Zephyr. Its former owner was a gangster who had fled Chicago when things got hot, Bob said. Sonny Ebson, the gangster, lived with his girlfriend in Springville. Her surname was Hart, and her parents' home was on the South Side, just south of Briner's store.

Bob paid \$150 for the Lincoln, replacing his first car, a Model A Ford. He had spending money in high school because he worked part-time at Don Peterson's filling station, 275 Broadway. Jake Hiner's plumbing and heating business is there now.


Bob's friends loved to ride in the Lincoln. They chipped in to buy gas, he recalls, because the big car got only about 7 miles to the gallon. He owned it for part of a year. One of his pranks was to drive it, with passengers, on the Milwaukee Road tracks from Springville to Anamosa.

HOW DID THEY KNOW a train wasn't coming? "We didn't; we just guessed," Bob said. "I was kind of a wild guy back then." He admits to numerous close brushes with death, one in a deep swimming hole east of Springville and another, as an adult with a chain saw. The latter required major face and neck plastic surgery.

In high school, Bob sang second bass in Bertha Koppenhaver's mixed chorus and boys' quartet, played bass horn in Roy Schwab's band, and at 6 feet tall was on the basketball team. He also enjoyed informal wrestling, boxing, and swimming.

When Bob was in elementary school, he had rheumatic fever and missed much of the school year. As a result, he had to repeat that grade, so he graduated with the class of 1950 rather than '49. He wanted to join the Navy, but was rejected because the rheumatic fever put him at risk for heart disease.

Bob met his future wife, Reta Etzel, at a dance at Coggon's Harvest Home. They were married October 25, 1952, in Springville, and had almost 59 years together. Reta died June 24, 2021. Today Bob shares his home with his youngest son, Jim. His other children are John of Cedar Rapids; Mary Ann, St. Louis, Mo.; and Fred, Hiawatha. Son Joe is deceased.

BOB AND JIM HUNTE represent the third and fourth Hunte generations in Springville. Jim's great-grandparents, Fred and Amelia Brenker Hunte, came here with their children, Grace and Ralph, in 1912 from Beecher, Illinois. Fred bought a furniture store and undertaking business from Frank C. Pearson. (It was in the north half of what is now Sally's on Broadway, a restaurant that draws both Springville and out-of-town business.)

The store had a balcony on first floor to display more furniture. The undertaking business was in the basement. Bob does not remember what year it was moved to a double house two buildings south of the telephone company.

Ralph Hunte graduated from Springville, High School in 1916. The U.S. entered World War I the next year. Ralph joined the Navy, serving on a mine-laying ship in the North Sea. Later he was posted on the U.S.S. Olympia, formerly Admiral Dewey's flagship in Manila Bay.







Three generations of Huntes have been Springville High School alumni. From left, graduation photos of Ralph Hunte, 1916; Bob Hunte, 1950; Jim Hunte, 1989. The war ended in 1918, and Ralph worked on trains as a railway mail clerk. In June 1921, he joined his father in business. He married Ina Cecelia Gore, originally from Wapello, August 30, 1924. She had come to Springville as a school teacher.

Sadly, Ralph and Ina's first child, Barbara Lee, died at birth in 1926. Virginia Amelia was born October 10, 1927, and Robert Ralph "Bob" October 2, 1931. Both graduated from Springville High School. Virginia died in Oregon in 1994.

At 83, Fred died in January 1950, after almost 38 years in Springville. At some point, Ralph closed the furniture store, but kept the funeral home until early spring 1965, when he sold it to Murdoch's. Ironically, Ralph died soon after, on April 18, 1965. He was 67, and had been first a partner and then sole owner of the funeral home almost 44 years. Springville had a Hunte funeral home from 1912 to 1965. It was one of the town's longest existing businesses.



FRED HUNTE'S PARENTS, Ludwig Hunte and Dorothea Ebeling, were born in Lower Saxony, Germany. A river named Hunte ran through that area. The German pronunciation is "Hoon-tuh". Ludwig and Dorothea came to Illinois in the early 1850's, and married in Chicago Oct. 30, 1857.

GRACE HUNTE WAS the daughter of Fred and sister of Ralph. She graduated from Coe College and taught for several years. On January 20, 1927, she married Elmer Wellner. He was a bookkeeper at the Springville elevator, and Grace was instrumental in founding the Springville Memorial Library.

