

Iowa School Bus Laws

When you meet an oncoming school bus displaying flashing amber lights, you must slow down to no more than 20 mph


and be prepared to stop. If the red lights are flashing or if the stop arm is out, you must come to a complete stop at least 15 feet from the bus. You must remain stopped as long as the red lights flash or the stop arm is out.

The only exception to this is where you are approaching the bus from the opposite direction on a road with at least two lanes in each direction.

When overtaking a school bus, you may not pass when red or amber warning lights are flashing.

After a school bus has stopped to let students off, watch for children on the side of the road.



A STROLL THROUGH THE HIS

Mrs. Koppenhaver's memories: Teaching in the 1930s

Mrs. Bertha Nelson Koppenhaver (1909-2002) taught at Springville High School 28 years – from 1932 to '37, and from 1948 to '71. She wrote "Teaching in the Thirties," for the 1981 Springville Centennial History. Her son, Jim Koppenhaver; two of her grandchildren, David Koppenhaver and Kelly DeVore; and a greatgrandson, Jay DeVore, live in Springville.

When I came to Springville in 1932, the country was in the depths of the Great Depression. The board had hired me because, out of the 10 candidates for the job, I was the only one who could teach vocal music as well as home economics, thus making it possible to cut staff.

My contract read: "Said teacher is to teach home economics, music and other curricular activities which the Supt. deems necessary. The teacher further agrees to spend at least one-half the weekends in Springville during the school year. It is further agreed that if any dissatisfaction arises, the within contract may be canceled upon 30 days written notice by either party."

Teachers were certificated in any subject upon completing 10 semester hours in college. Three old grade books remind me that I taught a wide variety of subjects at various times: home economics (my major), modern history, psychology, biology, business arithmetic, general science, physical training, choir, besides, I coached a girls' basketball team which played a number of games with nearby towns.

Superintendents and principals taught nearly all the school day, and with three other full-time classroom teachers and a part-time band instructor (*Roy T. Schwab*) made up the entire staff of Springville High School.

Rules were strict: teachers were not to touch a cigarette or an alcoholic drink, express political views, or live out of town. Dancing was frowned upon, although teachers often went to Danceland in Cedar Rapids (but didn't advertise the fact). Apartment life was out; one boarded and roomed with a genteel family in town.

At all times, the town kept a watchful eye on any cavorting around a young and fun-loving teacher might do. Any titillating bits of gossip were immediately recounted at the pool hall the next day. If he *(or she)* became too reckless, the inevitable morning arrived when a teacher was informed that he had better resign before he got fired. There was no sick leave ei

ther, and one could be released for extended illness. The board's decisions, usually arrived at in a closed session, were final, and rarely was there an appeal of any sort.

Nor did teachers openly question the salaries given. In 1932, a college graduate by state law received \$120 a month, \$1,080 for the year. By 1933, the law was repealed and wages cut 25 percent to \$90 a month. Non-degree elementary teachers fared worse and worked for \$50 and \$60 a month, at least \$30 of which went for board and room. Still, we were among the fortunate who had jobs.


Teachers rarely owned cars; neither did the students, except for a few "jalopies" which ran on good intentions and bad rubber. When we went to Cedar Rapids, we caught a ride, rode the bus, or even hitch-hiked. One was expected to assist in teaching Sunday school, sing in the church choir, belong to Monday Club, and to play bridge at the faculty parties, no matter how inept.

But there was plenty of fun, too. Skinny (Lynn) Fowler ran a skating rink in Butler Park, and we skated every evening to the music of the noisy calliope – until (teachers) Lesta Jean Pirie and Esther Hanson fell and broke their wrists. Supt. (Clyde) Hoorneman thereupon declared the rinks off-limit to his staff.

We went on weiner roasts with the kids, walking down the railroad tracks to a convenient pasture where we could play baseball before we ate; we cheered madly at all the high school games and practiced with the town team for long happy hours, playing double headers with Central City, Coggon, Troy Mills, Viola and Whittier; we trekked to the Linn County tournaments at the old YMCA in Cedar Rapids; we put on class plays in the Opera House on Main Street (*Broadway*); we decorated with crabapple blossoms for Commencement; and we chaperoned the senior class trips to the Wapsipinicon State Park in Anamosa the final week of school.

In more sober moments we held class. We were close to Nature in the old brick building (built in 1882). As we went in the front door, we had to dodge honey bees whose caches of sweet stuff in the walls often stained the wallpaper in hot weather. There was a robin that nested each spring on the fire escape, undisturbed by students or fire drills. There were bats that came out of the attic and hung all day against the ceiling in the biology room. And once there was a goat in the bell tower the morning after Halloween.

Three classrooms and a hall made up the first floor. On cold days you warmed your feet on a metal slab next to the radiator. A wooden stairway descended to the basement, where there were several classrooms and a shop for manual training. On the top floor, a study hall with 135 attached desks, enough for the whole high school, took up half the space. The other half was divided into three classrooms with paper-thin walls, making it easy for everyone to hear

any interesting crises in disciplinary action.

I taught biology in the southeast corner room, where I had to enter first so that 40 students could be seated solidly in front of me. Lab consisted mainly of classifying leaves, ripping night crawlers apart with some extra-dull scalpels, and cutting into various organs begged from the local butcher. Obviously, everything had to be done at the teacher's desk.

In the winter of '36, storm after storm piled up the snow and closed every road. For days the thermometer plummeted to 30 degrees or more below zero. When school finally reopened, after losing a full month, we made up the time by going 50 minutes longer each day for the remainder of the year.

We believed we had the "best school around." In music and athletic competition with rival schools, we were respected and even feared. Our graduates succeeded in farming, business, college and the professions, and they came back each year to the Alumni Banquet to give the credit to "good old Springville High."

As was the custom, I lost my job when I married in 1937. There was a strong feeling that married women should not teach when single girls could not find positions. Not until World War II was this trend reversed.


As I look back, I remember 1932-1937 as a time when students played hard and worked hard with their elders both at school and at home. They accepted good fortune, adversity, and discipline equally, as a matter of course. The members of one class in particular had more than their fair share of misfortunes, but they did not react with bitterness or destructive behavior. When I returned to Springville in 1948, I found that we had entered not only a new building, but a new era. Somehow we had lost our innocence.





City Council Regular Meeting

August 7, 2023

The Springville City Council met in regular session on August 7, 2023.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Andersen called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Council members present: Karla Blakely, Jeff Baych, Bart Barner, Cindy Kilburg, Brad Merritt. City staff present: Public Works Supervisor Todd Wyman, City Clerk Dee Wagaman. Treva Davis, Jim Koppenhaver, Rich Blakely, and Ben Bruner with Dickinson Law were also in attendance.

Blakely made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Kilburg. All ayes. Motion carried.