The Springville City Council met in regular session August 1, 2022.

Pledge of allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm. Council members present: Jeff Baych, Brad Merritt, Cindy Kilburg, Karla Blakely, and Bart Barner. City staff present: Public Works Director Todd Wyman and City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Mary and Karl Clapp, Jean Menster, Daryl Pearson, and Treva Davis were also present.

Kilburg made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

Blakely made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items: Approval of July 18, 2022, meeting minutes, and claims, seconded by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried.

Officer Tindal presented Linn County Sheriff's report.

Library report included in packet.

Public Works report included in packet.

Clerk report included in packet.

Mayor would like to bring awareness to the pedestrian lights at two of our intersection so that cars stop for pedestrians.

Merritt would like to see the nuisance spreadsheet monthly so that council is kept up to date on what is getting done.

Mayor invited citizens with input to speak. Mary Clapp of Marion came to discuss the Grant Wood Trail. She is looking to get park of the trail dedicated to the first responders. They took a hit during COVID, and she would like to see something dedicated in their honor. She has presented to Marion and Linn County. She has good support with them. She is looking to get Creekside Dr. to Springville Rd. dedicated. There being no further public comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

After a lengthy discussion, Barner made a motion to approve Resolution 35-2022 to award bid for Emmons Park, seconded by Blakely. RCV: AYES: Barner. NAYS: Merritt, Baych, Kilburg, Blakely. **RESOLUTION 35-2022 failed**.

Discussion held on Chapter 136 revisions. Engineer has looked at them, they are currently with the attorney. Council is happy with the changes. Council will refer to P & Z for final review.

Council deferred ATV/UTV code review to P & Z.

Blakely made a motion to approve the tax abatement at 701 Heather Lane, seconded by Barner. All ayes. Motion carried.

The next regular council meeting will be August 15, 2022, at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall.

There being no further discussion, Baych moved to adjourn at 7:21 p.m., seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.

Linn County Sheriff's report presented.

Mayor read proclamation he declared September 1, 2022, a the 16th Annual Five Seasons Stand Down. He updated coulcil on damage done at the cemetery. He also commented or how nice it was to see all council out and about this weeken.

Blakely reported that a lot of candy wrappers left in Butler Pa after the event. Need to find solutions for this. Barner addec that the weekend was well attended and went well.

Mayor invited citizens with input to speak. There being no pulic comments, Mayor Andersen moved to business.

Fosbinder presented the water study completed by MSA. Th need to get the Intended Use Plan for the SRF completed by September 1. To complete the study, council will need to pic a preferred location for the future water tower. This does not tie this council or future councils to this location. After discus sion Barner made a motion to approve Alternative E, seconced by Baych. All ayes. Motion carried. Fosbinder also discussed that they are ready to train us on the GIS system. Shwill get dates and bring back to the office.

Blakely made a motion to approve Resolution 36-2022, a res lution approving a contract with Shive-Hattery for additional surveying work, seconded by Baych. RCV: AYES: Barner, Merritt, Blakely, Baych, Kilburg. NAYS: None. **RESOLUTION** 36-2022 adopted.

Blakely made a motion to approve Resolution 37-2022, a res lution approving a contract with Shive-Hattery for Phase 2 re vamping and Phase 3 design and inspections, seconded by Barner. RCV: AYES: Kilburg, Baych, Blakely, Barner, Merrit **RESOLUTION 37-2022 adopted.**

Baych made a motion to approve the tax abatement at 703 Heather Lane, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried

Mayor Andersen requested additional work to be done at the cemetery. The grass is growing over the sidewalks. He woul like it edged. He will get a bid from Ellison Lawn Care and bring back to council.

Council discussed parking issues along 1st Ave, the intersection of 5th St and Academy, and a section of Mill Ave betwee 5th St. & 4th St. The council will observe and bring back ideas to next council meeting. Iowa School Bus Laws

When you meet an oncoming school bus displaying flashing amber lights, you must slow down to no more than 20 mph and be prepared to stop. If the red lights are flashing or if the stop arm is out, you must come to a complete stop at least 15 feet from the bus. You must remain stopped as long as the red lights flash or the stop arm is out.

The only exception to this is where you are approaching the bus from the opposite direction on a road with at least two lanes in each direction.

When overtaking a school bus, you may not pass when red or amber warning lights are flashing. After a school bus has stopped to let students off, watch for children on the side of the road.
